Mr. TEXAS, called "the world's first Christian western" will be shown in Charlottetown Thursday July 16th, in the Rollaway auditorium at 8 p.m. according to an announcement today by S. R. Wright, in charge of the local presentation. The film is the first major production of Billy Graham Evangelistic Films, Inc. and features the famed young evangelist and his entire evangelistic team. Playing leading roles in the full length-color picture are Redd Harper and Cindy Walker, both professional western stars who have recently made their decision to give their lives and talents to Christian service.

Produced as an experiment, "Mr. Texas" has amazed religious leaders and motion picture authorities alike during its first year of showings. At the film's preview in Hollywood Bowl on October 1, 1951, a record throng of 25,000 persons jammed into the huge amphitheatre for the largest attendance any motion picture has ever had in this country. During the past year of showings an estimated 3,000,000 persons have seen the film. From this number of viewers, some 85,000 have made decisions to accept Christ as their way of life, according to records on file in the Graham film organization's Washington, D. C. office. Both figures indicate new highs in evangelistic circles—85,000 is the largest number ever
