

Tornadoes Interrupt Tilts; Only Two Contests Played

Ten wind-driven home runs, three by Roger Repoz of New York Yankees, cleared the fences in the only two Florida games played Monday as tornadoes whipped through major league baseball camps in the South.

The Yankees nipped Cincinnati Reds 10-9. Lou Clinton's two-run single capping a ninth-inning rally, and two homers by Curt Blefary led Baltimore Orioles past Washington Senators 6-4 in the only Florida games.

Two Chicago Cubs pitchers blanked California Angels 4-0 at Las Vegas, Nev., and Cleveland Indians whipped Los Angeles Dodgers 7-2 at Mesa, Ariz.

FOUR CANCELLED

The Houston-Pittsburgh, Minnesota-Kansas City, St. Louis, Chicago White Sox, Boston-New York Mets and Atlanta-Philadelphia games were victims of the Florida storm.

Gordie Coleman and John Edwards homered for Cincinnati, which led the Yankees 9-7 going into the last of the ninth despite Repoz's three blasts.

Clete Boyer's pinch double, Ruben Amaro's single and Horace Clarke's double produced one New York run and, after an intentional walk to Roy White,

Clinton singled home the tying and winning runs.

Blefary's two homers and one by Boog Powell paced the Orioles, offsetting Washington home runs by Willie Kirkland and Bob Chance.

All 10 homers in the two Florida games went over right field fences, aided by extremely heavy winds.

Ernie Broglio of the Cubs held California to three hits through seven innings and Ted Abernathy completed the shutout with two hitless innings. Catcher Chris Krug paced the Chicago attack with four hits and three RBIs.

Leon Wagner and Max Alvis each drove in two runs as Cleveland topped the Dodgers behind the strong pitching of Sam McDowell. The American League strikeout king last season fanned seven and yielded one run on five hits in the first six innings.

The Houston Astros training site at Coca was damaged, three exhibition games were washed out, and high winds and rain hit other camps.

Astro officials reported several light poles at the stadium were knocked down and windows were broken in the recreation building.

Houston's game against Pittsburgh Pirates at Fort Myers was rained out, along with the Minnesota Twins - Kansas City Athletics match at Bradenton and the St. Louis Cardinals-Chicago White Sox game at Sarasota.

Strong winds and heavy rain hit the Winter Haven camp of Boston Red Sox, but there was no damage. There also was considerable rain at Tampa, where Cincinnati Reds train, and at St. Petersburg, training site for the New York Mets.

Rousseau, Mikita Get \$500 Apiece

MONTREAL (CP)—Ron Andrews, National Hockey League publicist, said Monday the league will award identical amounts of \$500 to Bobby Rousseau of Montreal Canadiens and Chicago Black Hawks' Stan Mikita for their tie finish in second spot in the individual scoring race.

Rousseau and Mikita were second to Bobby Hull of Chicago with 78 points on identical records of 30 goals and 43 assists. Hull set a record, finishing the season with 97 points on 54 goals and 43 assists.

Hull won \$1,000 for finishing in first and \$1,000 for being the leading scorer in each half of the season.

Jean Beliveau of Canadiens scored an equal 42 points in the second half to Hull, but he will receive \$250 as runner-up because the Chicago winger outscored him 22 goals to 17 in the final 35 games.

While Montreal's Yezina Trophy duo of Gump Worsley and Charlie Hodge earned themselves a total of \$1,250 for their best goals-against record on the season and their best second-half performance, the league will award an equal \$500 to Toronto Maple Leafs and Chicago netminders, who finished with the same 187 goals against.

Charlottetown Juveniles Overwhelm St. Lamberts

The Charlottetown Minor Hockey Association Juveniles taking advantage of a weak St. Lambert defense, superior skating ability and the weariness of the St. Lambert club whipped the visitors from Quebec 11-4 in the first game of the Eastern Canadian Juvenile Invitational Championships at the Charlottetown Forum last evening.

Charlottetown rammed home six goals in the first period before the visitors got squared away (they led 6-1 at the end of the first) and then went on to outscore the CSA club 5-3 in the final two sessions. However St. Lambert looked to be much better organized in the final periods and many fans are expecting a close game this evening.

Over 1300 fans squeezed their way into the Forum and saw the island team dominating the play from start to finish.

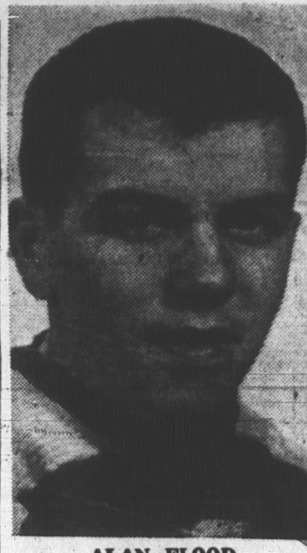
Alan Flood who had three goals which counted (he got a fourth which was called back) led the winners while linemates Bob Whitlock had two and Bob Doherty one. Herman MacQuaid banged home two goals in the third period and other markers were recorded by Bill LeClair, Jim MacDougall and Paul Stanley. For St. Lamberts John Murray, Denis Charbonneau and Bob Arraham had singletons.

