OPENS MEETING—Continued from page 1. Stated, Mr. Baker noted that three quarters of a bushel more grain than average had been produced in the Province during the past year. "We probably should be producing more," he stated, "but unfortunately some of it is being shipped out of the province."

"The Department of Agriculture is considering setting up a bull breeding policy," he stated, "and if the Federation of Agriculture will set up a committee the Department will co-operate with it as fully as possible."

Congratulates Federation—He congratulated the Federation on its rapid growth and stated that the members of the Government would promote the policies of the Federation as far as possible while not neglecting the remainder of the population.

He encouraged the farmers to devote more time and effort to increase the fertility of the soil by the application of manure and fertilizer. He reviewed the steps leading up to the possible bacon contract with Britain this year for 130,000,000 lbs. of Canadian bacon and also the efforts of the Provincial Government to procure the service of veterinarians for the province. "I hope to have something better to report on this matter before another year," he stated.

HULL, Que., Jan. 11 (CP)—Graham Lapierre, 24, of Ottawa, today was sentenced to seven years imprisonment. He had been charged with murder but convicted on a reduced charge of manslaughter for the Hull tavern slaying of his father last July.

Evidence in the trial brought out that young Lapierre and his mother had lived a life of malnutrition at the hands of the hard-drinking father. 64-year-old Allan James Lapierre.

The elder Lapierre was shot to death while drinking in a Hull tavern July 12. Young Lapierre, fleeing from the scene after the shooting, wounded a bystander and was himself wounded, though not seriously, by a police constable before he was captured.

Mr. Roland Macdonald, Southport, and he was given staunch support, asked the meeting to urge upon the authorities the need for an artificial insemination scheme. He pointed out that it was successful in other Provinces and countries and should be employed here, after noting that it was being carried out with success at the Experimental Farm.

The members also asked the Provincial Department of Agriculture and the Experimental Farm to initiate a research program designed to provide practical information and promote improvement in grassland farming.

Mr. W. R. Shaw graphically described his visit to Europe last summer to attend the Conference of International Federation of Agricultural Producers in Sweden.

He recounted with great admiration the manner in which European farmers cultivated every inch of the soil. He noted that most of the farmers possessed only 25 acres of land but that they were nearly all prosperous.

Among the countries he described were Denmark, Sweden, Norway, Finland, Scotland and England. He told about the success of the co-operatives in Denmark, and also the Danish educational system.

Sweden also had well organized co-operatives he stated. He referred to a co-operative creamery that handled 440,000 pounds of milk daily in addition to turning out butter, cheese and whole milk.

Discusses Civil Defence Problems

Major General F. F. Worthington, C.B., civil defence co-ordinator for Canada, left here last evening at six o'clock in an R.C.A.F. plane enroute back to Ottawa after a two-day visit to New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. He arrived here late Wednesday and spent an informal evening at the United Services Club where he met and talked with some men who had served under him in the last war.

Yesterday General Worthington had a private meeting with Premier J. Walter Jones at 10 a.m. followed by a meeting with Hon. J. Wilfrid Arsenault, Minister in charge of civil defence, and Lt. Col. P. S. Fielding, chairman of the Provincial civil defence planning committee with whom he reviewed the reports of the provincial survey being carried out by Mr. Peter W. Pate.

In the afternoon, the General met with the Provincial Executive Council and later with members of the civil defence committee.

At the meeting of the civil defence committee the first it had held since its formation last month, he outlined plans which are being made by the Federal authorities and spoke of a civil defence forum to be held in Ottawa Jan. 29. This forum, he said, will be attended by representatives from the various Provinces and the object will be to "insure uniformity in organization and functional procedures throughout Canada and to permit study and discussion at each level of government."

General Worthington told the committee that he was especially pleased with the survey made by Mr. Pate and added that he had not realized the extent to which civil defence work had been carried out in Prince Edward Island.

Canadian Delegates Chosen To Attend World Youth Forum

TORONTO, Jan. 11—Peter Martin of Ottawa and Elizabeth Goring of Nappan, Nova Scotia will represent Canada at the World Youth Forum to be held in England this spring. The United Nations Association has conducted a nationwide competition to select the two Canadian delegates and the winners are announced by Miss K. E. Bowly, National Secretary.

