

# Holman's Even Play-Off Series With Abbies

Holman's Intermediates evened up their best two-out-of-three baseball quarter-finals with the Abbie Intermediates at Queen Elizabeth Park yesterday afternoon, defeating the league leaders by the score of 19-16. Although the visitors got eighteen hits to the Holman's aggregation's fourteen, Hogan's charges outslugged the Abbies, getting five of the seven doubles and two of the three triples cracked out.

The German and his opponent will fight in the semi-final. It is possible that he will be meeting Charlottetown's "Chuck" Heutsis, a novice performer in professional ranks.

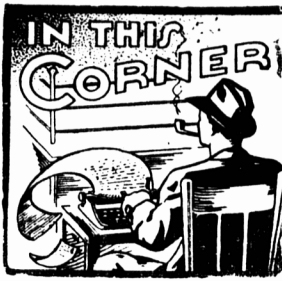

## Large Attendance At Stock Car Races At Montague Yesterday

A large crowd attending the first stock car races at Montague Thoroughbred yesterday afternoon became enthusiastic fans of this fast-growing popular sport as they watched cars racing at high speed around the 1.4 mile track. Many were the thrills as drivers fought to pass on the tight corners, travelling fast, hunting, side pushing, trying to force an opening before the stretch.

Cars left the track, climbed the embankment at inner field, finally straightened out, and raced for the track once more. The first preliminary was run off without mishap, but the second brought the crowd to their feet at the first turn when the car driven by Fenner Stewart, Brackley, went crosswise on the track leading to a pile up. When the dust cleared away three cars were out of commission and went to the pit for repairs. After a new start, another thrill was provided the spectators when the car driven by Blith Murray lifted another car off the track to the infield. The driver was disqualified by the flagman for not exercising caution while another car was crosswise on the track.

Nine cars were featured in the free-for-all going 20 laps, and the roar of the motors, the hair splitting turns, the thrills of speed gave the crowd an afternoon of enjoyment which they will long remember.
