Many Inquiries Received By Bureau

A total of 1,299 enquiries from prospective visitors to Prince Edward Island were received and dealt with by the staff of the Provincial Travel Bureau during the month of June. It was disclosed yesterday by George V. Fraser, director of the Tourist and Information Branch of the Provincial Government. This was a drop of 375 over the month of May. The drop is due to the fact that most people make their holiday plans before June, Mr. Fraser said.

Of the total enquiries received, 844 came from residents of the United States and 413 were from the other Canadian provinces. A total of 42 enquiries came from other countries. CLEVEDON, Somerset, England (CP)—A skeleton was found in a flower bed here. It is believed to be more than 1,500 years old.

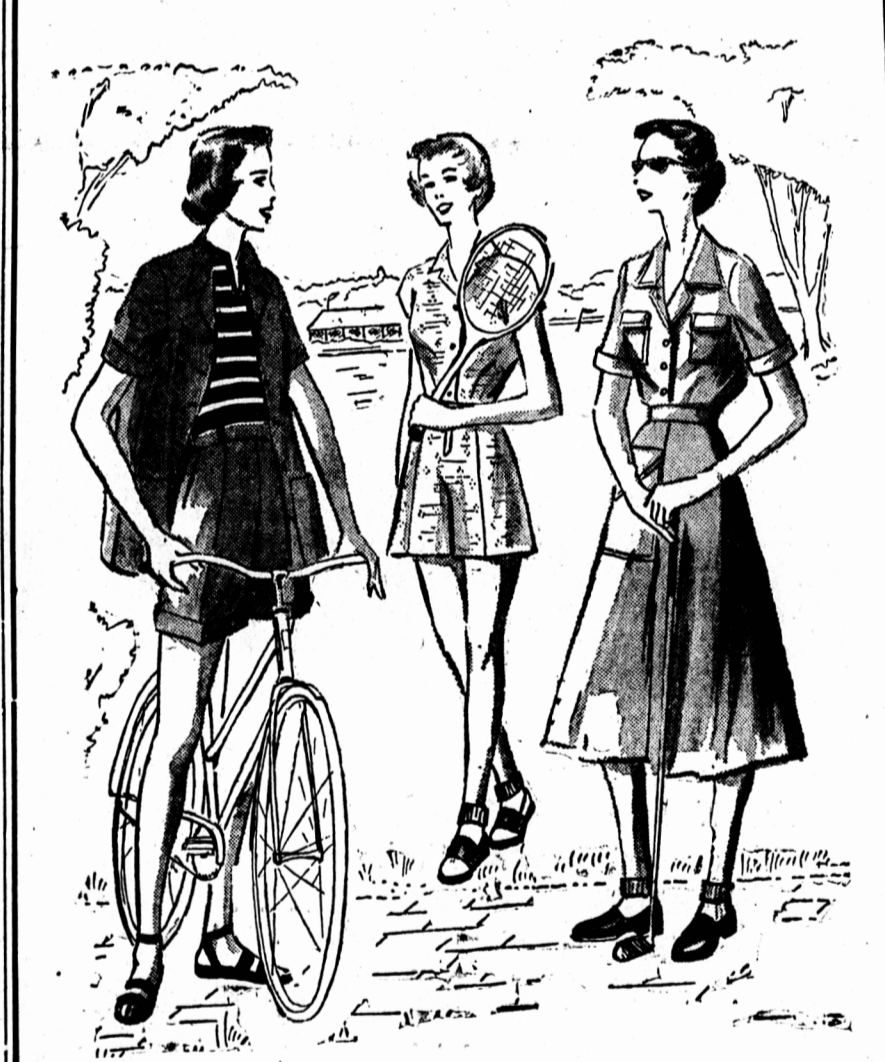
