

Flight Schedule Changes Nov. 1

A new autumn-winter schedule for Eastern Provincial Airways will begin on Nov. 1.

There will be a new twice a week direct passenger service between Moncton and Goose Bay; a new twice weekly service between Moncton, Charlotte and Sept. Ile; a new daily all-cargo service between Moncton, Charlotte and the Magdalen Islands; a reversion to three flights daily between Moncton, Summerside and Charlotte; and a new daily all-cargo service between Moncton, Charlotte, the Magdalen Islands, New Glasgow and Halifax. For the first time in three years New Glasgow will be served by both Northbound and Southbound flights.

In addition to the above, Eastern Provincial Airways has ordered new uniforms for its aircrew and stewardesses along with new cabin service items such as a new-meal tray service, monogrammed blankets

and other amenities. The Airline has also recently gone into extensive aircraft cabin renovations and plans to upgrade Fleet Cabin Standards as soon as possible.

ONE FLIGHT TRIED

During the past two years, Eastern Provincial Airways attempted to tie in all its main bases in the Maritimes with those in Newfoundland by one flight. However, this pattern frequently proved difficult to operate since bad weather in one area would cause delay throughout the system.

The new schedule will be set up so that the two areas will operate independently, but the flights will be timed to make connections at Halifax in early afternoon.

Eastern Provincial Airways hopes to provide better service to the travelling public with its new schedule which will result in more available seats throughout the system.

Further Remand Given In Prince Murder Case

SUMMERSIDE — Sterling Joseph Bernard, Lennox Island, charged with the murder of Roger Labobe at Lennox Island on Sept. 26, was further remanded to Oct. 14 by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in County Court, yesterday.

Preliminary hearing of the case is delayed until a report is available from RCMP crime detection laboratories. Accused is represented by J. Melville Campbell.

The charges against two brothers, Pius Daniel MacDonald, Seven Mile Bay, and Laurence Eldon MacDonald, Central Bedouque, accused of break, entry and theft, were withdrawn.

The firm of Island Sea Foods, Borden, represented by Alexander B. Campbell, pleaded guilty to four charges of violating the Fruit, Vegetable and Honey Act. The case was adjourned to Oct. 12 for sentence.

G. Bruce MacDonald represented the department of agriculture.
