NOTES AND COIN OF THE TROPICS was the subject of a lecture delivered by Mr. Halliburton, in the Y. M. C. A. Hall, on Wednesday evening, 9th inst. He described his travels among the out-of-the-way islands in the West Indies. "The Land of Love and Song," particularly St. Thomas, St. John, St. Eustatius and the Islands of Paul and Jerusalem, the primitive and homely manners and customs of the inhabitants, also, the curious caves and the mounds of shells which abound on them built there by a race of men long since died interspersed with numerous amusing anecdotes.

We observe that the regular dealers of Halifax complain that in consequence of so many bankrupt stocks being disposed of, that legitimate trade is steadily interfered with. Bankrupt stocks, or parts of them, are being brought to Charlottetown to the serious detriment of the business of our long established traders. The parties who bring these stocks pay little or no taxes, gather up all the available funds they can, and betake themselves to other parts, leaving our regular business men to bear all the public burthens. Is there no remedy or means in the hands of the City Council whereby these bankrupt stock traders may be made to pay a good round sum into the City Treasury.—Times.

MURDER.—Fort Hill Volunteer Battalion, Company No. 3, having completed drill, engaged Mr. Thomas Murphy, of Fort Hill House, to provide an oyster supper to celebrate the occasion. Toasts were proposed and responded to in the following order: The Queen, proposed by Capt. H. Yeo, responded to by Colonel Davin; the Prince of Wales, proposed by Captain Yeo, responded to by Sergeant Major Courtmill; the Governor General, proposed by Wm. R. Ellis, responded to by Mr. John Birch. Colonel Davin and several other gentlemen were proposed and responded to. The entertainment was very much enhanced by the performances of lady friends on the organ, accompanied by vocal music.

FATAL SHOOTING ACCIDENT.—On Wednesday evening last, about 7 o'clock, a lad named Alexander Brown was seen by Mr. Wm. Gardiner to rush out of the lane leading to the rear of Dodd & Rogers' premises, "The Confectionery," &c., exclaiming as he approached, "Oh! Mr. Gardiner, I am shot! take me home!" The lad was at once taken to the engine room, but before Dr. Taylor, who was called, could reach him, he was dead. A seven-shot pistol was found in his pocket, and a box of cartridges. A post-mortem examination of the body was held on Thursday, and the coroner's verdict was to the effect that the lad accidentally shot himself. The pistol was by some means discharged while in his pocket, penetrating the body in the region of the stomach and ascending towards the right arm pit.—Times.

RAILWAY ACCIDENT.—On Tuesday last, at six o'clock p.m. train from Summerside was between North Wiltshire and Milton stations, it struck a cow on the track. The engine and tender passed over the animal, but the Baggage Car and one Box Car were thrown off the track. Mr. Conductor Taylor, who was sorry to say, was considerably injured, but, providentially, he escaped by mere chance we learn—being terribly crushed if not killed outright. One of the train hands walked backed to Wiltshire Station to telegraph to town for assistance. Superintendent McKeelnie personally went on the assisting train, accompanied by Dr. Beer, and after several hours detention, the passengers reached town. For some time Conductor Taylor suffered much pain, but before reaching town was much easier. We are glad to learn that Conductor Taylor is rapidly getting better.—Times.

OBITUARY.

SACRED TO THE MEMORY OF CAPTAIN RODERICK MACDONALD, WHO DEPARTED THIS LIFE AUGUST 31ST, 1875.

On Thursday morning, at the hour of seven o'clock, a.m., on the 31st of August ult., another of the brave sons of Prince Edward Island, Capt. Roderick Macdonald, was summoned to the presence of his Redeemer. He was born at Bear River, in the parish of St. Margarets, on the 9th of March, 1819. Under the guidance of an esteemed and pious father he learned many salutary lessons which in after life seemed not to have been forgotten. In his youthful days he showed a desire of pursuing the seafaring business. This desire he carried to its fullest extent afterwards, holding the highest certificates of competency as master from the Boards of England and the United States. He crossed the Atlantic, as master, thirty-nine times, and it can be said of him—what cannot be said of many captains of his experience—that he never lost a man at sea.

At the time of his death he was thirty-four years and seventeen days married. He lived to see a large family of children and grand-children around him. When his last mortal enemy—Consumption—rapped at his door, it found the big heart of the Captain, as in days gone by, ready and willing. Fortified by the rites of his Church, he gave up his immortal soul to his Giver, in the hopes of a glorious Resurrection. His mortal remains were taken to his last resting place by one of the largest concourses of people ever witnessed in the Eastern End of the Island, extending in a packed mass for the distance of about one mile. A solemn Requiem was sung, and the funeral oration pronounced by the Very Rev. Dr. Macdonald, of Charlottetown. Being his own intimate acquaintance and former parishioner, the task fell into the proper hands; holding the congregation in suspense for about three quarters of an hour. Although his body rests not in Glasnevin Cemetery, nor his heart in the Eternal City, may we hope that he will be raised at rest in the loving embrace of a Blessed Redeemer. R. I. 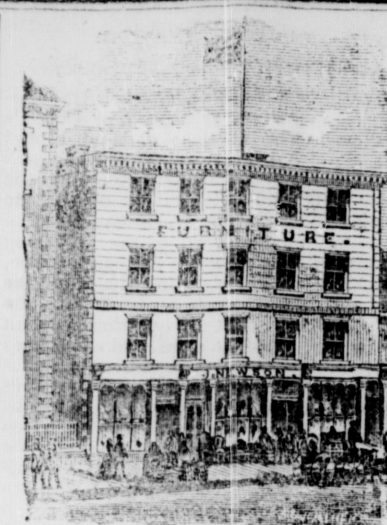
