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HOUSEHOLD HINT

If you want lobster or shrimp to emerge with full flavor after cooking, be sure to keep the water just simmering; don't let it boil rapidly. You can make your own padded hangers to prevent creases in silk or crepe dresses. Just sew old shoulder pads around the ends of the hanger. In open bookshelves, dusting can be minimized by cutting a piece of transparent plastic or film to fit over the top of the row and tuck under the outer cover at each end.

She was addressing the public relations conference during the annual general meeting of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association.
