That Body Of Yours

ATOMIC ENERGY BECOMING A BENEFIT TO MANKIND

No one ever wants war just to think of war's tragedies makes us feel that no good could ever come from war. However, with war has come the discovery of how to split the atom and with this great power now available, medical and dental research workers are now better equipped than ever before to fight disease.

In a News Release of the American Dental Association, we learn that atomic energy has provided new tools of research that point the way to vast new knowledge of tooth structure, dental disease and dental treatment.

There are five reports on new dental uses of radioactive materials in the current issue of the Journal of the American Dental Association which points out that research projects in the field have been completed or are in process in 17 institutions, including dental schools, the National Institute of Dental Research and Institutions of the Armed Forces. Some 21 radioactive compounds have been used in investigations.

In one of these studies reported in The Journal, dental X-rays have been taken experimentally without the use of X-ray machine. Research workers of State University, Columbia, have found radioisotopes which act as sources of radiation similar to that produced by the dental X-ray equipment.

The source of X-ray power comes from the small central part (nucleus) of certain atoms. "No vacuum tube is required and no high voltage is necessary. These nuclei, of their own accord and without any outside help whatsoever, cause the emission of X-rays whose intensity is directly proportionate to the number of nuclei present."

The scientists said that the radioactive X-ray emitters are so small they may be placed in many parts of the body, thus making it possible to obtain clearer photographs than might be obtained by the usual X-rays and to obtain photographs of portions of the body heretofore considered inaccessible for X-ray detection.

With research workers studying atomic energy for use in medicine and dentistry in all these institutions, and medical and dental schools, we can look forward to real benefits to mankind from sources which first had in mind the use of atom energy in warfare, that is, the destruction of mankind.

Important Consumers Today Are Heavy-Spending Teeners

NEW YORK, (AP)—Never underestimate the importance of a teen-ager. This is the period which has been defined as "the age when daughter knows best" when parents are mere old fogies and when the world is a big, beautiful show window of lipstick, bebop records, shirts, skirts and dance dresses.

The present era also might be known as the golden age of teens, who, with their younger sisters and brothers, now constitute one of the most important consumer groups. Since big business discovered the staggering total of school children's spending, these junior tycoons have been the object of advertising campaigns, special departments in stores, vast publishing ventures and concentrated merchandising plans designed to extract the pennies from their piggy banks.

School children in the United States are spending about \$70,000,000 a week, estimates Lester Rand, president of the Youth Research Institute. The agency specializes in surveying tastes, opinions and resources of young people.

Contract Bridge

EMBARRASSMENT OF RICHES

A great concentration of honours cards in the hand of one defender often leads to his embarrassment rather than his profit. West learned the truth in this statement in the following case:

West dealer. Both sides vulnerable.

The bidding:
West North East South
1NT Pass Pass 2♣
Dbl. Redbl Pass Pass
Pass

It may seem that North was rather rash in redoubling a contract for which he could supply only one trump, but in simple logic his action was thoroughly justified. If South could risk bidding two spades in the face of the original notrump, and without assurance that North had substantial values, then North could certainly redouble with the strength he had in the red suits, plus the king of spades, singleton though it was.

East, the unhappy possessor of a Yarborough, was very unhappy about the situation, but he felt that West might be able to defeat the contract all by himself, and also feeling that a three-heart takeout might be disastrous, East kept quiet.

West could have saved something by taking the redouble out to two notrump, thereby virtually demanding that East show his best suit, but apparently West decided to "gamble it out."

The heart Jack was the opening lead. South won with the queen and led a low spade. For some reason, West ducked. South discarded two clubs on the high hearts, then led a diamond to the jack. West took his ace and shifted to the ace and queen of clubs. South ruffed the second round and led the spade Jack. The outcome was that West took only two spade tricks, one diamond and one club, and so North-South collected a tidy total.

Jam Upside-down Shortcakes

Combine 1 lbs. soft butter or margarine, 1/2 c. thick jam, 1 lbs. lemon juice and, if desired, 1/2 c. broken nuts and divide between 8 greased individual baking dishes. Mix and sift twice, then sift into a bowl, 1 1/2 c. once-sifted pastry flour (or 1 1/2 c. once-sifted all-purpose flour), 3 tps. Magic Baking Powder, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. grated nutmeg and 1/4 c. fine granulated sugar. Cut in finely 5 tbs. chilled shortening. Combine 1 well-beaten egg, 1/2 c. milk and 1/2 tsp. vanilla. Make a well in dry ingredients and add liquids; mix lightly. Two-thirds fill prepared dishes with batter. Bake in a moderately hot oven, 375°, about 20 minutes. Turn out and serve hot with sauce or cream. Yield — 6 servings.