John Reid in the Charlottetown nest played a sensational game in keeping the visitors to four goals as he stopped a number of breakaways and other difficult challenges.

Saint Lamberts, playing their second game in as many days only with close to a thousand miles of travel in between experienced the full brunt of the Charlottetown attack in the opening minutes of play as the locals scored two goals in the first three minutes, only one of which how was counted. Bobby Whitlock, out for the first time, took a pass from Bob Doherty on the far left wing and streaking in behind the defense bladed a smoking slapshot ankle high, tucked in the far corner.

At about the four minute mark Charlottetown scored again after they had controlled the play in the Montreal end for a period of time. However the marker by Bill MacKinnon was called back after referee Art Perry ruled that the puck had been kicked in. In the meantime the St. Lambert team trying to use a long clearing pass through the center style of play had come up with two breakaways that Reid had blocked with brilliant moves.

Richard Willing; Francis Indignant

NEW YORK (CP)—Maurice (Rocket) Richard, former Montreal Canadiens ace, is reported willing to coach New York Rangers, who finished in the National Hockey League basement this year.

Journalist American Hockey writer Stan Fischler quotes Richard as saying in Montreal, in a telephone interview, that he'd take on the Rangers job "if I receive the right offer."

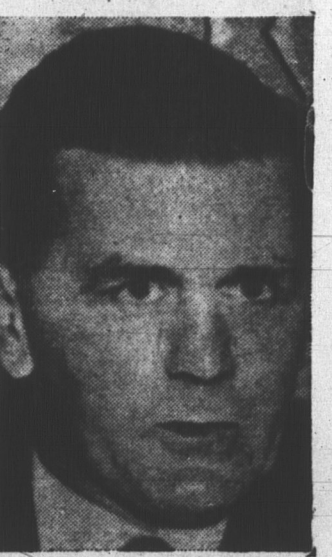
Fischler also says a friend of the Rocket—unnamed—stated Richard would take the job for \$20,000 a year.

"I'd move down to New York from my home in Montreal if the Rangers made it attractive for me," Richard is quoted as telling Fischler. "Now I'm waiting for the offer."

Rangers lost 4-1 to the Canadiens here Sunday night to finish the season with one of the worst records in the club's 40-year history. Their 18 victories, 41 losses and 11 ties left the Rangers in the cellar for the first time since 1960.

Emile Francis, a lilt-sized ex-goalkeeper, has been both general manager and coach of the Rangers, taking up the coaching reins after Red Sullivan was transferred to scouting duties during the season.

Francis has been reported considering Jack Grodon, his assistant general manager as coach.

NEW YORK (CP)—Emile Francis, general manager-coach of New York Rangers, said Monday night the National Hockey League team has not approached Maurice (Rocket) Richard to serve as coach.

Francis, diminutive former NHL goalkeeper, was commenting on a report by Stan Fischler, Journal-American hockey writer, that Richard would be available as Ranger coach if sufficient money is offered.

Fischler quoted a friend of Rocket—unnamed—as saying the former Montreal Canadian ace would take the job for \$20,000 a year.

Sherbrooke, Quebec To Host World Waterskiing Title

MONTREAL (CP)—The city of Sherbrooke, Que., 100 miles southeast of Montreal, will play host to the 10th world water ski championships Aug. 28-Sept. 3, 1967.

The event is the centennial sports project of the Canadian Water Ski Association. The championships are expected to attract about 160 top names in the sport from more than 40 countries.

Mayor Armand Nadeau of Sherbrooke announced at a press conference here today that the city will donate \$35,000 to the cause and in addition will build a chalet at a cost

of \$100,000 as a headquarters for the championship.

Designed by Peter M. Acres, a Montreal architect, the new building will be located in Sherbrooke's Jacques Cartier Park on the shore of the Magog River, which flows through the heart of the city.

The chalet will be completed this year in time for the Canadian water ski championships, scheduled for Aug. 27-28.

CENTRE SEEMS IDEAL

Mayor Nadeau said the new structure will serve as an ideal centre for various seasonal activities, in addition to its use for the 1966 and 1967 championships.

The week-long centennial tournament is expected to draw a minimum of 100,000 spectators.

