Score 7-2 Victory In Rugged Game To Open Season Here

Murph Chamberlain's Charlottetown Islanders, newcomers to the Maritime Senior Hockey League, swamped Moncton Hawks 7-2 to take their second win in as many starts, before a capacity crowd at the Forum last night.

The Islanders, coached by the old hardrock in a fast, rugged brand of play, jumped into a 3-1 lead in the opening period and from there on couldn't be stopped.

The second period, which saw each team score a solo marker, was marred by a brief free-for-all which resulted in a major for Walter Pawlynshyn of Islanders and a two-minute term for Frank (Iodine) Imonti of Hawks.

Hawks were sharper on their play-making in the middle frame but a staunch Islanders defence held them at bay while teammates continued to pepper the Moncton nets from close range.

Bucko Trainor scored what was probably the slickest goal of the night, a solo effort at 10:30 of the second frame. He came in on goalie Les Colvin and pulled him out before slipping the rubber across the line. Hawks were a man short at the time, Blackburn having gone off for high-sticking.

Fireworks broke out for the second time of the night after Charlottetown scored goal number seven at 15:05 of the final frame.

Practically every man on the ice squared off with an opposing player and when the smoke of battle cleared there were in the penalty box serving misconduct penalties: Vitale, Blackburn and Pawlynshyn.

Colvin continued his outstanding work and except for his brilliance the Islanders victory would have been more lopsided. He handled 47 shots during the night while his opposite number was called on to work on 18.

In the opening frame Moncton, led by their best working line of Dalton Barkwell, John Morrow and Mike Demchuck, carried the play into their opponents' end for the first couple of minutes. But it was not long before the Islanders took control with Danny Horeck opening the scoring at 7:31 on a smart three-man attack from centre ice with Frank Bathgate and Johnny Horeck. Continuing to hammer away at an overworked Les Colvin in the Moncton cage, Danny rapped in his second of the night on a power attack with Bathgate and George McLagan.

Playing a man short on two occasions during the remainder of the frame, the Islanders continued to take the play away from the Hawks, the smooth-working line of Trainor, Pawlynshyn and Favaro were the combination that sent the score to 3-0. It was a classy passing attack by the trio, with Pawlynshyn potting it from close in. Sparked by Imonti and Morrow, Dalton Barkwell came up with Hawks' lone tally of the frame at 18:29, on a well-manoeuvred play around the net.

Moncton took the initiative again in the opening minutes of the second period, and came up with their best performance in that frame. Blackburn, getting a penalty for high-sticking at the ten minute mark, was the signal for the Islanders to start their scoring. Bucko Trainor, who was outstanding on the ice for the locals all night, sent the score to 4-1 with a classy solo effort. Taking the puck from just outside the opposing blue line, Trainor sailed right in on Colvin, pulled him out and slipped it in.

A near riot broke out shortly after that when Pawlynshyn and Imonti tangled, and before it was over nearly every player on the ice was into it, with referees George Mallinson and Jackie Kane really having their hands full to break it up and restore order. Pawlynshyn got five fighting and Imonti two minutes for roughing. Morrow and Barkwell again teamed up for Moncton's only other tally of the night, the former potting it at the end of a neat two-man attack from the blue line in, leaving the score standing at 4-2.

A Rough Session
Starting a man short as the result of a penalty to Vitale in the closing seconds of the second period for charging, the third period developed into a really rough and ready session with four misconducts and four other penalties being handed out.

Skating the Hawks ragged, the Islanders snapped in two more goals before the twelve minute mark had been reached on smart efforts by a Johnny Horeck, Bathgate, Conway combination. Horeck and Bathgate splitting the goals and

St. Mary's Come From Behind To Take 3-2 Victory Over Beavers

HALIFAX, Oct. 17 — (CP) — Halifax St. Mary's, defending champions of the Maritime Senior Hockey League, edged Saint John Beavers 3-2 here tonight to take their first win in two starts this season.

In a rough and wide-open game which featured five first period penalties, the Saints came from behind a 2-0 deficit racked up by the New Brunswickers in the first period to tie it in the second and go on to victory in the closing minutes of the finale.

Big Paul Platz, who performed last season in the Cape Breton loop, sent Beavers into the scoring column at 18:37 on a three-way play with Tommy Brennan and Gordie Armstrong.

Then, little more than a minute later, Armstrong went in on Angus (Sonny) MacDonald and flashed the red light again to send Beavers ahead 2-0.

Up to that time it had been a rough, close-checking game which saw MacDonald and his opposing goal-tender, Dennis Brodeur, take the spotlight.

