Illustration Station Field Day at New London

For the first time in its history of almost twenty years, rain interfered with Field Day at New London.

Illustration Station Field Day on the beautiful grounds of Mr. William E. Johnstone and son has become something of a social event, and was attended this year by visitors from points ranging from Charlottetown to Summerside, and a number from other provinces and states vacationing here. However, the aim of the afternoon's activities is information on agricultural problems, and the speakers were accorded undivided attention, except when rolling thunder and spilling rain drowned out voices.

Mr. S. G. Peppin, Chief Potato Inspector, made no secret of the fact that Sebago is not his favorite in potatoes, although they sell readily and the acreage has increased rapidly. With other faults, the plants are subject to Blackleg; however since they sell, farmers must produce them. Mr. Peppin warned growers not to overdo production, for the Sebago is subject to certain diseases, they don't want down South, where one of our best markets is to be found. At this point the rain interrupted the speaker. Referring to a disease called Spindle Tuber, he said it has always been here, but is not recognized. The potato will be off color, and may have far too many eyes, especially in Cobblers and Mountains. The Sebago is spreading Spindle Tuber, both in itself and in other varieties; we must fight it or lose our market in the United States.

Speaking of a variety of wilt he said it is serious, because it infects the soil. It may be controlled however, by seed treatment in the Spring. Mr. Peppin urged the practice of the slogan, "Cut and Plant", but "do not open up the soil and leave it exposed to the sun", and later drop in the freshly cut seed, or disease will develop. Evidence seems to prove that pig manure is definitely not good for potatoes, and should never be used.

New varieties of potatoes grown in this province are found to be full of disease, and the inspector expressed fear that some new variety will cause an outbreak of bacterial ring rot. Island farmers sell to 31 out of 46 states and a high quality product must be maintained to stimulate these markets. The situation can also be improved by more careful handling of potatoes in harvesting and marketing.

Observations by Mr. W. R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, gathered on his recent trip to Europe, were most interesting and instructive. Of the conference of the International Federation of Agricultural Producers, he said 30 nations were represented by some 300 delegates and agricultural problems were discussed, just as they might be here. The special problem considered, was that of moving surplus food stuffs to the world to the places where people are starving. Food can be preserved better by moving food and clothing to the people who need them, than by all the guns and bombs in the world. In Denmark, Mr. Shaw noted that the average farm is 37 acres, but that every inch is cultivated. Then co-operative systems are extensively developed both in Denmark and in Norway. Returning to Scotland, he found everyone, including the young people, interested in every detail of farm work. Almost every farmer has a pit silo, five feet deep and 12 feet wide, filled with silage made of rye grass and orchard grass, pressed down with tractors and covered with a little clay. Entering Ireland by way of Belfast, he found the land to be very productive. Commenting on his own farming system, he said, "We perhaps are prone to follow out a system for years and years, while in the Scandinavian countries, and in Scotland and Ireland, they have broken away from the old ways and are experimenting."

Mr. D. Schurman described the effects of 2-4-D, on different plants, and suggested that any one wishing to use it as a weed killer, should write early in the season for information.

Due to rain, the visit to the experimental plots was cancelled and to the keen disappointment of the ladies, Mr. Gordon Warren's address on flowers and shrubs was not heard. Instead Mr. Warren spoke briefly on tests being made to find potatoes resistant to late blight - two varieties of which will be available next year for distribution all over the Maritime. Some varieties are also resistant to scab, and it is hoped some day to combine the two. Supervisor Mr. N. W. Black, who conducted the afternoon's activities, told of experiments at the Illustration Station, on potatoes, fertilized pastures, and crop rotation yields. He thanked the Johnstone family for their support through the years.

Mr. William F. Johnstone also addressed the gathering in a brief word of welcome and due to the rain, the appetizing refreshments prepared by the ladies of Long River W. I. were served in the rooms of the Johnstone home.
