### Chief Commissioner Spry Addresses Scout Leaders

Scouting as an instrument in the furtherance of world peace and its importance in the training of youth at home in good citizenship was reviewed last night by Major-General D. C. Spry, CBE, DSO, CD, chief executive commissioner of the Boy Scouts of Canada, who leaves soon to head the Boy Scouts international bureau in London, England.

Scouting was become so well known around the world that now millions of boys dream of becoming Scouts. They see romance and adventure in Scouting and want to become a part of it, said the Chief Executive.

He saw the youth movement as holding the key to transmission of western civilization's ideas to the Near and Far East where only technology has so far made much progress. It held an attraction in Moslem, Hindu and Buddhist societies, where even religious missions have met dubious success.

General Spry was speaking to Prince Edward Island scout leaders and council members at an informal dinner last night at the Charlottetown Hotel presided over by Brigadier W. W. Reid, DSO, ED, provincial president of the Boy Scout Association. General Spry and his wife were welcomed by His Honour Lieutenant-Governor T. W. L. Prowse, the Hon. A. W. Matheson, Premier, and His Worship Mayor J. D. Stewart.

Paintings of two island scenes were presented the General and Mrs. Spry as a parting gift from the Provincial Association.

In opening his address General Spry touched on the progress of Scouting in Canada during past war years, reviewing in particular plans "Opportunity" and "Achievement". Quality rather than quantity in leaders had been stressed and with the steady growth of the movement a new problem had arisen in many parts, that of accommodation. He congratulated Scout leaders in this Province for the splendid work they had done.

Speaking of his new post, General Spry noted the International Bureau headed five and a half million members in 57 countries. It had a paid staff of three men and two girls besides himself and operated on a budget of \$40,000.
