

MEMORIAL CAIRN

Erection of a memorial cairn (shown above) to mark the birthplace of Reverends George Nicol Gordon and James Douglas Gordon, both of whom were slain in the Hebridean mission of the Canadian Presbyterian Church and thus became its first martyrs, has just been completed. The location of the cairn is directly in front of the site of the old home (recently demolished) at Huntley near Alberton, P.E.I., on a plot of land deeded in 1954 to the trustee board of the Presbyterian Church in Canada by their descendants.

The superstructure measures seven by seven feet at the base, stands 11 feet high from ground level on a foundation of five foot granite field stone. The tablet measuring 21 inches by 32 inches of polished black swede granite and bears the following inscription:

To the glory of God and in memory of

His servants
the Rev'd George N. Gordon
1833-1861
his wife
Ellen Catherine Powell
1833-1861
and
the Rev'd James D. Gordon
1832-1872
devoted missionaries of the
Presbyterian Church
who were slain as martyrs
by the natives of Eromanga
in the New Hebrides
erected at their birthplace
by the Presbytery of
Prince Edward Island, 1955
Culverts have been placed, one
at each end of the road frontage,
and those interested are invited
to visit the grounds and inspect the
memorial at close range.

A dedicatory service to be con-
ducted by the Presbytery of Prince
Edward Island has been deferred
to a future date owing to the late-
ness of the season.

to join her husband in France.

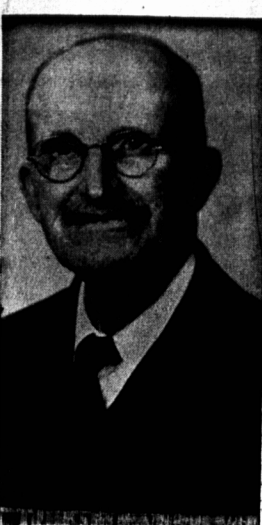

MR. ALBERT MUTTART
71 YEARS IN CHOIR

Entering his seventy-first year of
unbroken choir membership is Mr.
Albert Muttart, Carleton, who has
seen many changes in church
music in this Province.

Mr. Muttart was born at Car-
leton, Lot 28, a son of the late Mr.
and Mrs. John D. Muttart and
Mary Jane Leard. He has lived all
his 85 years in the place of his
birth. He had five sisters and
three brothers, of whom only one
sister, Mrs. James Slavert, Char-
lottetown, and two brothers, Frank
and Hedley of Carleton, survive.

In 1898 Mr. Muttart was united
in marriage with Minnie Toombs
of Mayfield, P. E. I. At this time
Mr. and Mrs. Muttart moved to a
home of their own and carried on
farming until 1945. At that time he
retired from farming and pur-
chased a residence near by. Since
he has resided with his daughter, Mrs.
Hedley Louther. He has another
daughter Mrs. John Haslam, resid-
ing also in Carleton.

Mr. Muttart was keenly interest-
ed in music even when a small
boy. He joined the choir in the old
Cape Traverse Methodist Church
in January 1885 and sang soprano
till 1890. At that time the present
Cape Traverse Church was opened
and Mr. Muttart began to sing
base.

In 1943 when Borden became an
appointment of the Bedeque United
Church Charge, he attended there
and joined the choir and is still
an active member.

In his early days anthems were
not generally sung especially in
rural churches, except on special
occasions. The singing was enthu-
siastic and whole-hearted.

His host of relatives and friends
will wish for this grand old man
many more years of song to add
to the seventy he has enjoyed. It
is unlikely that Mr. Muttart's re-
cord, as a choir member, can be
surpassed in this province.

Find Death Was Accidental

A coroner's jury returned a
verdict of accidental death in the
inquest into the death of Thomas
Adam Bishop, and the jury ex-
onerated the driver of the car that
which passed over the body as it
lay on the highway at Mount
Pleasant on the night of October
15th.

The inquest, held in the Court
House at Summerside on Thurs-
day night was presided over by
Coroner D. W. E. Callaghan,
with D. O. Stewart, Q.C., rep-
resenting the Crown.

Edward Roy Hutchinson, the
first of seven witnesses, gave evi-
dence to the effect that he had
followed the deceased a drive from
Wellington Centre to the Miller
Road (in the Mount Pleasant
area), and that the deceased had
been drinking.

Clifford Henry Livingstone,
driver of the car which passed over
the body, said he saw the
man lying on the road only when
he was too close to avoid contact,
and at first sight had thought the
dim object was a skunk.

John Nicholas' Moreshead and
Russell George Hardy, passengers
in the Livingstone car at the
time of the accident, corroborated
the evidence given by Mr.
Livingstone.

Const. L. Grant of the R.C.M.P.
highway patrol, gave evidence in
regard to his being the first po-
lice officer on the scene, and as-
sisted in the taking of evidence.

Constable J. H. Maloney, Sum-
merside, R. C. M. P., presented
a sketch of a scene of the ac-
cident to the jury.

Const. Douglas Hender, Sum-
merside, R. C. M. P., gave an ex-
planation to the jury in regard to
the pictures taken at the scene of
the accident by Constable Gordon
Humphrey, "L" Division, Identifi-
cation Section, Charlottetown, R.
C. M. P., and also explained the
details of the police investigation
of the accident.

The test of the Coroner's ver-
dict read: "We the jury accord-
ing to the evidence given believe
that the death of Thomas Adam
Bishop was caused by Clifford
Livingstone's car on the paved
highway near Mt. Pleasant at ap-
proximately 6:00 p.m. October 15,
1955. We attach no blame to Clif-
ford Livingstone."
