Following the formal opening exercises, the President, Mrs. Murdoch McGowan welcomed the delegates and expressed appreciation at such a representative number.

"The theme of our convention this year is Rural Education and it's future," Mrs. McGowan said. "We are becoming increasingly disturbed with regard to the education of our children. The lack of rural and urban young people to become teachers will in a few years create a serious problem, not only here on P.E.I. but in all parts of Canada. These problems and others, and how they affect the rural areas are being studied, and we wish to thank all those who have assisted us in this study project. We all look forward with interest to hearing the results of some of this work later in our convention," Mrs. McGowan said.

Law Dinner Held For Visiting Bar President

Welcoming the President of the Canadian Bar Association to Prince Edward Island, a law dinner was held Wednesday evening at the Charlottetown Hotel. The P. E. I. branch of the C.B.A. and the Law Society of Prince Edward Island combined to honour Col. Paul P. Hutchison, Q.C. of Montreal, whose military connection has been chiefly with the Black Watch of Canada. Col. Hutchison spoke enthusiastically of his own and his wife's impressions of this Province at the present time and on previous visits.

Premier A. W. Matheson, Q.C., welcomed the visiting head of the branch of Canada, who was thanked at the conclusion of the dinner by Mr. G. R. Foster, Mr. Melvin J. McQuaid, President of the Law Society, presided.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Major changes in the Newfoundland cabinet were announced Wednesday by Premier Joseph Smallwood including appointment of a political newcomer to the ministry of fisheries and co-operatives.

There was no indication what effect, if any, the shakeup might have on an expected provincial election this fall. Two ministers have yet to face their first test at the polls.

The shuffle, biggest since Premier Smallwood became Liberal premier in 1949 after Confederation, affects five of the 14 portfolios.

Institute Is Addressed By A C W W President

"If you take education to the women, you help to educate the family," said Mrs. Alice M. Berry, O.B.E., J.P., Queensland, Australia, president of the Associated Country Women of the World, in her address last evening at the annual convention of the P. E. I. Women's Institute. The session was presided over by the president, Mrs. Murdoch McGowan, and the guest speaker was introduced by Mrs. Allison MacMillan, past-president of the Federated Women's Institutes.

Mrs. Berry gave a brief outline of life and the activities of the A.C.W.W. in her homeland, particularly in the rural areas. She said the association came into being for the purpose of helping women overcome the loneliness of isolated districts and to further the education of the rural children.

Moving from Australia Mrs. Berry gave a description of the operations and achievements of the Women's Institutes and A.C.W.W. in many countries throughout the world. She said that through their efforts many women in the backward areas of South Africa and the Middle and Far East had gained many improvements around the home, the community and in life in general.

"These organizations," said Mrs. Berry, "know no color or creed, but are rather friends to the world."

SERIOUS DEFICIENCIES

In closing the speaker said that their was about half the population of the world suffering from the lack of proper nutritious foods and many millions were illiterate, and "as long as this state of affairs exists it will be difficult to bring peace to the world."

The thanks of the convention was expressed by Mrs. Michael Doyle, Past Provincial President. Before and after the main address the audience was treated to an enjoyable program of music and dancing. Two numbers were sung by the North Milton 4-H Sewing Club Chorus. The Highland Fling was danced by Misses Nancy Myers and Heather Jenkins, Charlottetown, and the Sean-Thomas by Miss Judy MacDonald, Carleton Place. Both were accompanied by piper Barry MacGillivray, Charlottetown. Two choral selections saluting both the Island and Australia were rendered by the Central Royalty Women's Institute, the selections being "The Island Hymn" and "Waltzing Matilda."
