The sixtieth annual meeting of the P.E. Island Diocesan Board of the Women's Auxiliary of the Anglican Church of Canada was convened Monday afternoon in the Parish Hall of St. Peter's Cathedral, with the president, Mrs. W. E. Champion presiding.

Following prayer and roll call, address of welcome was given by Mrs. George Rogers, which was replied to by Mrs. Eric Lowther. Reports were received from Mrs. R. Jenkins, Recording Secretary and the acting Correspondence Secy., Mrs. A. H. Peake which were duly approved.

Mrs. W. E. Champion in submitting her address as President referred to the great honour and privilege to have the Dominion President, Mrs. Britton Osler as guest speaker. Reviewing some of the highlights of the past year, the President referred to the increased pledge of ten per cent which had been fully met, and the Girls' Auxiliary which soared from fifteen in two branches to 71 members in six branches. The attendance of Mrs. Constance Purser, on furlough from Japan at the first festival of the G.A. and J.A. held in May was referred to with satisfaction. The Ring of Honour Girls impressive service in St. Peter's Cathedral marked the starting of the Festival.

HISTORICAL REVIEW

"Through the years" 1897-1957, was the subject of an address by Miss Margaret Cotton who drew largely from an address by Mrs. Simpson in 1921 for the early history of the organization. "Clerical and lay delegates from Nova Scotia and P.E. Island attending a three-day conference in Charlottetown in the autumn of 1897, aroused the interest of a number of women, who approached the presiding Bishop (Courtney) to allow them to form a branch of the W.A. which society was then just twelve years old.

He appointed a committee from St. Paul's and St. Peter's to draw up a constitution and to organize parochial branches in the Island. These women were, from St. Paul's, Mrs. Bryan, Mrs. F. L. Hazard, Mrs. D. Davies, Mrs. Hobkirk, Mrs. Longworth, Mrs. Fitzgerald, Mrs. W. W. Clarke; and from St. Peter's, Mrs. Bayfield, Mrs. W. H. Stewart, Mrs. T. J. Harris and Miss Rosa Stewart. These have all passed to their rest, but their names have been lovingly and gratefully inscribed in our Book of Remembrance," Miss Cotton said.

Mrs. Bryan was elected the first president of the new Diocesan Board in 1898 and the motto chosen "As the servants of Christ doing the will of God from the heart."
