The present Montague bridge will be closed to all traffic today, it was learned from authoritative sources yesterday. Foot traffic started on the temporary bridge yesterday since the steel railing on the present bridge was removed. Only cars and 14 ton trucks will be permitted on the temporary bridge, all other heavier vehicles having to detour via the River Road to the top of Wood Island hill.

Work will begin immediately erecting the understructure to the present bridge, before removing the steel superstructure. The firm of Noye and Rayne also have the contract for this job.

Seed Potato Certification

Seed Potato Certification offices announce that the inspectors are ready to begin the first field inspection. In Nova Scotia a start will be made in King's County on July 10, and in Colchester and Cumberland Counties and the eastern end of the Province on July 20. The opening date on Prince Edward Island is July 13.

Growers are advised to have their fields rogued and in proper condition for inspection and those that purchased new seed for this section are asked to have the certification tags ready when the inspector calls. All unused 1952 tags and tag record forms should be turned in to the visiting inspector.
