## SURPRISE IN THE UNITED STATES

### Over English Comment on the Commission

#### LATELY HELD BETWEEN CANADA AND UNITED STATES

Washington Officers Say that Canadians are to Blame.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

WASHINGTON, May 12.—The statements in the papers of London and Canada respecting the reasons for the recent failure of negotiations with Canada have occasioned much surprise in the official world of Washington.

These statements assume that the Canadians made all the offers of concession to the United States Commissioners standing by existing conditions.

The facts as understood here are directly contrary to that view. Indeed if the opinion in well informed circles here is well founded nearly every offer of concession proceeded from the side of the United States, the Alaska boundary excepted.

In fact it is universally believed here that a distinct offer of concession for the settlement came almost wholly from the United States commissioners.

### FRENCH CABINET CRISIS.

Foreshadowed by the Withdrawal of DeFreycinet.

LONDON, May 12.—The Paris correspondent of the Daily News says there is no doubt that the withdrawal of M. DeFreycinet from the Ministry of War is the beginning of the end of the Dupuy cabinet.

The correspondent predicts that the Prime Minister will resign in three or four weeks, seeking defeat on some significant question,—because to fail on the Dreyfus question would mean the end of his political career.

M. Dupuy recognizes that when the tremendous shifting of opinion which will evidently follow the revision of the Dreyfus case occurs, the Chamber of Deputies will never forgive his obstruction of revision to the last.

### Fire in an Austrian Town.

VIENNA, May 12.—In a great fire yesterday, in the town of Gura, Humora, province of Bukowina, 200 buildings including principal churches, town hall and other public offices and all school houses, were burned.
