(Continued from page 1) who have already completed or are presently taking courses with the object of qualifying for a Superior 1 Licence, at the date of the passing of these regulations, may submit for consideration courses other than those specified, and the director of education may approve changes in not more than one course prescribed.

10 COURSES Superior 2 Licence shall be granted to those who have completed the professional training for Superior 1, and in addition have completed the following 10 courses of the work ordinarily prescribed for a bachelor of arts or science degree in Canadian universities:

2 courses in English; 2 courses in language other than English; 1 course in mathematics; 1 course in physics, chemistry or biology; 1 course in education in addition to the minimum requirements for Superior 1 Licence; 3 electives.

Superior 3 Licence shall be granted to those who have completed the professional training for Superior 1, and in addition have completed the following 15 courses in the work ordinarily prescribed for a bachelor of arts or science degree in Canadian universities:

2 courses in English; 2 courses in language other than English; 1 course in mathematics; 1 course in physics, chemistry or biology; 1 course in education in addition to the minimum requirements for Superior 1 Licence; 3 electives.

Superior 4 Licence shall be granted to those who have completed the professional training for Superior 1, and in addition have completed the following 20 courses of the work ordinarily prescribed for a bachelor of arts or science degree in Canadian universities:

2 courses in English; 2 courses in language other than English; 1 course in mathematics; 1 course in physics, chemistry or biology; 1 course in education in addition to the minimum requirements for Superior 1 Licence; 3 electives.

Superior 5 Licence shall be granted to those who have completed the professional training for Superior 1, and in addition have completed the following 25 courses of the work ordinarily prescribed for a bachelor of arts or science degree in Canadian universities:

2 courses in English; 2 courses in language other than English; 1 course in mathematics; 1 course in physics, chemistry or biology; 1 course in education in addition to the minimum requirements for Superior 1 Licence; 3 electives.

Superior 6 Licence shall be granted to those who have completed the professional training for Superior 1, and in addition have completed the following 30 courses of the work ordinarily prescribed for a bachelor of arts or science degree in Canadian universities:

2 courses in English; 2 courses in language other than English; 1 course in mathematics; 1 course in physics, chemistry or biology; 1 course in education in addition to the minimum requirements for Superior 1 Licence; 3 electives.

Superior 7 Licence shall be granted to those who have completed the professional training for Superior 1, and in addition have completed the following 35 courses of the work ordinarily prescribed for a bachelor of arts or science degree in Canadian universities:

2 courses in English; 2 courses in language other than English; 1 course in mathematics; 1 course in physics, chemistry or biology; 1 course in education in addition to the minimum requirements for Superior 1 Licence; 3 electives.

Superior 8 Licence shall be granted to those who have completed the professional training for Superior 1, and in addition have completed the following 40 courses of the work ordinarily prescribed for a bachelor of arts or science degree in Canadian universities:

2 courses in English; 2 courses in language other than English; 1 course in mathematics; 1 course in physics, chemistry or biology; 1 course in education in addition to the minimum requirements for Superior 1 Licence; 3 electives.

Superior 9 Licence shall be granted to those who have completed the professional training for Superior 1, and in addition have completed the following 45 courses of the work ordinarily prescribed for a bachelor of arts or science degree in Canadian universities:

2 courses in English; 2 courses in language other than English; 1 course in mathematics; 1 course in physics, chemistry or biology; 1 course in education in addition to the minimum requirements for Superior 1 Licence; 3 electives.

Superior 10 Licence shall be granted to those who have completed the professional training for Superior 1, and in addition have completed the following 50 courses of the work ordinarily prescribed for a bachelor of arts or science degree in Canadian universities:

Lay Movement Is Talk Topic At Meeting Of Men's Group

GEORGETOWN — An interesting and inspiring address by the president of the P.E.I. Presbytery Men's Council, Lester Keizer, was the highlight of the December meeting of the Men's Association of St. David's United Church, Georgetown which was held in the church hall Monday evening.

Reviewing the history of the lay movement from the time of creation, the council president said that in all the ages, God found a man who was willing to obey His bidding.

Recalling the names of a number of the major prophets, Mr. Keizer observed that these men, although lacking many leadership qualities, at least according to present day standards, were willing to listen to God's voice when he spoke to them.

Co-operative effort between laymen and clergy was one of the main requisites emphasized by the speaker in promoting the welfare of the church. He challenged the men of St. David's to renewed dedication in their christian vocation. "Let us use our faith, not as something for Sunday only, for the seven days of the week," said Mr. Keizer.
