

# Cattle Rustling Probe Leads to Court

Inspector A. S. McNeil, officer commanding "L" division RCMP revealed yesterday that a number of incidents of alleged cattle rustling in a section of Queens County are being investigated by the force.

He also pointed out that the number of such incidents has been considerably below that of last year. The first complaint to be received this year was July 22 and was the first since the fall of 1962.

The latest case was put into the hands of Cst. James D. Brookes, in which the contents of his investigations discovered that there were five other similar incidents involving five farms in the general area covering North Winsloe, Wheatley and Milne.

The investigation got underway, one of the animals was returned during the past week-end.

**CATTLE UNBRANDED**  
Insp. McNeil stated that although Cst. Brookes and Cpl. E. F. Elliott are doing all possible to solve the incidents, both the police and the farmers are being handicapped, due to the cattle not being branded, thus making positive identification very doubtful.

As a result of these investigations, Charles William MacQuarrie, South Rustico, appeared before magistrate John B. Johnston, Q.C. in Queens County magistrate's court yesterday regarding the possession of a red grade Shorthorn steer, the property of Cyrus Earl MacNeill Hillion, valued at over \$50.

Counselled by John P. Nicholson, the accused elected to be tried by judge and jury, and the preliminary hearing was set to open on Aug. 29. Cst. Brookes is the informant in the case.

**SHOTGUN INCIDENT**  
The case of Reginald Elmer Heartz, Hampshire, charged twice with assaulting George Percy Bagnall "by levelling a shotgun at him", was adjourned until July 31. Lester O'Donnell pointed out that pointing a gun comes under a different section of the Criminal Code than assault. Crown attorney Alan K. Scates withdrew one of the informations, which were laid by Samuel J. Tibbo. The accused was not present in court.

John Alan Mills, Carleton Place, was fined \$100 and costs for impaired driving. Information was laid by Cst. W.A. Dewarup. Mr. O'Donnell was counsel for the accused.

Two Charlottetown men, Derek MacQuarrie and James Joseph Peters, who previously had pleaded not guilty to theft of gasoline valued at less than \$50, had their cases adjourned to August 12.

**SHOTGUN INCIDENT**  
A man pleading guilty to possession of liquor in a place other than his residence was fined \$20 and costs for 30 days.

**PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND**  
Prince Edward Island is to have a new industry brought here as a joint effort of a local man and one of Canada's largest chemical manufacturers.

The industry is a new fertilizer plant to be erected in the town of Marshallfield, in partnership with the local farmer.

Mr. Wood announced yesterday that construction will get underway right away, and is expected to be completed in 1964. No estimate of the cost of the 100,000 sq. ft. building is available.

The new plant will assure farmers of the availability of high analysis fertilizers in both bag and bulk form. It will also acceptably soil testing and subsequent custom fertilizer service will be available to the farmer.

"It will be a complete service not previously available," said Mr. Wood. "The exact fertilizer mix for the individual farm will be available and the farmer will obtain a granulated free flowing fertilizer that will facilitate handling and application by machinery."

Cyanamid of Canada Limited, Mr. Wood's partner in the Island venture, is one of the major base producers of nitrogenous fertilizers in Canada. With four of its eight plants producing products for the agricultural industry, Cyanamid is an advertiser to fertilizer products, man.

**DRIVER HURLS ACCUSATIONS AT CHIEF OVER STOP SIGNS**  
"If the life of even one child is saved as a result, then the experiment will be well worth while," Police Chief Stens Webster said yesterday morning, commenting on the Police Department's efforts to slow down Kirkwood Drive traffic by the erection of a four-way stop sign at the intersection of Kirkwood and Upper Queen.

So far, a slackening of speed and a quieting of anger have been the two most notable results of the experiment, which has already cost almost as many arguments as the original advent of the automobile into this province.

Just yesterday, while Chief of Police Stens Webster and Constable Charles Ready were parked nearby, an irate motorist drove up to the Chief's car and complained that the stop signs would accomplish only two things — the slowing down of traffic and the saving of city treasury from fines when drivers failed to stop.

Later, the Chief said this slowing of traffic was the exact purpose of the signs. "Residents of Kirkwood Drive have complained many times of the speed with which motorists have been whipping along the street. It is a comparatively new area and there are many young children playing around. We want to protect these children."

Both he and Officer Ready noted there are similar signs in other cities, particularly in Halifax, where they were proving as effective. They were installing the signs for which they were designing.

Observations yesterday morning showed a majority of motorists honored the stop sign.

# ONE OF FOUR SUSPECTS

Premier Walter R. Shaw returned Saturday from Ottawa where he, along with other Canadian premiers, participated in discussions concerning the federal government's proposed \$100,000,000 Atlantic Development Board fund, the national pension plan, and the \$400,000,000 municipal loan fund.

The premier commended yesterday that several startling changes had come about as a result of the talks.

"Changes in the proposed Act covering municipal loans were particularly amusing," the premier said. "In voicing the opinion of my delegation," he said, "I personally felt there should not only be a greater measure of protection in making loans, particularly for essential projects, but also the base of the legislation should be broadened to take in other enterprises that may be approved by the province. The same principle was urged by other provincial leaders."

**CAREFUL CHECK**  
"It was also pointed out that non-essential projects could take up reserves of money and municipalities, and for this reason a careful check by provincial governments will be made on all projects carried out under the program."
