POLICE COURT.—This morning a countryman was fined \$5 and costs for fast driving on the streets.

A quarrel between four women and a man, all residing on the corner of Pownall and King Streets, was also disposed of. The "man in the case" failed to show up in response to the summons and a warrant for his arrest was ordered. The two younger women were fined \$5 or 20 days each, and the two older ones were discharged. In giving judgment the Magistrate said that the next time the parties came before him for disorderly conduct he would give each a few months in jail.

In the case of John Drake, butcher, charged on complaint of the Sanitary Officer with operating a slaughter house in the city without first having obtained a license from the Board of Health, His Honor gave judgment dismissing the summons. The by-law under which the prosecution was brought was passed by the City Council in May, 1888, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by the Act of Incorporation to prevent and regulate the erection or continuation of slaughter-houses, tanneries, breweries, and distilleries or other manufacturing or trades in the city of Charlottetown which may prove nuisances. The by-law gave the Board of Health the power to issue licenses to whom they pleased between certain dates and contained no regulations under which every person had the right to apply. His Honor held that the by-law was in no correct sense a regulation, but was simply the reservation of an arbitrary power as to who should or who should not follow a certain calling, the exercise of which power might be used in restraint of trade and to promote monopolies. The by-law, therefore, was ultra vires. In the course of his judgment the Magistrate cited several English and Canadian authorities bearing upon the subject.

PRESENTATION.—At their annual meeting held a few nights ago, four of the members presented the Hillsborough Boating Club with a splendid new four-oared lapstreak boat. She is built on the lines of a racer, and reflects much credit on the builder, Mr. James O'Brien, of this city. The new boat is of American cedar, is 36 ft 5 in. length, 3 ft 4 in. beam, and 12 inches deep. During the winter months a new double scull has been built at the club rooms measuring 26 ft. length, 2 ft. 9 in. beam, and 14 in. depth—also built of American cedar. Both boats will be at once fitted up with improved sliding seats and outriggers, and will, we have no doubt, prove a valuable acquisition to the Club.

MAKING FUN OF THE MEN.—At the convention of women in Kansas City recently to reform mankind, Miss Shaw, speaking of man's custom in claiming everything, said: "Why, there is Old Abe—the bald eagle—the men named him Abe—they say 'he' stretches his wings, 'he' does this, and 'he' does that. He was carried through the war and then taken to the centennial. He was pointed out to the youth of the land as the emblem of liberty. The truth is, after Old Abe was taken to Madison, Wis., he got tired of doing nothing and went to laying eggs."

The only variation in quality which will ever be found in Myrtle Bay tobacco is in the degree of moisture which it contains. Tobacco is a very ready absorbent of moisture, and in unusual states of the weather it may become a little too moist or a little too dry to suit the taste of some. This is a minor matter, however, as the essential quality of the tobacco is not changed. Its combustion is a little slower or a little faster, according to the degree of moisture, that is all. The darker the plug the greater the moisture, and many prefer the dark. In each caddy, however, the preference for either can be met.

IN THE ICE.—This forenoon while one of the residents of West River was on his way to the city with two loads of furniture which he was removing to Charlottetown the horses broke through the ice midway between White's Point and Victoria Park. After a great deal of trouble, accompanied by much personal danger the horses were rescued in a very exhausted state. The furniture, however, was lost for the time being, having sunk with the sleighs.

It is also reported that a man from the country, while driving to town with some ladies, broke through near government grounds, and escaped only after much trouble.
