

# 'Retarded Child' Show Criticized By Chapter

"The Eternal Child", a TV show purporting to depict the problem of the retarded child "backed feeling and failed to bring out in proper manner the potentialities of such children," such was the opinion expressed by the majority of those attending Monday night's meeting of the local chapter of the Canadian Association for Retarded Children.

Held in the Day-Training classroom at West Kent School the meeting was chaired by the president, Leo P. Berrigan.

Though all of the members present agreed that the show had many good points, most felt that it was not by any means the best show of this type that they had seen.

### PANEL DISCUSSION

The possibility of holding a TV panel on the work of the local Association was discussed thoroughly. While admitting that such a project was expensive, the majority agreed that it was the best means of putting the case of this particular group before the public.

Final decision on this matter was deferred until the next meeting of the Association executive.

Pictures of the newly-acquired camp at Oyster Bed Bridge were shown by Wendal Cudmore. Roy Smallwood also reported that he had taken a number of pictures of the children, the school, and the camp all of which he hoped would be suitable for publication in the bulletin.

(Continued from page 1) tentative in the federal Progressive Conservative cabinet, of trying to get two "political heifers" appointed to the St. John's Housing Authority. (Continued from page 1) ment value of material given as mutual aid to NATO countries.

The white paper, an accounting of the Progressive Conservative government's first complete fiscal year, showed a deficit which compares with one of \$38,600,000 in the 1957-58 year, when budget revenues were \$5,048,800,000 and expenditures \$5,087,400,000.

## PEACETIME REIORD

The 1958-59 deficit compares with the all-time high of \$2,558,557,000 in wartime 1944-45. The previous peacetime deficit peak was \$390,342,000 in 1919-20, while the former post-war high was \$151,849,000 in 1956-57.

In his budget speech last June, Mr. Fleming forecast a deficit of \$648,000,000 and later, in September, he revised this to about \$700,000,000.

The white paper indicated the budget deficit turned out to be below both those forecasts, thanks to economic recovery late in 1958 which helped swell the tax take.

The white paper accounts, subject to revision next August when final financial reports are in, showed budget revenues rising by 2.5 per cent to \$4,770,000,000 from the forecast of \$4,652,000,000.

Budgetary expenditures of \$5,387,400,000 were not far off last June's budget forecast of \$5,300,000,000.

ECONOMIC UPTURN? Mr. Fleming's budget speech tonight is expected to predict that revenues will well because of the anticipated economic upturn.

But there has been speculation the minister may also seek more money through higher taxes aimed at reducing the deficit and strengthening confidence in the government bond market which sagged last year.
