Education—Everybody's Business. What are you doing in your community in your Province, to strengthen education?

Our schools play a great part in the development of responsible citizenship but those charged with the teaching of the youth of this country alone carry the job through to completion. Every thoughtful citizen must realize his responsibility for the training of the next generation.

The work of good schools does not stop with boys and girls. It follows them into the community—enriching every house—benefiting all.

Our schools need not only passive backing but also active co-operation as they teach our boys and girls to translate ideals and moral standards into real living habits and every day practices.

Education is a cooperative endeavour. Parents, teachers, employers, labor organizations and other groups have a responsibility to provide guidance in furthering the education of our children and to assist them to grow into useful, happy members of society with a full realization of the rights and responsibilities of citizenship.

Education neither begins nor ends with the school—it is a continuing process that calls for follow-up. Adequate facilities must be provided for many forms of adult education.

Above all, education must make it possible for Canadian workers to play their full part as citizens in every aspect of community life. The woodland path we often tread, Along our way to school; The hook and line and fishing rod; The brook and emerald pool; The boys and girls with whom we played; Who answered to our call, Are comrades still, live where they may; We love them 'one and all.

PIPELINE The world's largest pipeline has been completed and is ready for operation.

Through this big pipe—which is between 30 and 31 inches in diameter—petroleum will flow more than 1000 miles, from wells in Saudi Arabia to the ancient Phoenician town of Sidon in Lebanon.

By loading oil at Sidon, tankers can now avoid a long trip around the Arabian peninsula, and through the Suez Canal.

The big pipe is 1088 miles long. It runs from American-owned oil fields near the Persian Gulf, and across Saudi Arabia, Jordan, and Syria, before it ends up at Sidon, near the Mediterranean. The Saudi Arabian fields are among the greatest oil lands in the world, and hundreds of thousands of barrels are expected to flow through the new pipeline daily.

Viscount Alexander of Tunis will remain as Canada's Governor-General until 1952. His five-year term, which expires March 1951, has been extended for one year.

The King of Sweden is King Gustaf VI. Prince Oscar Frederick Wilhelm Olaf Gustaf Adolf (Gustaf VI) is the son of King Gustaf V. Sweden's new King Gustaf VI, 67-year-old former Crown Prince, married Lady Louise Mountbatten, daughter of the first Marquess of Milford Haven, and sister of Earl Mountbatten. She is a great granddaughter of Queen Victoria, and is Sweden's first English-born Queen.

INDO-CHINA'S WAR The conflict in Indo-China appears to be reaching a critical stage. The situation there is very similar to that of Korea. Native Communists and non-Communists are fighting for political power. The French are helping the non-Communists, and the Chinese are supporting the Communists.

France has sent one of her best generals, General Jean de Lattre de Tassigny, to command her forces in that area. These include about 150,000 French and African troops, plus thousands of native Indo-Chinese. Ho Chi Minh, head of the Communists forces in that land, has about 70,000 organized troops at his disposal, and the Chinese may throw as many as 300,000 soldiers into the battle to aid Ho's forces.

The French and their allies have launched an offensive against Ho Chi Minh's forces.

The influenza epidemic has hit Georgetown but not perhaps to the degree that it has in many centres. Quite a number of citizens have been confined to their homes for a few days. The Georgetown High School is still open, though several of the teachers have been on the sick list necessitating the closing of two of the rooms. The remaining rooms have had their attendance sharply reduced.

Considerable pulp wood is being cut in the Georgetown area. Owners of wood-lots are busily engaged in this paying industry. Others have purchased areas of woodland and have men engaged in cutting pulp. All over the country one sees pulp wood cut and piled at road sides, on farmers fields and at rail sidings. Bergmann Construction Company have started to assemble a large quantity of pulp wood at their Georgetown assembly yard for shipment by water in the summer. It is also rumored that the Cardigan Co-operative are dickering with parties in Georgetown for a site on which to store pulp, which they would also ship from here by water.

ORLON It is one of the newest man-made fibres. Production of Orlon continuous filament yarn got under way last year in a new Du Pont plant at Camden, S.C., U.S.A. Sizes of the first yarns being made at Camden indicate they will be used primarily in non-apparel fabrics.

Orlon continuous filament is the most silk-like and Orlon staple is the most wool-like synthetic fibre known. Resistance to exposure is so good that it is believed to be the most effective fibre, or man-made, yet developed for out of doors. Comparative tests between Orlon awning fabrics and cotton awning fabrics showed the superiority of Orlon over cotton in its resistance to ultra-violet light, mildew, moulds and degradation by industrial smoke, soot and fumes.

Weaving mills are experimenting with a lightweight Orlon suiting fabric that will be as warm as the present day heavier woollen worsteds. Orlon is also expected to enter topcoating and overcoating fields, as yet virgin territory for synthetics, which would mean warm yet lightweight garments.

The United States leads the world today in the production of synthetic filament yarn, accounting for nearly 60 per cent of all output.

Perhaps the most interesting man-made fibres being produced outside North America are Perlon, the German nylon-type fibre, and Vinylon, a Japanese fibre. Perlon is made mostly in 60-denier, by the Verneiling Glassstaff-Fabrik A. G. at Oberburg. Vinylon, a poly-vinyl-alcohol fibre, is being produced in Japan from locally available raw materials. —Oval
