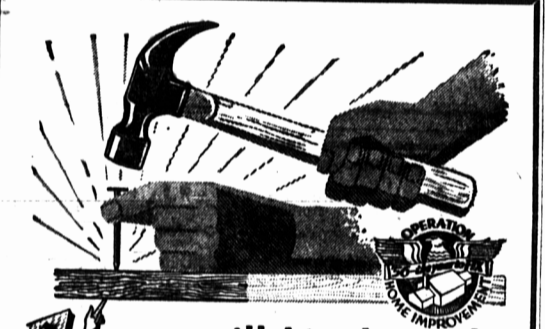
Marilyn Fails Strait Bid

OTTAWA (CP)—The semi-finals were reached in junior men's and women's and juvenile boys and girls singles divisions in a rain-plagued second day of the eighth annual Canadian junior tennis championships Friday.

Cooper, Barber And Thomson Holding Early Half-Way Lead

CHICAGO (AP)—Veterans Pete Cooper and Jerry Barber and young Peter Thomson of Melbourne, the British Open champion, Friday held the early half-way lead in the \$101,200 "world" golf tournament, each with eight-under-par 136s.

The 6,915-yard Tam O'Shanter par 72 course was broken for the second straight day as a field of 93 pros took to the scent of the \$50,000 winner's share like bloodhounds.

The leathery-faced Cooper, a Floridian, scored a 36-69 on the second round with the help of an eagle three on the 475-yard 10th.

Barber, the five-foot-five 137-pound mite from Los Angeles, posted 35-68. He scored an eagle three on the 515-yard 15th.

The third upset saw Montreal's Maureen Mills edge fifth-seeded Linda Clute of Edmonton 6-4, 7-5 in a second round girls singles match.

REACH SEMI-FINALS
Top seeded Francois Godbout of Waterloo, Que., and the second and fourth ranked players in the junior men's singles, John Bassett, Peter Barnard and Butch Freedhoff all of Toronto, earned the right to play today in the semi-finals.

Godbout had little trouble disposing of Ken McReynolds of Montreal 6-0, 6-0, Bassett downed Len Callaghan of Toronto, 6-1, 6-3; Barnard knocked off Yvon LeBlanc, Marville, Que., 6-2, 4-6, 6-3, and Freedhoff defeated Don Morgan of Fredericton, N.B., 6-2, 6-1.

In the junior women's singles, Ann Barclay of Vancouver, Susan Butt, Victoria, Joan O'Brien and Marg Benson of Toronto scored easy quarter-final victories to advance.

In juvenile play, Louis Leprohon of Montreal, Melville Bower, of Ottawa, Jim Frost of Toronto, and Tim Cummings of Vancouver reached the semi-finals.
