

Seven Mile Bay Residence Lost In Fire Last Night

The home of Misses Alice and G. G. Pearson, Seven Mile Bay was burned to the ground around 6 o'clock last evening and the contents of the house, all personal belongings and a sum of money were also destroyed in the flames. Miss Gaudet was working in the garden at the time the fire broke out while her sister Alice lit the fire in the kitchen stove preparatory to having supper. Miss Alice went outside to get a refill of wood and when she returned she found the kitchen engulfed in flames. Several neighbours gathered quickly to render help carrying water from a nearby home. Kenneth Muttart of Sarsletown arrived on the scene with a truck which contained a large tank of water and his quick actions helped greatly in saving the outbuildings. A woodhouse nearby caught fire repeatedly and was finally pushed over by a tractor to help prevent the flames from spreading. It reported there was no insurance carried on the home.

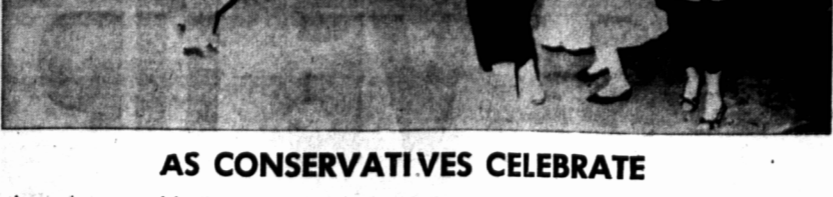

Frank McGee Has Biggest Victory

Frank C. McGee, 31-year-old newcomer in Canadian politics, came up with the most sweeping victory of any candidate in Monday's federal election. The young department store buyer, running home on the Progressive Conservative ticket, marked up a plurality of 19,906 in York-Sherbrooke, a Toronto suburban riding.

The consistency, Canada's most heavily populated, was won in the last election by Liberal Frank Enfield with a 668 plurality.

McGee's grandfather was a brother of Thomas D'Arcy McGee, one of the Fathers of Confederation. His wife, Moira, is a daughter of Gratia O'Leary, associate editor of the Ottawa Journal.

ST. LAURENT NOW FIFTH
Prime Minister St. Laurent, who led his Liberal party to victory in 1953 with a plurality of 20,104, the greatest of any candidate coast to coast, dropped to fifth place in Monday's balloting with a margin of 17,043 as the Liberal party's 22-year rule was broken by the Progressive Conservatives.

Mr. St. Laurent's plurality was topped by three other Quebec Liberals — Adrien Renaudier of Montreal Papezans with 19,767; Marcel Monette, Montreal Carier, with 17,464; and J. P. Deschatelets, Montreal Maisonneuve — Rosemont, with 17,113.

Major General Pays Visit To Summerside Air Station

Making his first visit to Prince Edward Island, Major General John M. "Rocky" Rockingham, C.B.E., D.S.O., Officer Commanding 1st Canadian Infantry Division, visited Summerside R.C.A.F. Station Tuesday, and commented on the beauty of this seaside Province on his return from a flight over the Island in a Neptune aircraft.

Major General Rockingham arrived at the air station about 9 a.m. in a Lancaster aircraft from Summerside which picked him up at Fredericton, N.B.

Group Captain W.H. Swerman, Commanding Officer of the Summerside R.C.A.F. Station greeted the Army commander at Fredericton. Accompanied him on the flight to Summerside, where Major General Rockingham expressed great interest in the Neptune aircraft used in Maritime operation as training at the Summerside Air Station.

Returning to the air in one of these anti-submarine aircraft, Major General Rockingham briefly enjoyed the experience of handling the controls of the Neptune, and when the aircraft returned to base expressed his surprise at the ease and maneuverability of the Neptune, and also his admiration of the beauty of Prince Edward Island as seen in his flight over the Province.

SIMULATED LANDING
In this flight the pilot of the aircraft, Bob Campbell, demonstrated a simulated landing procedure in a low pass over the runway before the plane landed, and on landing showed the army commander the reversible propeller feature of the aircraft which acts as a break in landing the aircraft.

Popular Vote Shows More Than 70 % Went To Polls

Canadians voted in record numbers Monday.

Almost complete tabulation by The Canadian Press shows that more than 6,166,077 voters cast ballots compared to the previous record of 5,948,766 in 1949 and 5,640,256 in 1953.

Possibly 70 or 71 per cent of eligible voters turned out compared with 67.1 per cent in 1953 and the recent high of 75.4 per cent in 1945.

The Progressive Conservative party which elected the largest group in the new House of Commons, polled 39 per cent of the vote compared to 31 per cent in 1953 and 30 per cent in 1949.

The Liberals obtained 29 per cent compared to their 49-per-cent share in 1953 and 50 per cent in 1949.

CCF candidates received 11 per cent, the same share as in 1953 in 1949 they got 13 per cent. Social credit got six per cent against five in 1953 and two in 1949.

Major General Pays Visit To Summerside Air Station

Journalist Was Well Known Here

Many friends will learn with regret that Rev. Alexander MacKay, Kensington, has received the sad news of the death of Mrs. MacKay's brother-in-law, Mr. Harry Saul, on June 3rd in a Toronto Hospital which he had entered the previous day.

