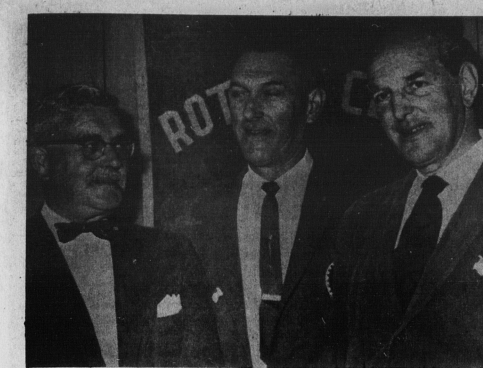

The district governor asked the Rotarians "why are you here today?" He said he could remember the days when he was younger and had just joined Rotary. He said at that time the general opinion was that the organization was mainly for older men, but after joining the club, he found things were different.
