Find Piece Of Peary's Flag At North Pole

OTTAWA, (CP)—A fragment of the United States flag that first was planted on the North Pole has been found in the far Arctic by two young Canadian scientists. With the historic piece of blue silk from the Stars and Stripes, the explorers found records of one of Admiral Robert Peary's polar expeditions on America's north-eastern mountain 400 miles south of the pole.

Canada's defence research board Wednesday announced word of the discovery from its two scientists, who have been investigating the ice shelf bordering the northern coastline of Ellesmere Island, where Peary jumped off for the pole.

Explores

The cache was found on Cape Columbia mountain by Geoffrey Hattersley-Smith, 30, of Ottawa, a glaciologist, and Robert Blackadder, 23, of Ottawa, a geologist. In a letter written May 22 and just received by the board, Hattersley-Smith wrote: "From the summit of Cape Columbia peak we recovered Peary's 1906 records and a piece of the silk ensign which three years later he flew at the North Pole. The record looks as if written yesterday."

Cape Columbia peak is a mountain more or less by courtesy. Officials here estimate it rises about 1,100 feet above the Arctic sea, making it about a tall hill. Peary's successful dash for the pole was launched from Cape Columbia in 1909. He made a 40-mile-a-day trek over floes to be the first man to reach the top of the world.

Dulles Returns

His 1906 records have been copied by the Canadians and replaced in the cairn where they were located. The 1906 expedition was his third into the Arctic. The two Ottawans have been investigating, for the Canadian Government, a theory that ice islands floating in the Arctic ocean stem from the ice shelf on the Ellesmere island north coast.

Their work is the forerunner of a joint Canadian-U.S. expedition planned for next year. The ice islands are regarded as potential floating airfields, and for some months a group of U.S. scientists have been carrying out investigations on one of the largest.

He said that he and Harold Stassen, foreign aid director who accompanied him, found the need of U.S. technical aid in every country from Suez to India except Saudi Arabia.

But to make such aid, or any relationship with these nations, politically effective, he said, the United States must attempt to clarify its alliance with the colonial powers of Europe as against its interest in the orderly progress of restrained nationalism and independence.

Province Behind In Blood Contributions

After an absence of some six months, the Red Cross Mobile Blood Donor Team from Halifax will be in the Province next week for a series of clinics which will begin in Charlottetown on Monday afternoon, June 8 and continue that evening and the next afternoon.

Knowing how difficult it is to get a sufficient number of donors to fill the five hours of afternoon clinics in Charlottetown, a group from the Provincial Blood Donor Committee composed of the Chairman, Mr. F. A. Large, Mr. F. A. S. Jones and Mr. Arthur Peake have undertaken to contact the heads of firms to discuss with them the possibility of having employees given time to attend the clinics during working hours.

Maritime Central Airways Maintenance Division set an excellent example of what can be done along these lines last November when they arranged for their employees to attend in different shifts and in this way increased the number of donors at the Charlottetown Clinics by about 50. In the past, the evening clinics have been congested while the afternoon hours have been very slack. It is in the hope of overcoming this situation and of considerably increasing the donor panel that the above mentioned group of public-spirited citizens have undertaken this survey.

Up-to-date figures reveal that this Province is now in debt by 400 bottles of blood to the Maritime Depot at Halifax. The average usage by patients in local hospitals is 200 bottles per month so at least 1,100 donors must be secured at the different clinics during the week of June 7th. The Committees at work in Charlottetown, St. Peter's Bay, Tyne Valley, Kensington, the R. C. A. F. Station, and Summerside are sparing no effort in their organizational work in the hope that each will exceed the objectives set.
