AGRICULTURAL NEWS

P.E.I. Department of Agriculture

THE ROYAL VISIT

The 4-H Club Members will be all sitting together on July 30th, in the Coliseum on the occasion of the visit of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth. Your presence with the other 4-H Clubbers will be an indication of how proud you are to be associated with your Club activities. If you have not notified your adult leader as to whether you are going to be able to join with the other members please do so immediately. We would request that all adult leaders notify the Provincial Office at P.O. Box 202, Charlottetown as soon as possible.

A Committee of three, Miss Theresa MacLeod, Miss Audrey MacMillan and Dr. George C. Fisher was recently named by the Minister of Agriculture, Mr. Cullen, to make all the local arrangements.

HERD VARIATIONS

It is well known that different breeds of cows vary in their production of butter fat as well as milk. Jerseys are usually given credit for the richest milk, although other breeds often give in their average quantity of milk and sometimes in the total amount of butter fat. Guernseys, Ayrshires, Brown Swisses, Shorthorns and Holsteins will average varying percentages of butter fat. Holsteins ordinarily will produce the largest quantities of milk, but butter fat percentages usually run lower than the other breeds.

The thing that is not always considered, however, is that different cows of the same breed vary widely in the quality of their milk. The introduction of a number of new animals into the herd is almost sure to affect the test. Likewise the retirement of certain cows will have a bearing. With cows continually coming in as they do in many regulated herds, the test is falling dry, there will inevitably be variations in test.

COWS VARY

Milk from the same cow will vary considerably throughout the year during different stages of lactation. The tests from a given cow is usually higher during the first few weeks after freshening. This is particularly true if the cow is in the best condition at the time of calving. After the excess body fat is dissipated, butter fat content of the milk becomes lower until later in the lactation period when the butter fat percentage tends to rise as the milk flow decreases.

SENSITIVE COWS

Producers of butter fat are often perturbed because of variations in the tests of milk or cream under what seems to be the same conditions. At a matter of fact dairy plants have been known to lose patrons because of these variations. Because patrons have felt that their products were incorrectly tested.

STORM AND NOISES

The same tendency is noticeable if cows are excited by dogs, or in any way excited during milking time. Storms, loud noises, strange quarters or any unusual circumstances are likely to affect butter fat test.

SEASONAL FLUCTUATIONS

The butter fat content of milk is higher during the cold than during the warm months. Tests are usually highest in December and January reaching the low level in June and July. Milk tends to test higher for a short time when cows are first turned out to pasture in the spring, although this is attributable to change in feeding rather than the season.

STOP WHEAT IMPORTS

BELGRADE (Reuters) - Yugoslavia will stop all imports of American and Soviet wheat next year, after an expected record-breaking crop this summer, the Yugoslav government announced Monday. Vice-President Miljko Todovic, told parliament it is expected the harvest will produce 4,000,000 tons, 18 per cent more than 1957, the last bumper year.

RE. PERMITS-TO-TEACH SCHOOL

School Boards unable to procure the service of a regularly licensed teacher may now negotiate with persons having educational qualifications of Grade XI or better to teach for the school year 1959-60.

Application forms may be obtained from the Supervisor of Schools concerned, who must approve the application before a Permit-to-Teach will be issued by the Department of Education.

A short course in Teaching Methods and School Administration will be given at Prince of Wales College, July 20 - 31, 1959 for those to whom Permits-to-Teach will be issued for the first time. This course will not be a credit towards a teacher's license.

Students with educational qualifications of Grade XII or better should inquire from the Department of Education regarding the financial assistance available to those who desire to qualify for a teacher's license by completing the regular course for teachers-in-training at the Provincial Normal School, Prince of Wales College. Applications for both grant and loan may be made after enrolment in the teacher training course in September.
