ARCTIC NEWFOUNDLAND

- 1. The first Atlantic cable landed at Heart's Content, July 27, 1866. In a high hill, overlooking St. John's harbor, Guglielmo Marconi received the first wireless message to be transmitted across the Atlantic at St. John's, December 12, 1901. Since that day the spot has been known as Signal Hill, and a monument has been raised to commemorate the great achievement. The world's first trans-Atlantic flight by Lester's Field, June 14, 1919. Alcock and Brown landed in Ireland next day—successful. In Placentia Bay, August 14, 1941, Prime Minister Winston Churchill and U.S. President F.D. Roosevelt met on the decks of a battleship, and signed the famous document known as the Atlantic Charter. Plan Changes In Appeal Laws

OTTAWA (CP)—The government Tuesday gave notice of legislation to have more than one judge of the Supreme Court of Canada hear applications for leave to appear in capital cases.

The step is believed to stem from the case of Wilhel Coffin, Gaspé, Que., prospector hanged Feb. 10 for the murder of one of three American bear hunters in 1953.

A resolution placed on Tuesday's Commons order paper by Justice Minister Garson proposes amendments to sections of the Supreme Court Act and the Criminal Code dealing with applications for leave to appear in capital cases. It also proposes the establishment of the office of deputy registrar of the Supreme Court.

At present, applications for leave to appeal murder convictions are heard in chambers by one Supreme Court judge. It is understood the government proposes to have three judges hear such applications in future.

Sees Outlook For Jobs Tougher

OTTAWA (CP)—Many layoffs in industry have made it increasingly difficult to obtain good jobs, says the Roundel, official monthly RCAF publication.

The statement is made in an article urging that the many airmen whose three-year air force engagement expires this year sign on again.

"You will have to find a very good job indeed (in civilian life) in order to live on the scale to which you have been accustomed in the RCAF," says the article. "Will the job you are contemplating provide you with good married quarters and free schooling? Furthermore, will it offer marriage and subsistence allowances, as well as separated family allowances? We would suggest that the answer is no."

"A very conservative estimate shows that, to parallel in civvy street the life you now are leading as an airman, you would have to earn at least 350 per month, or 4,200 a year. That is, you would have to make more than young graduate engineers, doctors, lawyers and school teachers, whose starting salaries are rarely over 2,000 a year."

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
