

# Talented Artists Heard In "Concerto Festival"

Rarely have Charlottevian music lovers been treated to a more satisfying concert than that given last evening at the Palace Hotel. The concert was the auspices of the Community Concert Association. For its first entertainment of the season, the Association presented the distinguished American pianist, Eugene List, in "Concerto Festival," with the Knickerbocker Players under the leadership of George Koutzen. Drawn from the ranks of New York's finest professional musicians, the ensemble made its debut at the Metropolitan Museum of Art in 1924 and has since won continent-wide recognition.

The program of the "Concerto Festival" was unlike anything heard here on previous occasions. In its concentration on music composed expressly for solo instruments with small orchestras, the enthusiasm and skill of the players was evident from the start, and the whole performance was a tour de force which thrilled the audience and received the enthusiastic applause of their best.

The opening number, Concerto for trumpet and piano, by the 17th century Italian composer, Giuseppi Torelli, featured by Albert Ligotti as brilliant solo trumpeter and was repeated by request at the close of the concert. This lively work proved a pleasing curtain raiser for the impressive Concerto No. 3, in D minor, for piano and orchestra, by Johann Sebastian Bach, which is among the masterpieces of its kind and in which Mr. List appeared as soloist. Here the artists were at their best and Mr. List's virtuosity was demonstrated in the beautiful rendering of the Andante and lively melodic lines. One of the highlights of the evening was the equally brilliant and animated Allegro which preceded and followed it, in which passages of technical difficulty were rendered with rare precision and warmth.

A sharp contrast was offered in the next number, a ruffled and satirical Concerto for trumpet and strings by Dmitri Shostakovich. Written in 1933,

it was one of the first professional performances in Charlotte. This work was performed for the first time in America by the noted Russian composer's Concerts for Youth at the Academy of Music in New York. The youthful piano soloist at that time was Mr. List; and in the same role in Charlotte he was heard last evening.

The concluding numbers, in this case, were given by the soloist, providing further interest and variety. The Franz Liszt piano concerto, for piano and strings is an early work although not published until thirty years after the composer's death. It is rarely played in this country.

Mr. List has made several appearances in Charlotte, and has been heard with most of the leading American orchestras and chamber ensembles. It is to be hoped that further opportunities will be provided for hearing him in the future. He is also a very talented associate of last evening.
