Small Homes To Receive Aid  
OTTAWA (CP)—Works Minister Howard Green promised Friday an extension in the \$150,000 program of financing small-homes construction "if there is a need for an additional amount."

He said in the Commons the \$150,000 in federal funds for housing to be distributed by lending agencies "is rapidly being used up" after nine weeks of actual operation.

Mr. Green's statement was an apparent indication that the government intends to continue the program as a means of stimulating the construction industry and providing extra winter-time jobs. Construction must start within 90 days of the issuing of a loan.

He spoke following an earlier announcement by the crown-owned Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation that \$12,612,331 of the fund has been earmarked in loans already issued or being processed.

Up to the end of last week, \$9,392,331 had been loaned covering 8,940 units. Additional applications totalling \$39,260,000, 3,926 units, were being processed. Mr. Green said there has been some delays in the Atlantic provinces where up to last Friday loans had been issued for only 201 units. The program at British Columbia, slow at first, had picked up and had 1,000 units loaned or being processed.
