## PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

(Continuation of Mr. Shaw's Speech on the Asylum Matter.)

About July 31st Mr. Peters went east for a few days and in his absence the Commissioner could do nothing. Again in August Mr. Peters left for Halifax and the matter was not yet adjusted. But on August 11th the Commissioner wrote Lowe calling his attention to the fact that he was not proceeding with the contract which should be well under way by that time. He also promised that the foundation would be made right and would be paid for and stated that it was proposed to connect the building by a passageway. Chappell's discharge was refused, as well as the \$5000 asked for and the compensation for delay. If the work was not proceeded with the threat was made to seize all material on the ground for violation of contract. This letter was written on the 11th August and the contract was to be finished in October. Mind you the delay was occasioned by the refusal to give proper authority for proceeding with the work. On the 13th August Lowe acknowledged receipt of this letter and pointed out that the delay was not his fault as by the terms of the contract he could do no extra work unless proper authority was given and up to the time of writing this authority was not forthcoming. Lowe also stated that he would submit the matter of cost of extra work to arbitration, and set forth his reasons for charges for this extra work and the cause of the delay. He also asked for compensation and showed that it was impossible to complete the work in the time specified. On August 24th the Commissioner wrote Lowe to proceed at once with the extra work which was to be approved by the Commissioner and the Government Engineer. Here we find that the Government Engineer is to be inspector and Mr. Chappell as per agreement the architect and is not dismissed. The Commissioner of Public Works now offered to extend the time to October 1898. Well did the Commissioner know that the contract called for the architect's signature and that not a dollar would be paid if this was not obtained. Again Mr. Lowe wrote the Commissioner asking him once more for authority to proceed with the work until the signatures of the Commissioner and Chappell had been obtained and reiterating many of the points brought out in his former letters. Mr. Lowe also suggested that they would meet and discuss the matter and settle it in some way. On October 19 this letter was answered. The Government intimated their willingness to pay Lowe his figures as estimated and promised that when the report of Lemay and the Engineer was completed it would be submitted to him. They also offered \$250 in advance to meet the cost of covering up the material on the ground. Now we come to the report of

Mr. Lemay and the Engineer. Let us hear what they say:—

Hon James R McLean,  
Commissioner of Public Works:

SIR,—According to your instructions, we the undersigned visited the site, and examined the plans and specification of the proposed new wing to the Falconwood Asylum prepared by Mr C B Chappell, Architect, and beg leave to report as follows:

1. We find at site: The surface of the earth has an incline of four feet from the west end of the building to the east and which would leave the footing stones of east wall six inches clear of the surface, as no provision has been made in the plans and specification for said fall. We also find that no provision has been made for footing stone under any of the cross walls, piers, flues and foul air shafts; but a nine inch brick wall placed on the ground which we do not consider sufficient as it will cause an uneven settlement.

2. We also find that the foundation of the Insane portion of the building is not of a sufficient thickness to support the brick walls, as the plans and specification call for 26 1-2 inch hollow brick walls, and the stone foundation is only 21 inches thick which we consider too light to carry the walls.

3. We also find by the plans that in the construction of the building, the cross wall do not build into or bind the outer shell of the hollows from the starting of the brick work from the stone foundation until it is finished to receive the wall plates which we do not consider sufficient to support any kind of a roof that may be placed thereon.

Bombay Gazette: A remarkable and interesting circumstance attended on the departure of General Sir William Lockhart from Peshawar. Some 400 to 500 Airds, among whom were a large number of the headmen of the tribes, assembled at the General's house and requested permission first to carry him and then to draw his carriage to the railway station. This Honour Sir William Lockhart graciously declined, but the Airds went to the station in a body, cheered him as the train left, and gave him a great send-off. No higher tribute of respect, observes a correspondent, could possibly have been paid to the gallant commander of the army which has just fought so lately against them, defeated them on most occasions, and humbled them to the dust. Throughout the force respect of our late enemy has been universally felt, and the feeling will be greatly increased by this spontaneous and manly outburst of goodwill. It may be accepted as a sure token that the peace just concluded will be long and lasting. Sir William Lockhart's personal influence over the tribes on the North-West frontier has made itself felt on many occasions, but never in the annals of war, we imagine, has such an extraordinary incident ever been shown.
