

'Offending' Labor Legislation Should Be 'Wiped' Off Books

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont. (CP)—The 450,000-member Ontario Federation of Labor Tuesday called for a national crusade to wipe "off" offending labor legislation from the statute books of Newfoundland.

H. Landon Ladd, eastern Canada vice-president of the International Woodworkers of America (IWA) also called upon Prime Minister Diefenbaker to stop paying lip service to his bill of rights.

"If he (Mr. Diefenbaker) really fights for freedom, let him start in Newfoundland," he told more than 800 delegates at the federation's annual meeting.

Mr. Ladd charged that basic rights have been violated by labor legislation in the Atlantic province. "The right to belong to a union, the right to strike—these basic rights were taken from us by the legislature of Newfoundland," he declared.

"But today we are moving into the camps, we are signing up our workers again and we are collecting dues by the hundreds once more in Newfoundland, he said. "Through a national crusade by men of good will to whom the principles of freedom and democracy are part of a way of life we shall regain the rights taken from us at the picket lines and in the halls of that legislature."

"SHOW INDIGNATION"
Mr. Ladd asked the trade union movement "to rise up and show righteous indignation before you have your Smallwoods spread light across the country."

He said the Newfoundland loggers' strike was motivated by men working a 60-hour week at \$1.05 an hour who sought better living conditions. He said recommendations for a 55-hour week and "a few cents an hour increase" were rejected by the Anglo-Newfoundland Development Company and the Bowater Corporation who subsequently ap-

proached Premier Smallwood "to bail them out."
Delegate William Graham, president of IWA Local 250, declared "there is no doubt similar legislation is wandering around in the so-called minds of our representatives in Queen's Park."
He said labor legislation in Newfoundland was part of a step-by-step campaign by big business in North America and was intended to be "a frontal assault on the trade union movement."

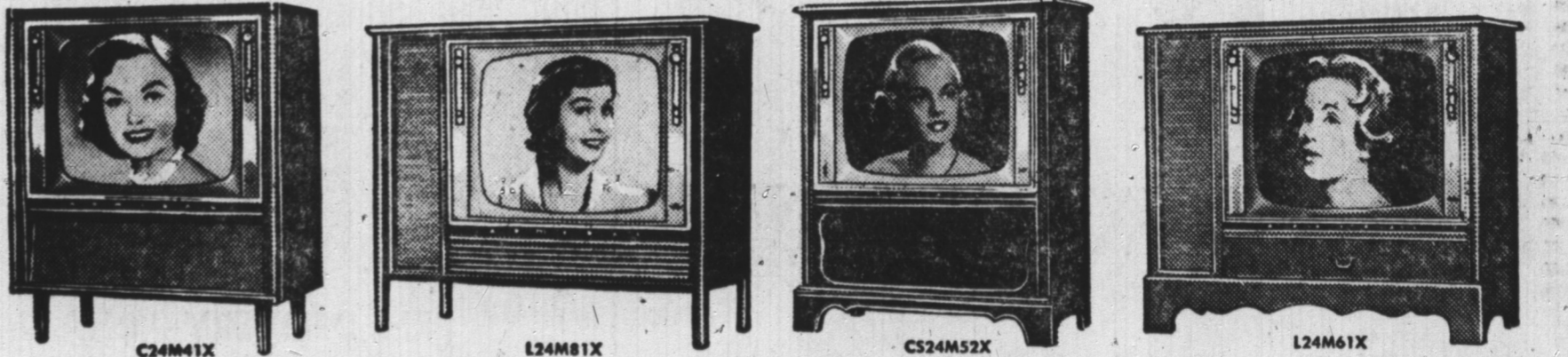
