Saturday Night's Meeting

Councillor Murphy Explains About the Market Hall.

Forceful Speeches by G. W. DeBlois and Malcolm McLeod, Esquires.

DR. JENKINS presided over the large meeting held in Market Hall on Saturday evening.

McLEOD AND BLAKE addressed their supporters on the issues of election day and the gratifying results of their canvass.

WILLIAM MURPHY, Esq., in response to repeated calls, came forward and indignantly repelled the false assertion that an advantage had been taken of the supporters of MORRIS AND PETERS in the letting of Market Hall for this particular evening.

Before the Oppositionists thought of obtaining the Hall, he had secured it, on application to Councillor Chappelle. The letting of it to the Oppositionists by the City Clerk was a mistake; and this they knew full well.

GEORGE W. DEBLOIS, Esq., delivered a very spirited, stirring and eloquent address on current topics. Mr. DeBlois never appeared to better advantage on the platform; and his speech was repeatedly applauded.

MALCOLM McLEOD, Esq., Q.C., having been called to the front delivered one of the ablest and most forcible speeches of the contest, in favor of the abolition of the Legislative Council, economical Government and McLEOD AND BLAKE. Mr. McLeod having achieved eminence at the Bar, will have no difficulty in establishing a reputation as one of the best popular speakers in this country.

REV. S. C. LAWSON delivered a very vigorous speech.

Taxationist Meeting.

THE Taxationists of this city, on Saturday night, held what was intended to be a mass meeting, in Citizen's Skating Rink. Various attractions were advertised. The band of the 82nd Battalion in uniform was in attendance, and the galleries were reserved for ladies. Notwithstanding all this, what the Taxationists expected to be their Grand Mass Rally—entertainment dwindled to the insignificant of a committee meeting. It was presided over by Hon. D. Davies. Speeches, if we may be permitted to use the term, were delivered by the candidates, Messrs. Peters and Morris; Wm. Welch, G. W. Miller, J. W. Pickard, F. L. Hazard, D. Farquharson, J. Sutherland, Wm Stewart, A. B. Warburton and P. Connolly, Esq's. A resume of speeches which consisted, as these did, of bald and, in many cases, untruthful statements, would be out of place at this late hour. Suffice to say, they fell flat upon their hearers, and the monotony was only relieved by the music of the band and the laughter which greeted some of the most ridiculous assertions. The meeting broke up shortly after ten o'clock, with cheers for the candidates, the ladies, L. H. Davies and the Queen.