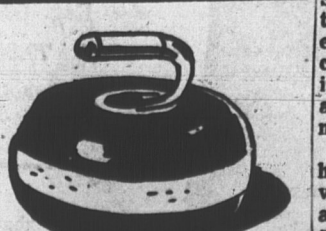
Clint Ward, chairman of the organizing committee for the 1967 project, said a budget of \$200,000 has been set for the event. Half of this amount, which does not include the cost of the building, had already been raised.

Athletes competing will be housed at the University of Sherbrooke, and a large part of the budget will go to cover their expenses while visiting this country, Ward said. The organization already had the tentative approval of the federal centennial commission.

Negotiations are under way to have the championships televised on a world-wide basis, he added.

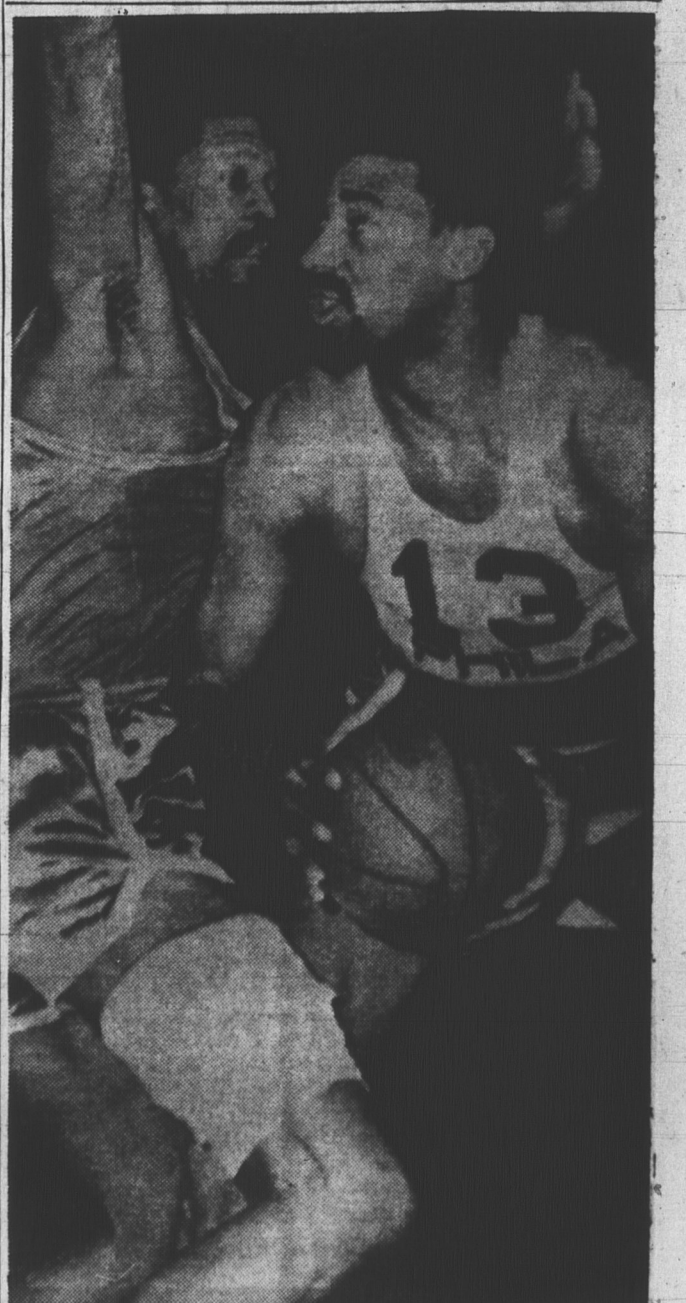

CBC Releases NHL Schedule

TORONTO (CP)—The CBC released Monday a partial schedule of the Stanley Cup semi-final games which will be carried live on its television network.

All night games will begin at 8:30 p.m. EST, 30 minutes after the opening faceoff. The only afternoon game on Sunday, April 10, between Chicago Black Hawks and Detroit Red Wings, will be carried at 3 p.m. EST, 30 minutes after the opening faceoff.

The other four games are between Toronto Maple Leafs and Montreal Canadiens. The dates for these games are April 7, 9, 12 and 14.

A further schedule of telecasts of semi-final games will be released as the two series progress. Both series open Thursday with Chicago as host to Detroit and Toronto visiting the Canadiens.

Mahovlich, Stanley To Play

TORONTO (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs expect to have left winger Frank Mahovlich and defenceman Allan Stanley ready for action when they open their Stanley Cup semi-final series Thursday night in Montreal against the Canadiens.

Mahovlich, Toronto's top scorer with 32 goals and 56 points in the regular schedule this season, missed last week-end's games because of fluid on the knee.

But manager-coach Punch Imlach said he will be ready Thursday.

Stanley, sidelined with pulled ligaments in his right knee, has been skating for 10 days and said the knee does not bother him. The 40-year-old veteran of 17 NHL seasons has been a mainstay of the Toronto defence.

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
