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N.Y. Market Takes Losses But Balanced By Rallies

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market took some sharp losses last week but balanced them out with a couple of rallies that left the averages about even as the week ended.

Analysts saw the declines as part of a correction of the prolonged rise since last November. How much further this correction had to go was a matter of doubt among Wall Street experts. Optimism prevailed for the longer term, based on rising profits and the general strength of the economy.

The popular market averages were at variance. The Dow Jones industrial average this week advanced 2.21 to 817.0. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks dipped .3 to 303.1. Standard and Poor's 500-stock index rose .45 to 89.77.

In the overall list of 1,523 issues traded this week, losers outnumbered gainers by 792 to 494,900 shares; Snytek, up 8% at 89 1/4 and Canadian Javelin, up 1% at 13 1/2.

Shaw Replies To Criticism

Premier Walter R. Shaw stated Saturday morning that he was perfectly satisfied with the make-up of P.E.I. Industrial Establishment Corporation board and any words the board might say for the island's industry.

Premier Shaw was replying to some recent remarks by Liberal Leader A. W. Matheson who suggested that the recent changes would make little improvement in the method of financing industry development in the province.

Mr. Matheson suggested that changes recently made in the administration of some government divisions left board chairman industry and natural resources minister Leo Roebuck with one branch which should have been taken away, that of the Industrial Establishment Corporation.

U.S. Steel Output Runs Behind 1963

CLEVELAND (AP)—U.S. Steel will be the peak month of the first half for steel production and shipments in the U.S., Steel predicted Saturday. But the levels will be well under a year ago when buyers were still struggling against a possible strike.

This week's production probably will equal the estimate of 2,460,000 tons turned out last week, the weekly journal of ironworking reported. Input output of 10,500,000 tons in April the largest in 11 months, will go up two or three per cent in May, Steel said.

May shipments should exceed April's estimated 7,200,000 tons by a small margin, the magazine said. Last year, with the possibility of a summer strike production in May was 11,500,000 input tons and shipments nearly 8,000,000 tons.

Construction demand for steel is on a seasonal upturn and orders for plates, piling, structural reinforcing bars and galvanized sheets will help offset any slackness that may develop in June in demand for hot rolled and cold rolled sheets, steel said.

The scrap market continues strong, Steel said, with the price composite on No. 1 heavy melting steel rising 38 cents last week to \$31.66 a ton.

Announce Inspection Dates Of Four Island Cadets Corps

The 26 and 29 of this month as well as the first two days of June, will see the four Island Army cadet corps inspected.

Birchwood High School, which tied last year for the top cadet corp in Canada, will be inspected on May 28 and Montague Regional High School will be inspected May 29.

June 1 will see the St. Dunstan's College Corp inspected and the following day Queen Charlotte High School will be inspected.

One of the major attractions of the school year is the ceremonial parade and following this the cadets are eligible to attend summer training at Camp Aldershot where they meet cadets from the other two Atlantic Provinces. Instruction covers drill, small arms, map reading, citizenship, first aid, rescue work, signaling and other army skills. Awards are given to "master cadets" based on an examination and attendance at a summer camp.

Keenly sought by the cadets is selection to attend a national camp at Banff, Alberta during the summer or inclusion in a group that visits either Jamaica or Barbados to camp with Army cadets from those countries.

Eight top cadets are chosen to join the Banff group and one top each of the West Indies group. Inspecting officers are senior officers from either the Regular or Militia components assisted by the Area cadet training officer, Capt. H.A. Decoste of Halifax. Accompanying this group will also be Sgt-Major (WO2) L. E. Gargan of the Royal Canadian Artillery. Drill for the ceremonial will be heeded by three other soldiers from the Halifax-based regimental staff, Sgt-Major (WO2) J.E. Ellis, Canadian Guards; Colour Sgt. S.J. Mould, Canadian Guards and Staff Sgt. J.H. Debbison of the Black Watch. Capt. A.G. Magee of the R.C.R. and Sgt. R.E. Evans, R.C.C., will inspect recruits and stores.
