Stanley Wins Third As Flyers Down Stars 4-2

Ronnie Stanley gave up 11 well spaced hits over the 9 inning route and racked up his third win without a defeat as the league-leading Flyers handed the tail-end Stars a 4-2 defeat at Memorial Field yesterday.

The Flyers got off running in the very first inning as lead-off batter Cuker Pineau was given a free pass to first, advanced to third on an error and a fielder's choice and scored on Kip Reedy's long fly to center. The winners added another run in the fifth and two in the sixth while the Stars garnered lone tallies in the last of the fifth and sixth innings.

The Stars went down fighting when in the last of the ninth with two out Cairns laced out his fourth hit of the afternoon and advanced to third on Flynn's lead-off single into right but Coyne belted a long fly that MacNeil gathered in to end the game.

Jack Cairns' four hits, including a double in the seventh, led all players. He was closely followed by teammate Willie Dunn, who had three singles in four tries. LeClair and Flynn each hit doubles for the losers.

Elmer MacNeil and pitcher Stanley led the Flyers seven hit attack on Donnie MacDonald. MacNeil had two in five trips and Stanley had two for three. All of the Flyers hits were singles.

Cincinnati ended Milwaukee's winning streak at six games by pulling out a 7-6 victory in their doubleheader nightcap Sunday, but the Braves still cut Brooklyn's National League lead to 11 1/2 games as the Dodgers lost a single game to New York 3-2.

Milwaukee beat the Redlegs 7-4 in the opener. St. Louis retained fifth place by beating Chicago Cubs 7-2. Philadelphia won its twinbill opener 4-1 but lost to Pittsburgh in the second game 3-1.

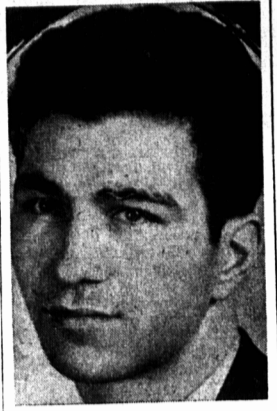

Toronto Leafs & Columbus Jets Stage Baseball Riot

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — The fistfury was over but the argument lingers on between Toronto Maple Leafs and Columbus Jets of the International League.

The clubs participated in a 90-minute free-for-all Friday night, a 17-minute brawl before 4,955 fans halted by 11 carloads of police and sheriff's deputies.

Al (Dutch) Romberger, Columbus relief pitcher, suffered a broken bone in his pitching arm as he hit Toronto first baseman Lou Limmer. Limmer, felled three times—one by Manager Nick Cullip of the Jets in the first blow of the fracas—had bruises and lacerations but x-rays showed no broken bones. Romberger will be out about six weeks.

It all started when Limmer and Cullip tangled in the fourth inning, the Jet pilot declaring Limmer, former Columbus first baseman, called him an unprintable name. Cullip left-hooked Limmer to the ground with a single punch.

Wynn, Newcombe Likely All Star Game Starters

MILWAUKEE, Wis. (AP) — Early Wynn of Cleveland and Brooklyn's Don Newcombe, both righthanders, appear to be the likely choices for starting assignments in the 22nd annual major league all-star game here Tuesday.

The odds-makers, probably respecting power over pitching, have installed the National League squad as a slight 6-to-5 favorite to register its ninth victory since the classic originated in 1933. The Americans, who managed a four-game losing streak last summer with an 11-8 victory in Cleveland, have won 13. There was no game in 1945.

A capacity crowd of close to 45,000 is expected to fill the available seats in County Stadium with all tickets sold weeks ago. The game, scheduled to start at 2:30 p.m. CDT (1:30 p.m. MDT) will be seen and heard on television and radio.

NINE PITCHERS
American League manager Al Lopez, in an effort to offset the superior punch of the Nationals, has selected a nine-man pitching staff headed by Wynn and rookie Herb Score of his own Indians. Fireballer Bob Turley and southpaw Eddie Ford of New York Yankees, righthander Dick Donovan and lefty Billy Pierce of Chicago White Sox, righthander Frank Sullivan of Boston, Jim Wilson of Baltimore and lefthander Billy Hoft of Detroit.

Leo Durocher, National League pilot, will go with a streamlined staff of seven that includes righthanders Robin Roberts of Philadelphia, Gene Conley of Milwaukee and Sam Jones of Chicago, as well as southpaws Joe Nuxhall of Cincinnati and Harvey Haddix and rookie Luis Arroyo of St. Louis.

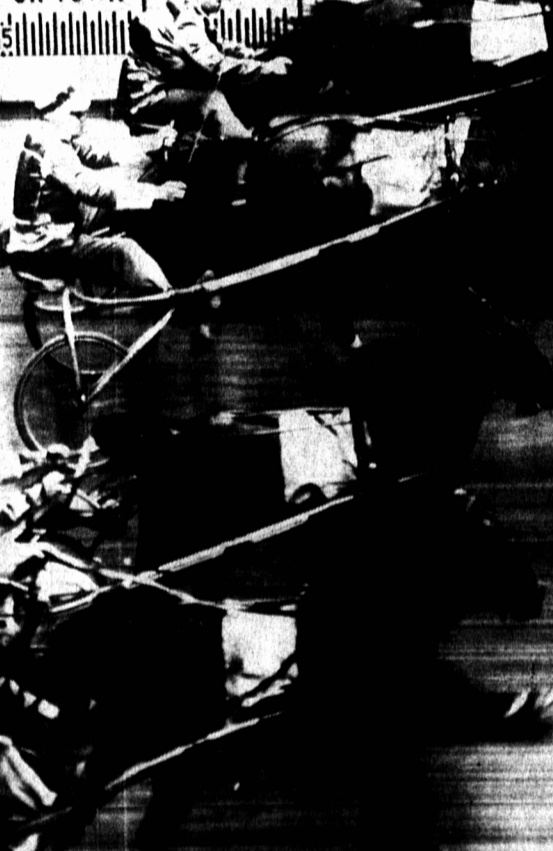
It probably will come as a surprise to most baseball followers that Wynn just about the best pitcher in the American League today has never pitched in an all-star game before. In fact the 35-year-old veteran, who boasts 196 lifetime triumphs, was selected on an all-star squad only once previously, back in 1947. And that was only as an 11th-hour replacement for Bobby Feller who was excused because of an injury.

4TH GAME FOR NEWCOMBE
Newcombe has never started before although he has appeared in three games—in 1949, 1950 and 1951. He was charged with the loss in '51. There is a possibility Durocher may hand the opening assignment to Roberts who started four of the last five games.
