board the boat tried to stop the
children as they began to leap into
the water.

The boat capsized and, before
stunned spectators on the beach,
the children went under the choppy
water one by one. Only four were
rescued.

INQUEST ADJOURNED

An inquest, opened at Montreal
into the tragedy, was adjourned un-
til next week. Coroner Richard L.
Duckett said "such terrible trage-
dies as this one must never be al-
lowed to happen again."

Selgman himself told reporters
he "tried to save them by lifting
them to the side of the boat."

"I hoped they would hold on, but
it was always the same," he said.
"They let go and sank back in the
water."

"I'm a father myself so you know
how I feel..."

It was the worst such tragedy
in Montreal's history.

Attlee Says

organization and settling the For-
mosa issue. He added:
"There are some hotheads — I
hope not many—who still think of
a war against Communist China
and of putting back on his throne
Chiang Kai-shek."

The history of all revolutions
shows that they are consolidated
and made more extreme by exter-
nal attack. If you rule out the
idea of all-out war against com-
munist, you come back to peace-
ful coexistence and that is what
we want in respect of Russia and
China.

On the future of the Chinese
Nationalist government, Attlee
said: "I think it is time the
leaders were pensioned off and I
believe most of the rank and file
would be glad to return to China."

URNS TO FORMOSA
Attlee deplored the fact that sug-
gestions for placing Formosa un-
der UN trusteeship were rejected.
Churchill said: "There is nothing
in the conduct of (Communist)
China which should lead the Am-
erican government to deliver For-
mosa to Communist China."

He conceded, however, that For-
mosa could eventually be placed
under UN custody.

Attlee was the lead-off speaker
in a one-day debate based on
Churchill's report Monday on his
recent Washington conference with

President Eisenhower.
Attlee described the revolution
in Guatemala as "plain aggres-
sion" and said "you cannot have
one line of aggression in Asia and
another in Central America."

**Rail Freight
Traffic During
Month Of June**

Exports forwarded from Borden
via Cape Tormentine during the
month of June showed increase of
14 cars over the corresponding per-
iod last year as shown by the
monthly traffic report of the Cana-
dian National Railways here. The
chief increase is shown in livestock
when 97 carloads were shipped as
compared to 70 during June, 1953.

Imports on the other hand were
down 130 cars, caused chiefly by
decreased shipments of autos, coal,
gas and oil, and canned goods. The
total carload shipments forwarded
from Cape Tormentine to Borden
were 1,192 compared to 1,322 for
last year.

The more important exports with
last year's figures in brackets were:
Empty barrels, 7 (3); eggs, 10 (4);
livestock, 97 (70); meats, 25 (18);
potatoes, 225 (242); miscellaneous,
18 (6); turnips, 0 (25). Totals 537
(523).

Figures for the imports were:
Autos, 49 (85); coal, 83 (93); flour
and feed, 96 (154); fertilizer, 40 (90);
gas and oil, 200 (217); lumber, 18
(24); livestock, 8 (1); sand, stone
and gravel, 40 (1); brick and
cement, 40 (37).

Of the imports, 1,003 cars were
destined to points between Char-
lottetown, Summerside and Borden,
136 to points east and south of
Charlottetown, and 53 west of Sum-
merside. Of the exports 369 cars
originated at points between Char-
lottetown, Borden and Summerside,
51 east and south of Charlottetown,

**To Take Course at
Leadership Camp**

Edward Island awarded by the
Department of Physical Educa-
tion. This award entitles Miss
White to a two weeks instruction
course at the Ontario Athletic
Leadership Camp at Longford
Mills, Ontario.
Miss White, who graduated as

A first class teacher from the
Prince of Wales College Normal
School this spring, will leave the
Province by plane this morning
for Toronto. She will go by car
from there to the camp site.

To be eligible for the course
the student must be above aver-
age ability for intramural and in-
terscholastic athletics, must be a
regular member of Grade XI
must have ranked in the upper
2/3 of her class at Christmas ex-
aminations and must have reach-
ed the age of 15 before July 1,
1954. Before taking her third year
at Prince of Wales, Miss White
had taught school for three years
which gives her the experience
necessary to get the full benefits
of such a course.

Her transportation costs to the
camp will be provided by Mc-

The aims of the course will be
carried out by means of a three
