

Toronto's Streets Jammed As City Honors Champions

TORONTO (CP) — It looked like Red Square on May Day. The crowd estimates ran from 50,000 to 150,000 as Toronto Maple Leafs—this year's Stanley Cup champions—inched their way up Bay Street Wednesday in a storm of ticker tape.

"Beating Chicago wasn't as much trouble," shouted George Armstrong as he bulled his way through the crowds around city hall.

Moss Still Unconscious

LONDON (AP)—Stirling Moss was reported maintaining a slight improvement Wednesday night although he still was unconscious 48 hours after crashing in a race.

The condition of the 32-year-old auto-racing ace is "satisfactory," said a spokesman at the hospital in Wimbledon. Moss suffered injuries to his head, shoulder and left leg in a 100-mile-an-hour crash at Goodwood Monday.

Earlier in the day a hospital statement said Moss was sleeping a little lighter and there were no complications.

One aspect of Moss's condition took a turn for the better. A hospital spokesman said: "The bone injury to his left shoulder has been confirmed by x-rays, but does not appear to be of a serious nature."

LAUNCHED ATTACK

VIENTIANE (AP)—The Laotian defence ministry said Monday pro-Communist forces launched a large-scale attack Saturday against government positions near Nam Tha, the north-west provincial capital. Military informants said government forces suffered 25 dead. Communist Viet Minh casualties were not determined.

Roberts, who helped pitch the Phillies to the National League pennant in 1950, was purchased from Philadelphia for \$25,000 last Oct. 16 and was signed to a contract calling for \$29,000. Roberts won one and lost 10 last year with the Phillies. He had not pitched for the Yankees.

Roberts could not be reached for comment but manager Ralph Houk said "that I regret that I have not been able to pitch Roberts more. It is our feeling that he should have every chance to get another job and it is for that reason that we are releasing him at this time."

Leafs' Tim Horton Set Two Records

MONTEAL (CP)—Tim Horton of Toronto Maple Leafs set two records for scoring by defencemen during the Stanley Cup playoffs, the National Hockey League said Wednesday.

He got 16 points on three goals and 13 assists to break a record of 15 points set last year by Pierre Pilote of Chicago Black Hawks.

The 13 assists also broke a record held by Pilote. The Chicago defenceman had 12 in the 1960-61 playoffs.

Statistics published after Sunday's game in Chicago, when Leafs polished off Hawks 2-1 to win the cup, showed that Horton had three goals and 12 assists for 15 points.

The missing assist showed up when the official scorer at Maple Leaf Gardens informed NHL headquarters that Horton assisted on a goal by Frank Mahovlich in the second game in Toronto. The assist was originally credited to Red Kelly.

Horton was also the second highest scorer in the playoffs, surpassed only by Stan Mikita's record-breaking 21 points for the vanquished Hawks.
