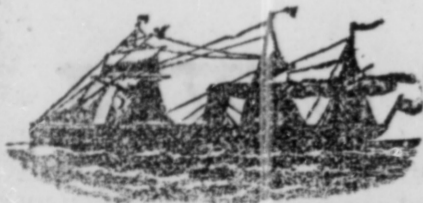

BACK FROM THE KLONDIKE.

Chat With Mr. Small--What the Island Boys are Doing.

A representative of THE EXAMINER had an interesting chat today with Mr. William Small, who has just returned from the Klondike country. Mr. Small, it will be remembered, left here with the Dawson-Dixon party last February, and remained in the Klondike until September 1st, when he left for home, coming out by way of the White Pass, the route taken when going in. The trip from Dawson City here was made in 28 days actual travel.

Mr. Small, while in the Klondike, spent all his time prospecting, and did very well. It is his intention to return next July to further prosecute the work. He would not advise any one to go into mining there without plenty of money, as nearly all the claims have been taken up, many of the best having been "collared" by government officials. Anyone going in now to engage in mining would therefore have to buy up claims. He believes that a man who invests money in mining has a pretty sure thing.

He likes the country very much, and thinks it has a bright future ahead of it. The people, he says, are all good-hearted and honest and disposed to do what is right by one another. But the management of the government officials is not at all satisfactory and is not doing the country any good.

About 40,000 people went into the country last year, and most of them came out dissatisfied. But Mr. Small understood the situation before going in and was not disappointed.

Mr. Small says that all the Island boys were in good health when he left, and all were doing very well.

Messrs J B Dawson and Geo A Dixon are each doing a successful general store business in Dawson City. Everything sells for cash and gold is legal tender. There is a good profit on everything.

Fred Kennedy is mining at Bonanza, working a claim owned jointly by himself and Dawson. Great things are expected of this claim.

Alexander McRae is working a lay at French Hill, about twenty miles from Dawson. French Hill is one of the richest places in the Klondike. They were not down to bed rock when Mr. Small left, but a rich strike was expected.

Wortman also did considerable prospecting, with very good results.

A SMALL CROP.—It is said that the Nova Scotia cranberry crop is a small one this year, due to the June froze; and to insects.

NORTHWEST ELECTIONS.—The Northwest Legislature has been dissolved. Nominations will be on November 4, and elections a week later.

MORE CHEESE.—Mr. T. J. Dillon shipped 600 boxes of cheese to England by the last trip of the City of Ghent. The shipment was made from Summerside.

THE BERTINO.—The Italian bark Bertino, wrecked at Belle River some weeks ago, was yesterday afternoon towed into port by the Messrs Batt Bros, and is now lying off Connolly's wharf. She was taken within three miles of Point Prim on Saturday.

THE SEWERS.—The wet weather of the past two or three days has interfered somewhat with sewerage operations. The trenches in some places contain considerable water, and on Grafton street the men had to work the greater part of last night to keep the cellars in the vicinity of the excavation from being flooded.

BROKEN THE RECORD.—The British ship-builders have broken the record this year, with 508 merchant vessels, of 1,364,250 tons, under construction on September 20, being 351,000 tons above the previous best record, while 92 warships, of 376,435 tons are also building. Great Britain's maritime supremacy is shown by the fact that 489 out of 498 merchant ships are being constructed for British owners.

FIGHTING AT THE PARK.—On the park roadway yesterday afternoon two young men became engaged in a fight. One of the young men, named Bradley, was stabbed in the neck by the other whose name is said to be Lane. The two were parted by some young men who were passing at the time and Bradley was taken to town. Although blood was drawn his wound was not serious. Both young men acted as if intoxicated.

A DISAGREEABLE EXPERIENCE.—A man named Henry Stanton, of Rat Portage lately had one of those experiences which cause a man's hair to turn grey. He and two others were precipitated from a new bridge that is being built into the Winnipeg River. Below them lay the falls. Two escaped by swimming, but Stanton was carried to the cataract. Just on the verge he clung to a rock, and was rescued from there by a boat attached to the shore with ropes.

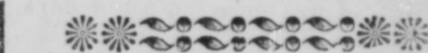

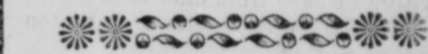
