Residents of Montague will learn with regret of the sudden illness of Dr. A. D. MacKenzie, who is at present a patient in the P. E. I. Hospital following a heart attack early yesterday morning at his home on McGill Avenue, Charlottetown.

Dr. MacKenzie suffered the attack about 5 a. m. when he arose, Mrs. MacKenzie immediately summoned the doctor, and the patient was removed to the hospital where his condition last evening was described as satisfactory under the circumstances.

Dr. MacKenzie is minister of Trinity United Church at Montague, but moved to Charlottetown lately where his son Donald is attending school.

He has been continuing his charge here from Charlottetown arriving here for services each Sunday. Although he tendered his resignation in June, he has continued until the arrival of the new minister who will replace him.

His many friends in Montague deeply regret his illness, and extend wishes for a very speedy recovery.

though he personally realized the Fifth District had been sadly neglected in the past. Apparently no one had asked for anything for it as the Provincial representatives were in the Opposition. However, he added that Mr. MacDonald had been successful in obtaining more for it in one year than had been gotten in the previous five years put together.

Mr. MacKinnon said the department had been using shale on the roads in the Belfast district and obtained good results. They had tried to improve the streets in outlying sections of Charlottetown, but someone had made a mistake and instead of improving they had become "muck".

He reminded the meeting that although there were only 35 miles of roads in the Fifth District, it still had a road maintainer all year round the same as other districts which had upwards of 300 miles. He also stated that the road to the city from North River was being sandstoned. In other parts of the district where they had tried to improve roads they were met with opposition from land owners who resented the loss of land necessary to widen the roads past their homes and farms.

He had heard opposition to his department's plans but he did not think it fair to state that as Minister of Public Works and Highways he had fallen down on the job. "Give us four years and the co-operation of the people and we won't fall down," he stated.

He said that Mr. MacDonald was the "most insistent" man in the Legislature and told the meeting that in him they had "one of the best representatives to come under the roof of the Building". He said that Mr. MacDonald would serve them honestly.

Turning to politics in general Mr. MacKinnon said Liberalism is not dead and despite frequently heard remarks "a good government cannot be too long in office". He had heard remarks to that effect concerning both the local and Federal governments but the Liberal Government has made Canada into one of the great nations of the world.

Cities Welfare Activities Hon. A. W. Matheson, Minister of Health and Welfare, said that his department paid more money in this city than in any other district of the Province. For example he cited the fact that though there was \$60,000 allotted for the aid of needy mothers in the Province, the City of Charlottetown was receiving \$2,000 each month of the sum. In his brief talk Mr. Matheson said the need was not so great now as it had been a few years ago but if the City felt aid was necessary, the

tentary, where he was serving a robbery term.

Premier Frost said today he thinks the escape and disappearance of the Boyd gang were made possible by a "province-wide underworld organization with a link in the Don Jail." Police declined comment but said some underworld tipsters have apparently gone into hiding since the break.

Investigators said they will question Mrs. Boyd about her letter to her husband. Photostatic copies of the letter were published in newspapers today and police said the letter might contain a hidden message to Boyd.

Mrs. Boyd is on bail on a charge of conspiring to aid in Boyd's escape in connection with the break he made 10 months ago. She was living with him in the Toronto house in which he was arrested in a dawn raid by police last March 15.

The letter, in Mrs. Boyd's handwriting, read: "My dearest Eddie—Am I asking too much of you under the circumstances to give yourself up? If to anyone, to me or to the men both you and I know would give you a fair deal. I have thought this over so much in the past three days and knowing me as your devoted wife, I'll wait for you no matter what the outcome may be. God willing we will have the privilege of growing old together. This is all I ask of you and Eddie remember always I love you dearly. Yours,

Frances Boyd. X X X X O.C.R.D."

One police official said: "I don't believe there is a sentimental bone in his body. I'll just about drop dead if he pays any attention to such an appeal."

Another MAGIC "sure-fire" Success JAM UPSIDE-DOWN SHORTCAKES Combine 1 tbs. soft butter, 1/4 c. thick jam, 1 tbs. lemon juice and, if desired, 1/2 c. broken nuts and divide between 6 greased individual baking dishes. Mix and sift twice, then sift into a bowl. 1 1/2 c. once-sifted pastry flour (or 1 1/2 c. once-sifted hard-wheat flour), 3 tps.
