Potato Cash Receipts Show Heavy Increase

OTTAWA — Prince Edward Island farmers continue to bask in record prosperity according to the latest report on farm cash receipts issued here by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics.
For the first six months of 1965, receipts totalled \$22,386,000 compared to \$15,564,000 for the same period in 1964 and \$12,565,000 for the first six months of 1963.
New Brunswick also had a substantial increase to \$33,351,000 from \$22,710,000 in 1964 and \$20,903,000 in 1963.
The report says that total receipts from the sale of potatoes increased very substantially from \$23,500,000 for the first six months of 1964 to \$48,600,000 for the corresponding period of 1965. Although marketings were slightly above a year-ago levels, most of the

gain is attributable to a very substantial increase in prices arising out of a short crop in the United States in 1964 and a resultant strong demand in that country for Canadian potatoes.

SPECTACULAR RISE

"The marked increase in returns from this crop is reflected in the spectacular rise in total cash receipts occurring in Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick," the bureau says.
The cash receipt from potatoes in P.E.I. alone for the first six months totals \$12,650,000 this year compared to \$6,798,000 in the first half of 1964 and \$5,329,000 in 1963.
In New Brunswick the corresponding figures are \$18,235,000 this year compared to \$8,519,000 in 1964 and \$6,565,000 in 1963.

Crown prosecutor called Dr. James L. Saunders who had examined the accused following his arrest. Dr. Saunders said Crossman was mentally ill and required rather extensive psychiatric help and treatment.
The case was then adjourned to Nov. 6.
A town man pleaded guilty to a charge of drunkenness and was fined \$20 and costs or 15 days.

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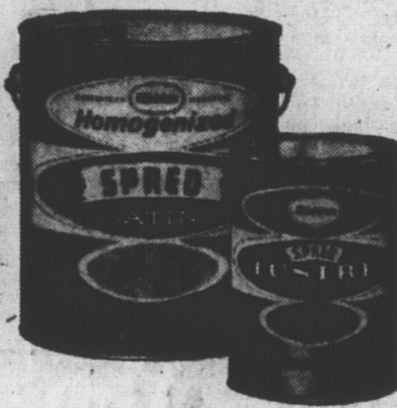
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
