The net used was seized and destroyed. It would appear that a warden to fill the vacancy in the Bay Fortune District was appointed none to soon.

MAKING ENQUIRIES.—The Moncton Times says: A man named Reed, representing a New York insurance company, has been in town this week making enquiries in regard to the death of James Lear. Mr. Lear, a commercial traveller, died suddenly in his room at the Commercial Hotel in Moncton some months ago. His life was insured for about \$20,000 in New York companies, and the insurance people are not satisfied. It is said that Mr. Reed got very little information in Moncton beyond the facts already published.

HEAVY LOSS.—On the morning of the 11th inst. the extensive barns of Michael O'Brien, Dock Road, were burned to the ground together with all their contents, crop, implements, gear, as well as a number of pigs. Several stacks of grain shared the fate of the barns. The loss is a heavy one, indeed, and Mr. O'Brien has the sympathy of the whole country. It is said to be the work of an incendiary, but for the fair fame of the Province we hope not.

OBITUARY.—We announce with regret the death from typhoid fever of Mr. Artemus A. Hayden, son of Chas. Hayden, Esq., Midgill Mills, which took place on Wednesday the 15th inst. Mr. Hayden was a much respected and popular young man. About a month ago he was married to Miss Ella Wilson, daughter of Mr. George Wilson of this city. His young widow and the other members of his family have the sympathy of very many friends in their sad affliction.

CROPS AND CATTLE BURNED.—A recent Fargo, N. D., despatch says: A deplorable condition of affairs among ranchmen is reported as a result of the prairie fires. Between Hart and Cannon Ball rivers and in the valleys the destruction has been almost complete, while about Kildere mountain and east of those things has been left for stock to live upon. In almost every instance in the valleys the small farmers have lost their crops and feed for the winter. The ranchmen lay these fires to the Indians from the Fort Yates reservation, and propose to take the matter before the proper authorities.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Something new in the Birchall Case.

WOODSTOCK, Oct. 17. If the story which has been told about town had been known a month ago, Birchall's chances for life at least might have been a great deal better than to-day. Someone about the Thompson Hotel has revealed the fact that one night last February, about the time Benwell was killed, a short thick set man came to the hotel, late at night and asked for a room. He was nervous and avoided everyone. Next morning early he left without eating any breakfast, and under the pillow where he had slept was found a thirty-eight calibre revolver, all the chambers containing recently discharged cartridges. The two bullets found in Benwell's head were of thirty-eight calibre, and it will be remembered that no trace of the revolver with which he was shot has ever been found. It is thought that this is some "American Colonel" that Birchall is known to have been with a great deal in London, and it is believed that Birchall's confession discloses the fact that this stranger was the man that fired the shot.

A Dangerous Shoal.

HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 17. Captain Mauchalt, commanding the French naval division of Newfoundland, has communicated to Capt. Smith, R. N., of this city, the existence of a dangerous shoal with only 13 feet of water on it, 11 1/2 miles from land west of the French Island of Miquelon. This shoal, which was generally known by the name of the Briand Shoal, is the more dangerous on account of its extremely small size, and because it is in the immediate vicinity of soundings of 11 fathoms.

Fire in a Church.

CHICAGO, Oct. 17. During a children's service in St. Stanislaus' Roman Catholic Church this morning the altar drapery caught fire and a panic ensued. There were about 1500 children with their mothers in the church. In the rush for the door twenty children were crushed and trampled, but none are dead, although a large number were injured.

The Lizzie C. Troop Wrecked.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 17. The ship Lizzie C. Troop, whose officers narrowly escaped being poisoned on the high seas by the steward, D. Diaz, while on the voyage from Philadelphia to Nagasaki, Japan, has been wrecked on the island of Loochoo. Nearly all of the crew have been lost. The Troop was owned by Troop & Son, St. John, N. B.

Handed Over.

HALIFAX, Oct. 17. The American schooner, Samuel R. Crane, which picked up the torpedo boat and brought her to North Sydney has handed her over. The amount of salvage is to be decided on arrival in Halifax between the Admiralty and Consul General Fyfe.

The Ulunda Arrives.

HALIFAX, Oct. 17. The steamer Ulunda arrived this morning and was put into the dry dock this afternoon in the presence of Lord and Lady Stanley.

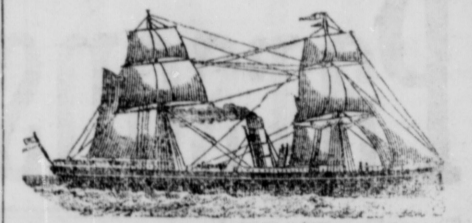

PURIFYING WATER SUPPLIES.—An Ottawa despatch states that the Dominion chief Analyst, MacFarlane, has just returned from a visit to the States where he was engaged in making enquiries in reference to the methods of purifying the water supply of large cities. This question, he says, is exciting considerable interest in Philadelphia. Anderson's process of agitating the water with metallic iron and then allowing the iron which gets into the water to oxidize and subside, is looked upon with great favor. It is claimed that iron in separating removes all impurities.

WILL RETURN NEXT SUMMER.—The Governor General while at the Ship Railway last week, performed the ceremony of placing in position one of the large iron pedestals forming the support of the hydraulic lift. He also expressed his interest in the work by promising to revisit it next summer.

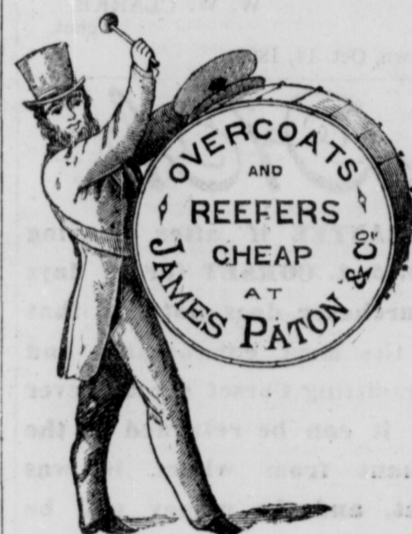
