Resources Minister Winters tabled the 1952 annual report of Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation. The government agency reported 86,246 houses started last year compared with 68,579 in 1951.

In an airplane accident while on active duty in 1942. When King George VI died last year after a lung operation, 25-year-old Princess Elizabeth became the ruling queen. Queen Mary did not wait for Elizabeth to come to her. She went to Clarence House, then the home of Elizabeth, and escorted to the new queen.

Almost 85 at the time, Queen Mary nursed her respects to the first queen to reign in England since Victoria. The dynasty had come full circle. Victoria—the queen who reigned 63 years—knew and liked Mary. And Queen Mary had a special devotion for Victoria's great-granddaughter, who reigns today as Elizabeth II.

In Elizabeth's girlhood, Queen Mary often took her to factories, museums and art galleries. When Elizabeth became queen, Britons fondly recalled the story about her visit to a London department store, in girlhood, with her grandmother. The little princess was delighted at the attention she drew. The queen disapproved. She took her granddaughter out by a side door and told her: "You must learn to be a lady before you can be a queen."

Health Failing

Queen Mary's health kept her from George VI's funeral, though she saw some of the day's happenings by television, and she had not planned to participate in Elizabeth's coronation. Colds kept Queen Mary a bed much of the winter just ended, and a month ago she became more seriously ill with a stomach ailment.

The aristocratic, blue-eyed queen had six children of whom three survive. The survivors are the Dukes of Windsor 58 and Gloucester 53, and a daughter, Victoria Alexandra Alice, the Princess Royal, 55. A son, Prince John, died in 1919.

Queen Mary, who had a strong influence in the rearing of Elizabeth, has looked forward proudly to her granddaughter's coronation June 2, though it was announced months ago she would not attend because of her age.

Whether her death would mean a postponement of the coronation remains for Elizabeth to decide. The general impression, however, was that the ceremony would go on, though the tone of the normally gay celebration would be subdued.

True to her stoic sense of public duty, Queen Mary understood to have demanded that whatever happens to her, the

Coronation should go on as scheduled.

Many of the crowd outside Marlborough House wept openly. They were mostly middle-aged people who had come to regard the prim, disciplined Queen as almost indestructible.

Throughout the day members of the Royal Family quietly entered Marlborough House. The Queen, accompanied by Princess Margaret and the Duke of Edinburgh, who had just flown home from Germany, arrived just before 5 p.m. Queen Mother Elizabeth had left minutes before. Elizabeth stayed for 25 minutes before returning to Buckingham Palace, 200 yards along the Mall.

All Palace engagements for the next few days were cancelled. The Duke of Edinburgh was to have attended a naval dinner in London but the Palace announced he would not go "owing to the anxiety caused by Queen Mary's illness."

Alling Some Time

The Queen is known to have been alling for some time before it was announced Feb. 22 that she was confined to bed.

Even then, the doctors made public the news of her condition mainly to answer reports she was illly rendered by Mrs. H. J. Blois. Pallbearers were Messrs. Wilfred MacNeill, Gerald MacNeill, Melvin White, James Gordon, Lester Nicole and John Brehaut. Interment took place in the Murray Harbour Cemetery.

When it appeared two weeks ago that Queen Mary's illness was serious, the Duke of Windsor hurried from New York. His sister, Princess Mary, came from the West Indies where she was on a visit. Both have been visiting her almost daily since their return. Among the visitors was the Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr. Geoffrey Fisher.

As darkness was falling, the Duke of Windsor, whose abdication in 1936 was one of the great sorrows of his mother's life, paid a second visit. Her other surviving son, the Duke of Gloucester and his Duchess, visited in the afternoon. The Princess Royal called in the evening.

Prime Minister Churchill was received by Queen Elizabeth at the palace Tuesday night. Prepared For Worst

The BBC broke into its scheduled programs to announce the latest medical bulletins. Headlines in evening newspapers prepared Britons for the worst.

They loved the dowager Queen despite her stern, uncompromising exterior. To the younger generation, Queen Mary appeared as an old-fashioned lady, often seen riding past, bolt upright in a big, outdated cap in her public appearances, she always carried an umbrella or parasol and used it to poke at antiquies on exhibit or whatever she was viewing at the time.

Only a week ago, the Duke of Windsor disclosed that his mother was terrified of telephones and had never used one in her life. She also had little use for radio, television or modern gadgets.

Nobody recognized her devotion to duty more than the Duke of Windsor. Queen Mary's first act in his presence after her husband's death was to bow to him and kiss his hand in recognition of the new King.

In his memoirs the Duke wrote: "My mother has been schooled in her duty, in the stoic Victorian sense, before everything else in life. From her inimitable virtue from a fortress upon the rest of humanity with all its tremulous uncertainties and distractions."

Communist Threat Extremely Dangerous

RANGOON, (AP) - Malcolm MacDonald, British commissioner-general in Southeast Asia, said Tuesday the Communist threat to this area still is "extremely dangerous," although Burma, Malaya and the Philippines are progressing in their internal fights against the Communists. MacDonald is returning to Singapore after five days of talks with Burmese officials on what he called a "periodic visit."

Queries Answered In The Legislature

The cost of draggers varies according to the type of equipment needed by the captain, the Legislature was told yesterday by Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources, in answering a question by Mr. Hubert Gaudet, First Prince, regarding loans mentioned in the report of the department.

Of the \$82,000 under question the Minister said it was an advance to the Loan Board and not necessarily the amount expended on draggers. In reply to a question asked by Mr. Frank Myers, First Queen's, Hon. Mr. Cullen said \$106,144 had been put out on potato warehouse loans and \$15,965 has been recovered. The warehouses are located at Douglas, Wellington, Elmira, O'Leary, Bloomfield, Morell, Vernon River and Tignish.

Rocky Point Ferry

Hon. Dougald MacKinnon, Minister of Public Works and Highways, told Mr. R. R. Bell that the delay in the operation of the Rocky Point ferry was due to necessity of obtaining some new parts. They had been sent from Saint John, N. B., but were the wrong kind. They are being obtained, he said, in Peoria, Illinois. He said consideration was being given to the operation of a motor boat on the run and when Mr. Bell suggested that since the Fairview would have to go on the slip at Pictou sooner or later it might as well go now the Minister agreed it was a good suggestion and would be considered.
