

Exhibition At Alberton Opened By The Premier

Bright warm Sunshine shone on the thirtieth annual Prince County Exhibition at Alberton yesterday in pleasing contrast to last year's rain which greeted visitors on both the first and second days of the fair. The large crowd was in holiday mood and everyone appeared happy as they listened to the R.C.A.F. band, viewed the exhibits, enjoyed a ride on the swing or munched a hot dog. Boy Scouts did a good job of supervising the parking of cars and there seemed to be an absence of parking difficulties.

Lester R. Wallace, president of the Exhibition Association introduced the visiting speakers.

The exhibition was opened by Premier A.W. Matheson, who expressed his pleasure at being present, and wished the fair every success.

He congratulated the directors on the large assembly of spectators; the fine weather; and the fine display of exhibits.

He also made the announcement that a one-day Provincial exhibition of matured Island products would take place in Charlottetown on Sept. 25, emphasizing potatoes especially.

Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Agriculture, expressed the opinion that the show was an improvement over last year's and gave very high commendation to the exhibits of livestock. In comment on the showing of fruits and vegetables, he noted that these were not as plentiful as usual owing to the fact that the exhibition is held early and that the season this year is much later than normal. Under these circumstances

he felt the exhibits were wonderfully good.

OTHER SPEAKERS

Senator George H. Barbour noted the need for better marketing of farm produce.

Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M.P., Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister of Fisheries suggested that each year this exhibition is becoming more of an institution in the Province and said it might well adopt the slogan of a prominent mercantile firm "The place where old friends meet."

Dr. L.C. Dewar, M.L.A., said that by this exhibition the possibilities of agriculture. He wondered why fishermen do not have an exposition of products of the sea.

Mr. F.C. Ramsay, M.L.A. paid tribute to A.D. O'Brien, first president of the exhibition, and to Lester Wallace and Winston Currie, the present president and secretary to whom much credit for advancement of the exhibition has been made in the past few years.

Mr. R.C. Parent, superintendent of the Experimental Farm, Charlottetown, offered congratulations on the progress the exhibition has made through the years and expressed the opinion that exhibitions play an important part in impressing the value and importance of farming, the Province's main industry.

Because the population of the country is increasing every farmer must farm more efficiently.

Music by the R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside Band was greatly appreciated. The band was present by kind permission of Group Cap-

tain W.H. Swetman, D.S.O., D.F.C., C.D., commanding officer. Attention was drawn to the fact that the personnel of the band are employed at other tasks and that their activities in the band are an extra duty which must not interfere at any time with the work of the station.

LIVESTOCK CLASSES

Judging of general purpose horses and part of the carriage horse class was carried out by George C. Kilson. The horse classes are low in entries. Judging will be completed today. The general purpose champion mare was shown by Ivan Wallace of Cascumpec.

In the cattle division Ayrshires, Guernseys, Jerseys, Shorthorns and dual purpose Shorthorns were judged yesterday and other classes will be judged today. Cattle judges are L.W. Roper, Edison E. Mutch and Keith Clay. Principal exhibitors of Ayrshires were W.A. Moose and Son and Lloyd Sharpe, both of Kensington. Championship ribbons for junior female, junior and senior males went to Moose and Son and that for senior female to Sharpe.

Harold Palmer and Son of Kensington, principal exhibitors of Guernseys, carried off all the championships in their class. Edwin Lord, Summerside, R.R. was the principal exhibitor of Jerseys, and Harry Pridham of Montrose was second largest. Lord was awarded the exhibition special prize for champion bull and received the championship ribbon for the junior male. His "Bright Spot Magic Maid" was champion senior female. The junior female championship was won by Thomas Henderson of Montrose.

In the Shorthorn class Ivan Clark and Son of Belmont carried off most of the awards. The champion junior male was owned jointly by Clark and Frank Plett. Principal exhibitors of dual purpose shorthorns were Russell Rogers and Son of Brae and Ivan Clark and Son and there was a fairly even division of championships between them.

SHEEP CLASSES

This year saw the sheep classes filled at perhaps never before and some very fine specimens of Cheviots, Oxford and Shropshires were shown. In the flocks of one ram, one yearling ewe and two ewe lambs, prizes in the Cheviot class went to John McGrath of Tignish, Arnold Wool of O'Leary, R.R.; Henry Wedge of Summerside and Sylvare J.P. Arnslett of Egmont Bay and in the Oxford class to Ivan Bonness of Kensington, Edwin Bernard of Egmont Bay, Raymond Shea of Montrose and Joseph O'Rourke of Kildare. In the shropshire class the only flock was shown by Hudson Pridham of Montrose.

In the pen of four market lambs first place was won by Arnold Wood and in the pen of two market lambs it went to Wesley Inman of Alberton. Sheep were judged by H.W. Clay.

There was a good showing of swine and they were judged by J.A. Mundy. Prizes for two bacon hogs weighing between 100 and 200 lbs went to Harry Pridham of Montrose, L. and H. Profit of Rosebank. Prizes for a single bacon hog of the same weight were won by Hudson Pridham and Harry Pridham, both of Montrose. Hudson Pridham had the only entry of a sow under 18 months with litter of not less than eight pigs. For a sow over 18 months with litter of not less than eight pigs first place was won by L. and H. Profit and second by Frank Bryan of Cascumpec.

In the poultry division there were good showings of hens, geese and ducks.

There was also a very good showing of grains. Because of the late season field roots and garden vegetables were not up to the usual high standard. Mrs. Harry MacDonald of O'Leary again won both the potato championship. This year there were only four entries in the collection of garden vegetables. Mrs. Claude Lewis, who has carried off the honors many times, again received first place. Other prize winners were Mrs. Robert Oulton of Brae, Wilson Christoph-
