Drifted 450 Miles In 12-foot Dinghy

BRISBANE, Australia (AP) - Viktor Zvejnicks, 28, staggered ashore north of Cairns, Australia Monday after a 48-day trip in an open 12-foot dinghy all the way from Thursday Island. Zvejnicks, who was born in Latvia, is too weak to tell the full story of his 450-mile drift, but it is known he left Thursday Island Jan. 6 in the dinghy. A storm came up and he lost his paddles. He said he caught rain water in a cup and a plate, and lived largely on seaweed.

Unclaimed Bank Balances Rated At Six Million

OTTAWA, (CP) - Unclaimed bank balances on the books of Canada's chartered banks and the Bank of Canada have risen to nearly \$6,000,000.

The accounts department reported Thursday that the chartered banks had about \$2,117,000 in unclaimed balances at Dec. 31, 1953. This was an increase of about \$331,000 compared with the corresponding date the previous year.

Another \$3,606,000 is held by the Bank of Canada. This sum includes balances, other than dividends on bank stocks, which have not been claimed over a 10-year period.

Names of depositors with unclaimed balances are contained in 15 bulky documents prepared by the chartered banks and tabled in the Commons by the finance department. The public may examine the documents, but the department cannot undertake to furnish information to inquirers unless it is provided with the name and branch of the bank where a depositor has funds belonging to him.

The balances held by the Bank of Canada may be claimed on the same basis. The owner will receive his original deposit plus interest for a period of not more than 20 years. The banks themselves make no attempts to locate rightful owners of unclaimed balances.

Slot Machines Under Discussion In Parliament

OTTAWA, (CP) - A CCF member suggests that under the law millions of people unknowingly enter gambling houses every day. Stanley Knowles, Winnipeg North Centre, raised the question Wednesday during Commons study of a revision of the Criminal Code, which says that any place equipped with a slot machine is presumed to be a common gaming house.

"I begin to wonder," he said, "whether millions of people do not go into common gaming houses every day of their lives. Every time you go into a corner store you go into a place where there is a slot machine."

Mr. Knowles said that the definition of a slot machine, covering vending machines in which there is an element of chance, would include pay telephones and slot machines for children.

Charges Unions

Hector Dupuis, L-Montreal St. Mary asked if the new code makes church bingo's lawful. He said that in recent years, they have been held to be illegal.

Mr. Garson said the new code does not change the law on bingo's. He noted, however, that the question of lottery is being studied by a joint Senate-Commons committee, which is also studying on capital and corporal punishment.

Thomas Barnett, CCF-Cornwall-Alberni asked if a trade union, raising money for charitable purposes through games of chance, would be exempt from the law.

Mr. Garson said it would depend on the circumstances but added that he thinks a trade union might have trouble proving it is a charitable or religious organization within the meaning of the law.

Province of Prince Edward Island. At this time of year, with seasonal changes in climate taking place, the problem of preserving the paved highways of the Province becomes a matter of much interest and concern to all who have occasion to use the highways of the Province.

This current year, the Spring thawing period appears to have set in considerably earlier than usual, and today finds many of the non-paved roads nearly impassable. There can be no doubt that the damage to these roads this year will be extensive—at the present time it is much greater than previous years—and as a result, the cost of repair will be correspondingly greater.

The same muddy condition exists under the paved road, but remains unseen. In this regard, it is considered by competent authorities, and experience has shown that a gross vehicle weight of 6,000 lbs. is the maximum weight which can be permitted without damage becoming excessive.

In the past four years, it has cost in excess of \$800,000.00 to repair and keep in condition the paved roads of the Province. Most of this can be charged to Springtime damage. A slight relaxation in the overloading restrictions could easily increase that damage to a point where it would be beyond our financial capacity to maintain the paved roads in the Province.

You can help reduce this bill by limiting your gross vehicle weight to 6,000 lbs. In the event that weather conditions change and sufficient freezing occurs to warrant lifting weight limits, notification will be by radio at news time (probably in the evening) and in the local newspapers. It might be pointed out that quite considerable frost will be necessary to penetrate the pavement and to further sufficiently freeze the base under the pavement.

The R. C. M. P. have been requested to rigidly enforce the Regulations regarding overweight vehicles. Your co-operation will be appreciated.

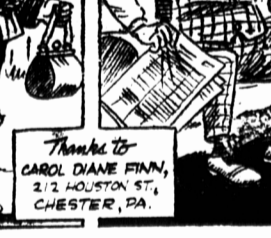

There Ought To Be A Law

New York Stocks

NEW YORK, (AP) - The stock market snapped back into its rising trend last week with a strong rally.

The advance followed a one-week decline the previous week which was the first time the market had sold lower on the week this year.

All week the market seemed to ignore broad economic or political developments. None was taken as an excuse for mass movements.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks gained 30 cents on the week and closed at \$114.40, only \$1.99 under the 1953-54 peak reached early in January of last year. Last week the average was down \$1.10.

The five most active issues last week on the American stock exchange were Burma Mines up 1-8 at 3-8 with 189,000 shares traded; Central Explorers up 1-16 at 5-7-16; Non-Ferrous Metal Products unchanged at 3-16; Equity Corp. up 1-8 at 2-3-8; and Niles-Bement-Pond up 2-1-4 at 21-5-8.

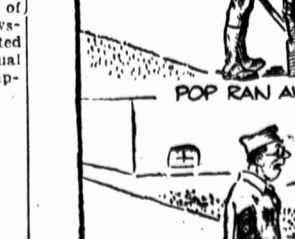
The five most active issues on the New York Central up 1 at 24-1-2, with 106,300 shares traded; General Electric up 3-1-2 at 100-3-8; Loews up 3-4 at 14-5-8; North American Aviation up 1 at 25-1-4; and Consolidated Vultee up 1-1-8 at 21-3-4.

Most Canadian stocks closed the week higher. McIntyre and Canadian Pacific each added 1-4 while International Nickel and Dome Mines increased 1-8. Distillers Seagram was off 1-8.

On the American stock exchange, Giant Yellowknife and Royalties Oil both slipped 1-4.
