Arsonist Pleads Guilty To Charge

O'LEARY — A short but intensive investigation by RCMP officers into the three fires which damaged three buildings in O'Leary Saturday night has paid off with a plea of guilty to an arson charge.

Arnold MacDonald of O'Leary pleaded guilty yesterday to the charge of setting the three fires. Magistrate R.S. Hinton, Q.C. remanded him to jail for sentencing on July 14th.

The three Saturday night fires gutted a shed, a barn and heavily damaged a hatchery and egg grading station in the Prince County village.

The fires kept O'Leary and Alberton firemen on the jump through much of the night and O'Leary residents have been in an alert state ever since.

Only the prompt action of the volunteer firemen prevented the three fires from doing even greater damage. At one time the flames threatened to engulf the central portion of the community.

New Glasgow Junior Farmers Are Building New Fire Hall

New Glasgow and Districts Junior Farmers held their meeting in their Recreation Centre, New Glasgow, on Dominion Day, July 1. Robert Rackham, past president conducted the meeting. O Canada was played. Minutes of the last meeting read and approved.

Activities in which this group participated during the last month was the sponsoring of an Educational Rally regarding a regional high school for this area. Mr. Malcolm MacKenzie was the guest speaker. New Glasgow J.F. served a delicious lobster supper on June 24, which was largely attended. Regular dances were held on Saturday evening and they sponsored a dance in aid of the Fire department.

The department answered two calls to house fires. These were successfully extinguished and the structures were saved with the burnt area being confined to a minimum.

Two members of the group assisted the New Glasgow 4-H club in running a canteen at the Holstein Friesian Association Field Day at the Falconwood Farm.

The fire hall has been sold by tender for \$105, and a check has been received for same. Licence has been purchased for fire truck. Contract has been let for the building of the new fire hall.

Equipment purchased during the month for the recreation centre were an electric stove, varnished blonde table and chair set, folding banquet tables and benches.

A motion regarding the banquet tables and benches passed. This equipment will not be rented or loaned for activities other than those held in the Recreation Centre.

The Junior Farmers will not rent or loan their recreation centre to any party for holding a public dance. Private parties where invitations are used will be permitted. This motion passed also.

When disciplinary action is necessary and charges have to be laid against anyone creating a disturbance in the recreation centre, the persons laying the charges or attending for the purpose of giving evidence will be paid \$2.50 per trip for their time and one vehicle will be paid 10 cents a mile both ways per trip. This motion also carried.

Changes and improvements have taken place during the past month to the Centre and five flood lights have been placed on the corner of the lot and five flood light have been placed on it. The wire has been run under ground from the recreation centre; this has made a marked improvement in the parking lot. A letter of appreciation and thanks will be sent to Mr. Alyre Gallant for his generous donation of the light pole.

The grounds have been scraped and stones, etc., removed. The windows now open from the top instead of the bottom. Canteen is larger for use of stove and cooler. Stove has been wired and additional row of lights added.

Ralph Dickieson has been appointed to fill a vacancy on the building committee. The committee now stands: Elbert Orr, Robert Rackham, Sterling MacRae, Billy Andrew and Ralph Dickieson.

This committee will be in charge of securing turned posts and purlines and to hire men to erect the fence. Also in charge of painting recreation centre.

Stencils will be secured to paint signs, etc.

The Ways and Means committee (Leith Dickieson, Urdine Dickieson, Gladys Andrew, Eugene Larkin and Ralph Dickieson) was asked to plan a party to celebrate the payment of the Bank note.

A dainty lunch was served.

Next regular meeting will be held on July 15.
