Red Wings, Leafs Battle To 1-All Draw In Game

TORONTO (CP) — Right-winger Eric Nesterenko, booted by the fans throughout most of the game, scored in the closing minutes Wednesday night to give Toronto Maple Leafs a 1-1 tie with Detroit Red Wings, before 12,780 National Hockey League fans.

It was his first goal of the season and he cancelled out one scored by left-winger Johnny Wilson of the Wings near the end of the first period. The deadlock left Detroit in second place but narrowed Montreal Canadiens leading margin to two points.

Toronto stayed put in fourth place with eight points to within three points back of New York Rangers.

Wilson's tally, his third of the campaign, came from a pileup in front of goalie Harry Lumley in the Leaf net. The second period was scoreless.

LOOKED BAD

Nesterenko, a tall, gangling youngster, looked bad on a couple of occasions and the fans gave him a razzing each time he took his turn on the ice.

Leaf captain Tedder Kennedy had just returned from serving a slashing penalty late in the final frame when Nesterenko made up for the boos.

Fisherman Beats Out Six To Win International

LAUREL, Md. (AP) — Spunky little Fisherman, a substitute racing on the grass for the first time, won the third running of the \$65,000 Washington D.C. International Wednesday to give the United States its first victory in the global classic. The Queen's Landau was last.

Eddie Arcaro, top U. S. jockey, gave the three-year-old Fisherman, owned by C. V. Whitney of New York, a terrific ride as he bested six other thoroughbreds from four nations in a tremendous race.

Fisherman took the lead going under the finish wire the first time, and held off the fast-closing filly Banassa from France to take the \$50,000 first prize by three-quarters of a length. Brush Burn, another American horse, finished third, 3-1/2 lengths behind the favorite Banassa.

Landau battled Fisherman for the lead after the first mile, then faded and finished last. The Queen's owner had said Landau "did not do the soft going" produced by today's heavy rains.

Fisherman, a little brown son of Blank-Crawfish, got into the lead only Monday when the King of the High Gun was withdrawn after suffering an injury.

The colt, beaten only a nose by High Gun in the 1-1-2-mile Belmont Stakes, same distance as the international, never set foot on a turf course until Tuesday morning.

His win brought cheer after cheer from the half-frozen Laurel track crowd of 20,562.

Dutchmen Edge Sarnia 13-12

KITCHENER, Ont. (CP) — Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen, fighting for a berth in the Grey Cup semi-final, squeaked through to a 13-12 overtime victory over Sarnia Imperials Wednesday afternoon in the first game of the best-of-three Ontario Rugby Football Union final series. It was close most of the way.

The Dutchmen rolled up a first-quarter 12-0 lead on two converted touchdowns but the hard-running Imperials tied it up before regulation time and yielded the winning single by Kitchener quarter back Bob Celer in the first overtime period.

Sarnia missed chances to win shortly before the fourth quarter ended and again in the second overtime period.

Second game of the series is scheduled for Sarnia No. 11 and the third, if necessary, will be played at Kitchener Nov. 13 with the winner going west to meet the Western Interprovincial Football Union champion in the cup semi-final Nov. 20.

A 55-yard kick by Celer, veteran import from New York Yankees, decided the issue on the last play of the first overtime period. Jim Lambert was rouged to break the tie.

The Dutchmen, with Celer playing a standout game, went over for two touchdowns in the first quarter and appeared to be headed for an easy victory but Imperials came back with two field goals and a converted major to send the game into overtime.

Charlottetown Team Leads Maritimes-Maine Bowling

MONCTON, (CP) — Charlottetown defeated Dartmouth 3 out of four matches in the final round of the Maritimes-Maine bowling tournament here Wednesday night to lead the competition. Charlottetown now has 30 wins and 19 losses. Halifax Conn-Martel is in third place with 27 wins and nine losses.

Suggests Help For Black Hawks

MONTEAL, (CP) — Managing director Frank Selke of Montreal Canadiens indicated Wednesday that something should be done by National Hockey League clubs to help the last-place Chicago Black Hawks.

"With reference to the meeting of NHL club owners in New York next Tuesday, Selke said if the Chicago situation is dealt with he hoped the "others" don't try to bolster the Hawks with "castoffs."

"I am not in favor of that kind of treatment," he said. "It will have to be something better than castoffs if we're going to help Chicago."

Selke said the meeting was advanced from the original Dec. 1 date because in another month it might be a case of "too little too late."

New Big League Team Interested In Ottawa Tieup

OTTAWA (CP) — Promoter T. P. (Tommy) Gorman said Wednesday that although Philadelphia Athletics have severed their International Baseball League connections with Ottawa "another big league organization is definitely interested."

However, Gorman, who holds an option to operate another Triple A club in the capital, would not name the organization.

The Philadelphia club announced Tuesday it will not operate a farm club in Ottawa next season. Gorman said the announcement does not necessarily mean that Ottawa now is committed to bush league ball.

Hockey Player's Leg Is Mended

NEW YORK (AP) — X-rays showed Wednesday that Wally Hergesheimer's broken left leg had mended and the high-scoring New York Ranger forward from Winnipeg would be able to start skating immediately.

The 27-year-old Hergesheimer suffered the injury last March 11 in Boston. No indication was given when he would be able to get back into National Hockey League competition.

Hawks Shade Islanders 6-5 To Tie Capitals For First

MONCTON (CP) — Moncton Hawks moved into a first place tie with Fredericton Capitals in the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey league here Wednesday night by edging Charlottetown Islanders 6-5 in a game which featured the first penalty shot of the season.

Islanders were awarded a penalty shot at 19:26 of the third period because the Hawks held the puck inside the goal crease. Big Cooper Leyte took the shot and beat Pidsodny cleanly to make it 6-5.

Eight goals were scored in the first ten minutes of play. Bob Bowness and Frank Dorrington counted two markers apiece to pace the winners. Johnny Leclerc and Mike Demchuk shot the other Moncton tallies.

Leyte scored a brace for Islanders and added two assists to his point total. Buck Whitlock, Guy Gignac and Ray Leduc were the other Charlottetown marksmen.

The Hawks went into a 2-0 lead on goals by Leclerc and Dorrington in the first, only to have Whitlock make it 2-1 a minute later. Moncton had it 4-1 within three minutes, then the Islanders roared back with three goals, by Gignac,

Zulueta's manager, Pop Ryan of New York, had protested the fight. He said his boy had been robbed by a "home town decision."

Zulueta said he would "like to meet Howard again, but only in a United States ring." The Cuban won a split decision over Howard here in 1952.

Referee Jack Delaney Friday gave Howard five rounds, Zulueta four and one even. The judges had it Howard 5-2-3 and 3-2-5.

Canadian Ships Visit Venice

VENICE, (Reuters) — Three ships of the Royal Canadian Navy's First Escort Squadron sailed into Venice harbor Wednesday for an official four-day visit in the course of a two-month Mediterranean cruise.

The vessels were the destroyer Algonquin and the frigates Preston and Toronto, under the command of Capt. Ralph L. Hennessy, skipper of the Algonquin.

Pierre Dupuy, Canadian ambassador to Italy, and Colonel Cherrier, services attaché, went aboard the ships to greet the officers and men.

Captain Hennessy and Italian naval and civil authorities exchanged visits.

The First Escort Squadron was formed last January as a result of Canada's desire to develop an effective anti-submarine unit as part of its contribution to the North Atlantic defence program.
