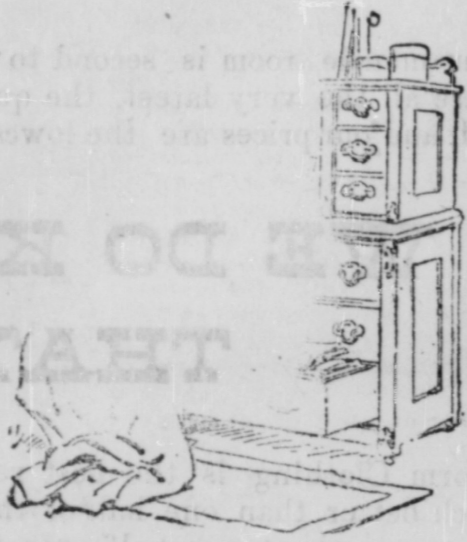

MARIA THERESA LOST FOREVER.

Goes Down in Two Hundred Fathoms

WHILE ON HER WAY TO NORFOLK NAVY YARD.

The Crew of the Vessel All Safely Rescued.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

CHARLESTON, S. C., Nov. 7.—Lieut-Commander Norris arrived here last night on the wrecking tug Meritt, with the officers and crew of the Maria Theresa, the former Spanish warship that had been raised and was on her way to the Norfolk navy yard, and reports that the vessel sunk about thirty miles north of San Salvador, on Tuesday, in a terrible gale.

All hands lost their personal effects. The vessel sank thirty miles off Watling Island at midnight on Tuesday, in two hundred fathoms of water, after battling with the gale for six hours.

Parts of the hull which were thought to be safe became weakened, broke, and the water made rapidly in the holds. The boilers began to give way, and finally extinguished the fires in the engine rooms. The pumps would not work. The vessel showed signs of collapse, and the men stood stripped awaiting orders to quit the ship.

The Merrit rescued 114 of the crew, which was made up of volunteers. The Maria Theresa rapidly filled.

Some Seal Skins.

OTTAWA, Nov. 5.—The Department of Marine and Fisheries has obtained complete returns of the season's sealing catch by the British Columbia fleet. The total catch has been 27,425 skins. The total coast catch was 10,955, and the Behring Sea catch, 17,370.

Prussian Elections.

BERLIN, Nov. 5.—The elections of Prussian Deputies by the secondary electors, so far as known, show that Radicals have an increase of 15 seats at the expense of the Conservatives and National Liberals. In Berlin the Radicals have had a complete walk over, nine of their candidates being elected, among them Professor Virchow, the celebrated pathologist.

CRISIS THREATENED.

In the Newfoundland Cabinet.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Nov. 7.—There is a serious cabinet crisis in Newfoundland.

Sir Herbert Murray the Governor, demands the resignation of Morine, Minister of Finance. The ostensible reason is that Morine is general counsel of Reid, the railway contractor, but the real reason is the continued friction between Governor Murray and the Minister. It is feared complications will arise wrecking the cabinet and seriously prejudicing the negotiations regarding the French Shore Treaty, and the conference for settlement of disputes between United States and Canada.

The Mail Service.

OTTAWA, Nov. 7.—The difficulty between the Allans and the Government in regard to the winter service is chiefly over the day of departure from Liverpool.

The steamship companies ask permission to leave port on Saturdays, but the department insists that the customary day be adhered to.

The regular mails for Canada via New York are up for White Star vessels leaving on Saturday; by retaining Tuesdays for direct service, Canada gets three mails per week from Liverpool.

If the department accepted the view of the contractors, the latter would be drawing pay for carrying practically only parcels and newspaper packages, as a great majority of the letters would be sent via New York.

Unfortunate Spaniards.

MALAGA, Nov. 7.—The Spanish transport steamer, via Porto Rico, with repatriated Spanish troops on board has arrived and reports there were one hundred deaths among the soldiers during the voyage. The dead were buried at an average of nearly ten a day.

Troops Mobilizing.

LONDON, Nov. 7.—The military authorities at Devonport, the largest naval arsenal in Great Britain received orders today for the immediate mobilization of all troops in the western district.

A New Move.

OTTAWA, November 5.—A militia general order issued this afternoon states that an unattached is authorized in connection with the active militia in order to facilitate the transfer of officers of one corps to another without sacrificing their militia rank, transfers to unattached list with the major-general commanding. This is a move of the new major general commanding and will have the effect of keeping good men in the force, when otherwise, through leaving the territorial limits of their corps they might have to retire from the service altogether.

The Philippines.

BERLIN, Nov. 5.—The German papers renew their attacks upon President McKinley. "Kölnische Zeitung" says:—"American annexation of the Philippines would seriously injure German interests, besides tarnishing with shame the arms of the conqueror and winning for Spain the sympathy of the world." The Vossische Zeitung thinks that a court of arbitration would award the archipelago to neither America nor Spain.

A Hard Customer.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 5.—Aorang mail states that Napoleon Juan Lison was found guilty at Sydney, N. S. W., of murdering Mrs. Edith Gorrick. The jury commended him to mercy, but Lison expressed a desire to be hanged as soon as possible. Mr. Justice Owen was greatly affected in pronouncing the death sentence, but was urged by the prisoner "not to cry."

ROSSLAND NEWS.

Commander's Good Showing—Development of Le Roi.

ROSSLAND, B. C., Nov. 3.—The showing in Commander at 270 feet is reported good.

The superintendent of Le Roi says that when the 800-foot level is opened up there will be enough ore in sight to ship five hundred tons a day for four years. There is more ore between the six hundred and seven hundred foot levels than has so far been taken out of the mine. The profits are said to be \$100,000 to \$150,000 a month.

Stocks are firmer and the general tone is improved.

A CONCESSION.

Sultan Gives Emperor William a Colonizing Area.

LONDON, Nov. 5.—The Constantinople correspondent of the Standard says:—"Emperor William's visit to Constantinople has resulted in an agreement with the Sultan whereby the latter gives the Kaiser the right to plant a large German colony along the whole frontier of Tripoli. This arrangement will protect the Sultan against French encroachments across the Tripoli-Tunis frontier, and will avoid granting a concession in Asia Minor, which would induce Russia to demand compensation."

Austrian Sailors for Peking.

VIENNA, Nov. 5.—A detachment of Austrian sailors will embark from the Austrian corvette Frundsberg, now in Chinese waters, to join the European garrison at Peking.