As a young man Mr. Saul came from London, England to Canada going to the West where he accepted a position with the Winnipeg Free Press with which firm he worked for more than forty years. He rose to a position of responsibility and influence being National Manager of Advertising.

Some three years ago he moved to Toronto where he was employed with the Thompson Press. In newspaper circles he was known as "Dean of Advertising."

During Press Convention week in Charlottetown in October, 1955, he with his wife, came to P.E.I. where they visited many former friends and relatives.

Mr. Saul was a man of the highest integrity and of generous and kindly impulses. Though the victim of indifferent health during his later years he ever devoted himself with untiring zeal and distinction to his chosen profession.

In 1923 he was married to Miss Mary Sinclair, daughter of the late Hon. Peter Sinclair, Summerside. Besides his sorrowing widow he leaves to mourn, his passing one son, James Sinclair Saul, a Civil engineer in Toronto and a brother and sister in England.

The two ships will sail simultaneously from Borden and Cape Tormentine each day at 7:00, 8:25, 10:05, and 11:30 a.m. and at 12:50, 2:15, 3:40, 5:25, 7:30 and 9:15 p.m. These are all Atlantic Standard Times.

Last season the ferries carried a record number of passengers and motor vehicles on the crossings, and C.N.R. officials say indications are that traffic will be equally as heavy, if not heavier, this year.

The Summerside High School Home and School Association held its annual meeting at Civic Auditorium last night with the retiring president, Mr. John Leuty, in the chair.

The nominating committee, convened by Mrs. Ferno Rogers, brought in the following slate of officers for next year, and the slate was duly elected: past president, John Leuty, president, Mrs. Arthur Clark; secretary, Mrs. Colwell; treasurer, Mrs. Judson Logan; executive, Mrs. Keith Hudson and Mrs. Ben Schurman.

An offer by R.T. Holman, Ltd. that the Association help in the sale of school books in September and receive a percentage of the profit was accepted by the members of the group and a committee consisting of Ralph Judge (convenor), Mrs. Sheen, Miss Heringkirk, Mrs. Bishop and Mr. Ramsay were appointed to do the organizational work of the project.

Mr. Clarence Mercer, school supervisor, gave a talk on his recent trip to Edmonton, Alberta, where he attended a convention of supervisors from all across Canada. The speaker said he was impressed with the fact that "because we have ten types of education in Canada instead of one, the delegates to the conference seemed

to speak a different language. He said he thought it was important "that we have common goals in education, common textbooks and a system that would apply to all leaders of Canada."

At the meeting they discussed the public relations program in education, the selling of the education product to the people and also finding out what the people wanted. Mr. Mercer said the large unit of administration was discussed, and that this project was used in all provinces except Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island. The church system would interfere with such a system in Newfoundland, but he couldn't see why it would not be easier to make effective here on the Island than in the Western Provinces because of the closeness of school districts.

The speaker felt that although the system has been discussed for some years here, it seemed that the school system was lacking to bring it into effect.

The large crowd in attendance looked at very interesting displays from the art, commercial, home economic, science and industrial arts departments before the meeting was called to order.

Mr. Chiasson's music classes from Grade IV sang folk songs at intervals during the program.

Old Potatoes Menace The New

Now that potato planting is nearing completion it is a good time to consider the future health of the crop so that we may be prepared to adequately control the diseases and insects that will be encountered through the growing season, notes Weekly Potato Bulletin, No. 1.

At this time the disposal of the winter cull potatoes and the waste that has accumulated during the set-cutting period is of major importance. The piles of old potatoes found on farms, in warehouses, and in public dumps are our chief sources of field infection from late blight.

This disease develops in the neglected piles of cull potatoes and the infection is carried down the wind to the fields. In addition, many with virus diseases such as mosaic, leaf roll, and spindle tuber, and the piles serve as breeding grounds for insects, particularly the Colorado potato beetle and the flea beetle.

BURN OR BURY
It is strongly recommended that all cull potatoes be destroyed by burning or by deep burial, and that cull piles, wherever found, should be burned or sprayed with a potato root killer.

We have been advised that flea beetles are becoming numerous on the plantings in the Annapolis Valley. To control them, spray the plants with DDT, 2 pounds 50 per cent wettable powder to 100 gallons of water. When the plants are small, one nozzle per row is all that is necessary.

Damages Case Is Withdrawn

In Supreme Court, Summerside yesterday, an action for damages on the docket, in which the plaintiffs were Charles M. Hamilton and his wife Hilda G. Hamilton, formerly of Hamilton, and the defendants was the Canadian National Railways was withdrawn as this action is now in the process of settlement.

The case, which arose from a car-train accident at Albany on February 13th, 1955, was heard in Supreme Court, Summerside in June of last year, at the conclusion of which the jury returned a verdict in favour of the plaintiffs in the amount of \$4,650, the full amount of the litigation, finding the defendant negligent. The case was appealed by the C.N.R. but now the action is in the process of final settlement and notice of trial was withdrawn.
