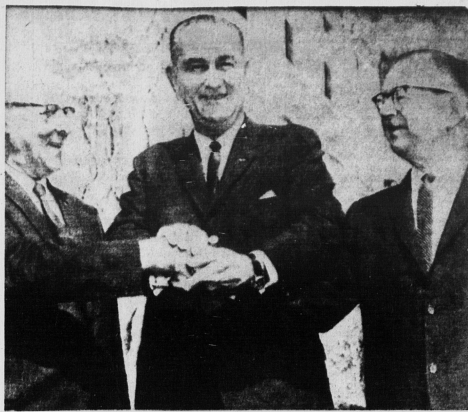


Irish Moss Plant Scheduled For Construction In Prince

Construction will begin immediately on a \$100,000 Irish moss plant in the West Prince area, it was reported yesterday. Site of the plant has not been selected but it is expected to be known within a few days. The plant which appears to have been made possible by a high degree of federal participation, is expected to be operated by the provincial government. The plant will be fully equipped with two moss, storage and boiling facilities. Cleaning and drying is an important part of the Irish moss operation and this facility has been lacking here previously. The fisherman will take his moss to the plant, where, for a small fee it will be cleaned and baled. The fisherman will then sell his moss wherever he desires. A second plant will probably be started within a year. The West Prince plant is due to be operation by next September. Construction of the plant has been advocated at hearings in the west Prince area last fall.

Rail Service Improvement Considered

CAPITAL BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN OTTAWA — The Canadian National Railway is currently giving consideration to improvements in its rail service to Prince Edward Island.

Transport Minister J. W. Pickersgill revealed this in a Commons in replying to a written question from Heath Macquarrie, MP for Queens.

He said that no discussions have been held with the CNR concerning the resumption of sleeping car service to and from Charlottetown.

However, the question of train service to and from the Island has been given special attention, particularly in view of the centennial celebrations this year. "Consideration is currently being given to improvement in available train services which would benefit the majority of rail travellers to and from Prince Edward Island," Mr. Pickersgill replied.

S'ide Budget Is Delayed

SUMMERSIDE — The Summerside Town Council annual budget meeting originally scheduled for last evening was postponed to a later date, probably Monday, when the council was unable to conclude a consensus meeting with respect to the great Jeep hunt because he was convinced it had nothing to do with the case.

He said he would not form an alliance with either the Liberals or CCF.

The CCF continued to show strength in Saskatchewan and Regina, two of Saskatchewan's largest cities, but rural support fell off.

Four of Saskatchewan's five seats went to the CCF. The Regina riding elected five CCF members and one Liberal. Both cities got two additional seats under redistribution.

CCF candidate Walter Szabek won Regina East over Paul Dolack, Westerns Football Conference referee who ran as a Liberal. An unofficial count had given the seat to Mr. Dolack Wednesday night.

Liberals formed their 11st government in 1964.



Tangled Search For Jeep Reported At Coffin Probe

MONTREAL (CP) — The Coffin inquiry attempted Thursday to follow the tangled search for a Jeep that may or may not have been in the vicinity when three United States bear hunters were killed in the Gaspé Peninsula in 1953.

John MacLean, former Toronto newspaper man, testified the hunt was motivated by Wilbert Coffin's testimony during a coroner's inquest into the killings that he saw a Jeep bearing Pennsylvania licence plates in mid-June when the hunters were shot.

He covered the inquest and Coffin's preliminary hearing. The former Toronto Telegram reporter said the next step was a meeting in the fall of 1953 with Pennsylvania mining engineer Theodore Arnold in Montreal during a family funeral.

The witness said Mr. Arnold told him a Jeep bearing Maine and Pennsylvania licence plates was stolen from him in June while he was working at Juniper River, N.B. — about 110 miles from the site of the slaying.

HEARD NO MORE Mr. MacLean said he heard nothing more about it until he received a letter from Mr. Arnold during the summer of 1954, containing dates and names of persons working for him the previous year.

The newspaper sent him to Perce, the location of Coffin's trial on a charge of murdering one of the hunters, in July to get in touch with Raymond Maher, a defence lawyer. He and Mr. Maher had obtained the approximate dates from persons in the area when the Jeep was seen.

Mr. MacLean said he and Mr. Maher left the trial in Montreal in the hands of Francis Gavel.

For three days, the witness said he and Mr. Maher traveled 125 miles before becoming convinced the Jeep could not have been in the Perce area at the time of the killings.
