

DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

The fastest mile trotted or paced this season over a New Brunswick track was made by Pat D. 206 3-5, owned by John E. Forbes of Fredericton, N. B. and driven by Harry Mount, in a winning mile over the Woodstock track, June 26th, 2:10 1/5. The next fastest mile that we have record of in that province was stepped by Abbeland 210 3/5, owned by J. S. Watt of Gaspe, Que., and driven by Wib Jardine, at Chatham Speedway, July 1st-2:10 3/5. Second winner in this event was Donald G. R. 208 2/5, owned by William Fleming, Juniper, N. B. Fibert 209, recently purchased by Mr. Coutre, Rimouski, Que., won 4th money. Other winners that day were in the \$1,000 Miramichi Stake Pace, 2:30 class, Annunzio, owned by T. C. Collette, with a summary of 2-5-1-1. Proctor's Boy, owned by C. J. Craig of Halifax, and driven by Phil Craig, was 1-2-2-2. Maxie Federal, owned by J. S. Watt, Gaspe, Que., and driven by Wib Jardine, was 2-1-1-1. The 1st dash in 2:19 3/5 and Tim O'Shanko, owned by Mrs. Peltier of Shediac, with driver Poley up, was 2-1, time 2:17.

Night racing at beautiful Island Park Raceway, Woodstock, got away in good style June 26th with, as we mentioned above, the fastest mile paced over the track this season—2:10 1/5. Other notable happenings were the winning of the 3rd and 7th dashes by the 4-year-old pacer Mr. McGee, owned and driven by J. H. DeWitt, Woodstock, time, 2:14 2/5 (new record) 2:16 4/5. A starter in this race was the trotter Carl Shark whose eleven starts were in the Harrisburg sale last fall by William Stiles of Woodstock, and was formerly in the stable of Joe O'Brien. He was 2-3. True Fingo by Calumet Fingo, owned by G. B. Graham of Perth, N. B., was 3-2. Arlene's Money by Real Money 2:09 1/2, owned by E. A. Linden of Newcastle, N. B. and driven by him, won the first dash in 2:20 2/5—new record—and was second in the 5th dash won by Real Fingo, owned by Mrs. Emma Muscatelli of Halifax, and driven by Frank McAlduff—time, 2:20 1-5. This horse was brought down from Maine last fall by Myron MacArthur and had no record previously. Skelter 2:07, purchased by Bob Brown at Hart'sburg last fall, and driven by Frank McAlduff, was a starter in the Free For All won by Pat D. and was 5-5. Second place in this event went to Heine Ström 2:09 1/2. A note from Col. Jim Calkin re the Woodstock races states that Mr. McGee in taking his new record, paced the last half in 1:05 and has a 3-year-old full brother Dominion D. at the track that is very outstanding. He says that Lorne Britton's colt, Little Joe Clegg, out of Nora Kalmuck, although only a two-year-old with very little done with him, is showing up well. He is a beautiful chestnut with perfect conformation... Thanks, Jim.

The fastest mile trotted or paced over the Charlottetown oval so far this season is credited to the four-year-old pacer mare Mona Clegg, recently acquired for Harlan Redding of Maine and in the stable of Earle Semple at Charlottetown. Earle gave the smooth-gaited, handsome chestnut filly a breeze over the oval Thursday morning and to the surprise and delight of the onlookers she came the last half of a 2:12 mile in 1:05. She had taken a record of 2:16 3/5 in a winning dash at last Saturday night's races.

Milldale Takes New Mark At Racing Meet

Milldale, a sleek brown mare owned and driven by Willard Kelly set a new record last night to high-light the racing meet held under the lights at the Charlottetown Driving Park. A fair sized crowd of fans witnessed the nine dash meet.

Reinsman Kelly drove Milldale to her new record in the second race of the night. In the fourth race Milldale placed second to Feather Duster but in the eighth the Kelly driven mare came trotting down the stretch to take the lead. Her new record was 2:15 1-5. Milldale's drive, which required a photo to distinguish between the first and second place horses, was the best of the meet, although there were several hard and close finishes during the night.