Saints recovered their eye in the second period and came out fast with Gordie Miller sinking his first of two markers of the night at 2:41.

Red Conrad added another at 9:04 to make it a tie and then the two teams resumed their close-checking game.

The goalies continued to star in the closing period but Miller was again successful in pushing the rubber past Brodeur.

MacDonald, two-time all-star goalie playing against his former team-mates, pulled off a number of sensational saves in the closing seconds as Beavers sent four forwards on the attack in an effort to collect the equalizer.

Peanuts McLaughlin of Saints and Tommy Brennan, a team-mate last year but now with Beavers, came close to blows in the third period, but were separated before doing enough damage to call for penalties.

Saints Defeat P. W. C. 8-0 In Rugby Opener

Led by a smooth working backfield, that was sparked by the sensational playing of Arnold Murphy, Saint Dunstan's University second team walloped the Prince of Wales rugby squad 8-0 in a one-sided rugby encounter yesterday afternoon at the S. D. U. gridiron before a cheering college student crowd of fans.

The win gives the Saints a one game lead in the best two out of three series for the Island Intermediate rugby championship.

The Saints started out on the offensive at the start of the game and kept the P. W. C. team hemmed inside their half of the field for nearly the whole first half of the game. But it was not until about the ten minute mark of the game that the Saints could break through the stiff P. W. C. defence. They opened the scoring when Arnold Murphy inside three-quarter man on the winners' team booted a penalty kick from thirty-five yards out to split the uprights and give his team a 2-0 lead.

The Saints tried time and time again to cross the P. W. C. line but the stiff defence the City collegians threw up against them was too much for the S. D. U. team to break. Short gaining runs and good punting kept the winners at bay in the first half which ended with Saints leading 2-0.

The Saints again took to the offensive in the second half with a few sprinkling of the S. D. U. line when the red and blue team did make a threat. First score of the half was when the Saints backfield started a long run and when the losers tried to stop the attack Cliff Bernard raced after a fumbled ball and fell on it as the pigskin rolled into the P. W. C. goal line. Murphy's attempt to make the convert failed when the high wind blew his boot back although it seemed headed in the right direction.

The game was nearly over when the Saints made their final score of the game in a scrum on the P. W. C. ten yard line, the P. W. C. team started their backfield working only to see Murphy intercept a pass and race fifteen yards to touchdown territory. His attempt to make the convert again failed but once more he made a good bid with his educated toe.

The P. W. C. team although hemmed inside their half of the field for the greater part of the game put up a spirited fight against the Saints but they could not get the ball from their scrum to start any really serious threats.

Dr. Frank Jelks handled the game and turned in a good performance as he kept the game under control all the time. Linemen were Pete Dunphy and Jack MacRae while the timer was Lt-Col. W. J. MacDonald.

SYDNEY, N. S., Oct. 17 — (CP) — Playing coach Bill Dinning, goalie Nick Pidsodny and centre Alex Birukow will be on the side lines tomorrow night when Sydney Millionaires will be at home to Charlottetown Islanders in an exhibition game which will open the hockey season here.

Pidsodny is playing for the Maritime champions for his second season, Birukow for his third.

Some of Bill Dinning's new club have had six drills here, but some of the late comers have been on the blades on only two or three occasions.

Angus MacDonald, who played brilliantly in the cage for the Junior Millionaires last season, will replace Pidsodny.

Dinning will use holdover Ron Matthews, newcomers Eddie Marchant and Lurie May on defence, and it is likely that the popular Don McRae will be moved back to blueline patrol.

Forwards slated for action are Cliff Roache, Bob Whalen, Dunc McIntyre, Whip Bonness, Bruce Gallagher, Fred Hilderbrand, Mac Beaton, all from last year's team; Wally Black, Don Berry, Bill Cupolo and Ray Mayer, who took his first turn on the blades yesterday.

Fusari Favored In Bout With Pellone Tonight

CHICAGO, Oct. 17 — (CP) — Charlie Fusari, who failed in a shot at Ray Robinson's welterweight crown Aug. 9, is a 3 to 1 favorite over his one-time conqueror, Tony Pellone, in their 10-rounder at Chicago Stadium tomorrow night.

Former milkman Fusari dropped a decision to Pellone in their only previous meeting three years ago. Both have been boxing professionally since 1944 and Fusari held a 45-win streak before Pellone whipped him over 10 rounds at New York City on June 13, 1947.

Charlie, Sicilian-born scrapper from Irvington, N. J., has an overall record of 62 victories and only seven losses. Pellone, a milling New Yorker, has 41 wins and 16 defeats.
