Max O'Rell's wife is said to add to her other accomplishments that of being an excellent cook.

Mrs. Emma Shaw Coleleugh, the explorer, has started on a long journey toward the antarctic circle.

Mrs. Jefferson Davis has been made honorary president of the New York Order of Confederate Women.

Ella Scarlett, the elder sister of young Lord Abinger, and daughter of the former Miss Magruder of the United States, has begun to study surgery at a London hospital.

Mrs. J. C. Shaffer of Evanston, Ill., is to present a marble bust of Mrs. Frances E. Willard to the Northwestern university, of which institution Miss Willard is an alumna.

The picture of Louisa Blaha, the "Hungarian Nightingale," as she has been called since her first appearance at the Budapest Volks theater, is to adorn the new 1,600 gulden note.

Among the candidates for the postoffice at Media, Pa., is Miss Hattie Gault, who was a teacher of Mrs. McKinley when the latter was a student at Brooke Hall seminary, in Media, more than 30 years ago.

Frances E. Brant left her school in Ohio 12 years ago and invested the money she had earned as a teacher in a Kansas farm. Today she owns 2,800 acres of good land. For six years she has been a preacher and for two years the pastor of the Universalist church at Hutchinson, Kan.

Miss Emily Race Briggs, daughter of Professor Charles A. Briggs of "higher criticism" fame, has won the second place of honor in the graduating class of Union Theological seminary, New York city. She will be the first woman to graduate from a Presbyterian theological seminary.

Mlle. Clemence Royer, who first translated Darwin's works into French and has written several metaphysical books, was taken from the Galignani Home For Destitute Authors on her seventieth birthday and treated to a dinner at the Grand hotel by a number of French and foreign scientific men.

Mrs. Josephine R. Nichols, who had charge of the Woman's Christian Temperance union exhibit and headquarters at the Paris exposition and also at the World's fair, has just died at her home in Indianapolis. She was a strong woman, and a great help to the organization to which she had given all her time.

Mrs. Josephine Shaw Lowell is one of the pioneers in prison reform work. As an expert in household economics she has been an educator of the women of her age and country, and as member of the New York board of charities she has been influential for reform, stimulating other workers, each in her special task.

RECENT INVENTIONS.

A new adjustable car step is thrown out in position for use, or back under the car, by turning a lever on the car platform.

A novel design for use as an ink eraser, pencil sharpener and burnisher is arrow shaped, the head being sharpened on all its edges.

A current water wheel recently patented is composed of two floats fastened together and holding a horizontal shaft, to which V shaped buckets are attached in spiral lines, a portion of the buckets being always in position to receive the water.

An apparatus to operate torpedoes for the blowing up of ships, recently patented, consists of a trolley line running on the river or ocean bed, on which a torpedo is fastened, sliding along on the wire until it strikes the bottom of the vessel.

A new medicine timer consists of a metal frame to clasp a tumbler or neck of a bottle and an upright portion, holding a number of dials which can be set at any desired time, also indicating the size of dose and lapse of time between doses.

To keep a coat from wrinkling and getting out of shape a new hanger is made of two spring wires crossed X shaped, two upright wire bows connecting the ends of the springs, the shoulders of the coat resting on the bows to keep them in shape.

CROWN JEWELS.

For many year the queen has made it a practice to treasure up handkerchiefs worn by her upon special occasions as mementoes of these events.

The Empress Frederick is rapidly completing her plans for making the old Schloss at Kronberg a historical museum, which she will present as a gift to the town of Kronberg.

Prince Eugene of Sweden, the youngest son of King Oscar, who has been studying painting for several years, will exhibit five or six pictures of large size in the annual exhibition at Stockholm.