Pet Hanover, a trotting bay mare and Esso, a pacing bay gelding, were the two double heat winners. Pet Hanover, driven by James MacGregor won the third and seventh dashes while Esso came through to win the fifth and ninth races.

Other winners were Dean Gallon who won the first race on a stretch drive, New Look, Feather Duster and Gahagan.

Earl Semple of Kensington drove Dean Gallon the winner of the first race. Buddy Budlong led from the starting gate to the top of the back stretch but faded on the upper turn. Dean Gallon moved up on the outside from second place to win handily.

James MacGregor drove New Look from fourth position at the five-eighths pole to win the second race. The chestnut gelding pulled into the lead at the upper turn and remained there in front of Quick Lick.

Pet Hanover and Judy Kalmuck battled down the stretch with the Hanover mare in front in the third race. Judy Kalmuck, driven by Willard Kelly and a long shot on the betting board moved up from fifth position to challenge the front trotting Pet Hanover.

Judy moved up fast on the upper turn and came onto the stretch on the inside. James MacGregor, driver of Pet Hanover, held onto his lead and finished a half length in front despite Kelly's efforts to squeeze through on the inside.

In the seventh race Pet Hanover led from wire to wire. Her toughest competition came from Tartan and Anyway who finished a close second and third.

In the Lorne Kelly driven Feather Duster trotted on the outside of the back stretch on the second trip around to go into a lead in the fourth race. From then on the Duster was never headed as she staved off a drive by Milldale to win first place honors.

HUNTERS' CORNER



July is the month for haymaking and the clatter of mowers, muffled in the midday heat, and men at work in the fields making coils of sweet smelling clover shows that the harvest is already underway. I cannot refrain from an involuntary shudder as I watch a tractor speeding around a hay field and listen to the high pitched whirr of the mower blades and wonder what the luckless hen pheasant or Hungarian partridge will meet an untimely end, her and her prospective brood, before the days operations are over.

Since the advent of tractor mowing, a method now widely used by farmers in this province, it is estimated that the mortality among nesting pheasants and Huns and those caught with young broods in standing hay has increased 50%. Strange as it may seem I have attended Game Meetings where the hen mover-upland game problem was never brought up. Instead many of the members present devoted their time to 'beefing' about the use of hunting dogs by so-called sportsmen in the taking of Huns and pheasants and the amount of game killed by Nonresident hunters who visit the province every fall for some outdoor sport.

I remember one meeting when the discussion centered around the hunters kill each season when a farmer member spoke up: "I killed more pheasants in a few seconds this year than many of you hunters shot in the last 10 years". He went on to explain he had cut a Hen pheasant's legs off close to the body that was sitting on 11 eggs already chipped and the chicks would have been out in a few more hours. He told the meeting that he had tried to catch the mother bird to put her in misery but she managed to flap into a dense swamp and he lost her.

Such instances are common place in the mowing season. A few days ago a Bethel farmer told me last summer he ran over a Hungarian partridge that was sitting on a brood of young. The tractor wheel passed over the forward part of her body and missed 8 or 10 of the chicks. He said it was pathetic to see the tiny down covered midgets seeking shelter under the body of their dead mother. He took them home and tried to brood them but they were too young and all died.

The point is: what has our Game Association, Provincial and Country, done to help remedy this distressing situation that occurs every summer? Here is what sportsmen from one State across the Border have done. In the last issue of the Outdoor News Bulletin, issued bi-weekly by the Wildlife Management Institute, 709 Wire Building, Washington, 5, D. C. appeared the following: Flushing Bars Saving Ohio's Wildlife.

A practical flushing bar for use on tractors, designed by the Ohio Co-operative Wildlife Research Unit in co-operation with the Agricultural Engineering Department of the University of Ohio, has been saving the lives of many nesting pheasants and cottontails in the Buckeye State, in the Wildlife Management Institute reports.

A survey by the game management section of the Ohio Division of Wildlife shows that the flushing bar, used by farmers to frighten