Peter Martin is a student at Trinity College School in Port Hope, Ontario and Elizabeth Goring, whose father is a research officer at the experimental farm at Nappan, is a student in the Amherst High School. They were successful in a competition that attracted entries from all across Canada. Entries were written on the topic "Our Way to Peace". Each student submitted a brief autobiography, and a confidential report from the principal of the school attended was an essential part of each entry. Increased interest in international affairs was indicated by the fact that there were twice as many entries as last year.

The Youth Forum will bring together thirty young people between the ages of sixteen and nineteen, a boy and a girl from fifteen countries and no doubt hundreds of questions. The last two weeks of their stay will be spent in London where, in addition to participating in a huge Youth Forum in the Royal Albert Hall, they will have an opportunity to enjoy the activities of the Festival of Britain.

The Youth Forum is financed by the London Daily Mail and is planned by them in cooperation with the Council for Organization in World Citizenship (an organization of the United Nations Association). The whole trip will cost the delegates nothing but the required thirty shillings a week for pocket money. The purpose of the Forum is to create a nucleus of understanding and friendship that will help to lessen some of the tension in this fear-ridden world.

Canadian entries were judged by a committee set up in Ottawa under the chairmanship of Mr. B. T. Richardson, Associate Editor of the Ottawa Citizen.

First year's delegates to the Forum were Audrey Adams of Vancouver and Oakley Dyer of Edmonton. They were reported to be excellent representatives for Canada and Oakley was given the honour of making the final speech at the Forum in the Royal Albert Hall at the end of their visit.

This is the third such Forum to be held in England. The success of the project created an immediate demand for its repetition and returning delegates pay tribute to the degree of understanding of other people that they have acquired in ten short weeks. They believe that the world would be a safer place for all of us if there were more such opportunities to learn to know and understand each other.

Expect Defence Issue To Spark Lively Session

By Douglas How OTTAWA, Jan. 11 (CP)—Cabinet preparations for a stormy Parliamentary session dominated by defence issues will move into high gear Monday with the return of Prime Minister St. Laurent and other key Government members.

Mr. St. Laurent's return from the Commonwealth Prime Ministers' conference in London and from a visit to Paris will coincide roughly with the arrivals of Trade Minister Howe and External Affairs Minister Pearson.

Two days later, Progressive Conservative leader George Drew is due back from New York to discuss his own preparations for a new session now little more than two weeks off. It starts Jan. 30.

Opening Rounds Fired—The opening rounds have already been fired in what is bound to be the session's leading issue—Canadian and joint Western defence and the manpower problems associated with it.

Senior spokesmen for both the Liberal and Progressive Conservative Parties have said this week that Canada must boost her forces, but neither party shows any signs of touching the political dynamite inherent in the conscription issue.

That issue, however, in one form or other, is bound to hover over the session. World events may force it into the open.

It is liable to be propelled back into the public spotlight shortly by an important group meeting here now. That is the Conference of Defence Associations, a gathering of senior wartime officers now back in civilian life.

They met in private with Army Chief Lt.-Gen. Charles Foulkes today and will meet Defence Minister Claxton tomorrow. Last year, they came out strongly for some form of compulsory training in the reserve forces. An even stronger call this year would not be surprising.

Cabinet will meet often in the next two weeks to hammer out the details of a wide-ranging defence program unprecedented in Canadian peacetime history.

The anticipation here is that it will call for a defence budget well beyond \$1,000,000,000, for overseas commitments for the armed forces, for expansion of European arms and air training aid beyond the current level of \$300,000,000, for use of women in the forces and possibly for national registration.

A feature of the East Coast Fisheries Conference which is to be held in Charlottetown the week of January 22 will be a lecture and demonstration of fish cooking in the P. W. C. auditorium on the afternoon of January 25.

Miss Edith L. Elliot, in charge of the Home Economics Section of the Federal Department of Fisheries will give the demonstration, assisted by Miss Vivienne Magne.

Wives of the delegates from the five Eastern provinces will attend, together with members of the P. E. I. Inkeepers Association, the P. E. I. Home Economics Association, the executive of the P. E. I. Women's Institute, and the general public.

A special display of Island canned goods will be shown during the demonstration of cooking.

LONDON, Jan. 10 (Reuters)—The King and Queen will pay brief visits to Gibraltar, Malta, Aden and Ceylon on their way to Australia and New Zealand early next year. Buckingham Palace officially announced tonight. It was announced recently that the King and Queen hope to arrive in Western Australia March 1 and in Wellington, N.Z., May 6.
